The 10,200 people who visited the Lab on the past two Saturdays all came away with a better understanding of the work that is done here by the Lab's 3,500 employees. According to Mariette Kuper, Director's Office, who was the general chairman of the annual affair, "This was the best year yet. The High School students were exceptionally interested, and the general public was appreciative and attentive every exhibit."

This past Saturday at 9 a.m. cars were lined up at the main entry gate waiting for the signal to enter. By 9:05, a line extended all the way from the parking lot along Bell Avenue back to the gate and out to near William Floyd Parkway.

In contrast to the previous week, this Saturday the crowd was mostly family groups. In the gymnasium the noise level was lower, and the pace of people past the exhibits was much slower. People asked questions not only of the "Answer Men" but also of any other employees who were standing near the exhibits.

Among the first arrivals was a group of girls from Mt. Holyoke College in Massachusetts, who came to the Lab on Friday

night. This group, led by professor Martin Wayne, consisted of 17 girls who came in a station-wagon convoy. Several buses were among the early arrivals and were filled with groups from private schools and colleges.

At Applied Math, Department Chairman Yoshio Shimamoto acted as "answer man" with the help of John Denes. In the Graphite Reactor, people were admitted in groups and given a general talk about the reactor while looking at a model. On the east side of the reactor a model of the HFBR core was decorated by a Halloween skeleton inserted inside the tube by one of the reactor personnel.

The mechanical hands at HIRDL were again the most popular exhibit with the small fry. This week one brave soul on the working end of the manipulator began writing names instead of initials on the souvenir programs, and when the word got around, the reception center was deluged with requests for another program, "because I lost mine."

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Computer Meeting To Finish Today

The AEC Computer Information Meeting which has been in session at BNL for the past three days, will end this afternoon with a tour of BNL by the attendees.

This meeting, the first at BNL since 1962, was devoted to reports on the progress of computer research and technology from all AEC computer users. Dr. Yoshio Shimamoto, Chairman of the Applied Math Department was host of the meeting, and chairman of the first session at which the BNL computer program was explained.

During the three sessions, 17 papers were presented. The welcoming address was given by Dr. George Vineyard, Deputy Director of BNL.

UN's Birthday Celebrated Here

The twenty-second anniversary of the formation of the United Nations was celebrated here at BNL last week by 200 foreign scientists and their wives who represented 35 countries.

The party at the Brookhaven Center was hosted by Rodney Cool, Associate Director for High Energy Physics, who welcomed the foreign guests. Dr. Cool introduced Emery Van Horn, Manager, Brookhaven AEC, and W. Bennett Lewis, Vice President of Atomic Energy of Canada, Ltd., who has just been named one of three scientists to share the AEC's \$90 thousand Atoms for Peace Award.

Resident foreign scientists at the Lab represent over 300 staff and intermittent appointments from countries as small as Liechtenstein, and as far away as Australia. Scientists from the Near and Far East, North and South America, and Europe work here in harmony in the pursuit of knowledge to benefit all mankind.



BNL'ers Asked To Sign The Pledge

Again this year BNL employees will have the opportunity to pledge support of the United Fund of Long Island through the medium of a payroll deduction plan.

Department representatives of the fund drive will have payroll deduction authorization cards, and will be able to answer detailed questions about the mechanics of the fund.

A large part of this year's goal of \$3 million will be met by voluntary payroll deductions from the 500,000 employees of Nassau and Suffolk firms. 151 community services benefit from the fund, in amounts decided by a panel of local residents. The administrative costs of the United Fund of Long Island are low, less than 10% of the total raised.

It is possible to designate a specific organization to be the recipient of the money pledged, provided this organization is one of the members of the United Fund. All donors to the fund will be given an identification card for window display. The main advantages to giving to the United Fund is the "All-in-One" principle that does away with the many solicitations that are normally made each year.

According to The News, the Oak Ridge National Laboratory employees newspaper, 56% of the Oak Ridge employees have participated in the United Fund drive, and pledged over \$150,000 or more than 75% of the desired goal.


Each scholarship will be in an amount of up to \$900 per year for up to four years, and will be available to students entering an accredited college or university in the United States, and may be used to defray expenses such as tuition, lodging and board, normally charged against the student's account by the college.

To qualify for a scholarship, the applicant must be the child of a regular BNL employee who began employment no later than January 1, 1967. Children of retired employees or employees who died when in regular service at the Laboratory are also eligible. The child must be a secondary school senior who will be graduated during the current academic year and will enter college next fall (1968).
