"Sculpture Now" Opens Monday Nite

The first major show of sculpture to be held at Brookhaven will open on Monday evening in the new Brookhaven Conference Center. The exhibition, entitled *Sculpture Now*, explores the lively artistic inventiveness of today's sculptors and the influence of sculptural concepts on the neighboring artistic areas of ceramics, painting and furniture design. It will be the first exhibition to be held in the meeting rooms of the new Conference Center - a structure which itself reflects a notable and salutary sculptural influence.

By freeing the artist from requirements of strict representation, the artistic revolution that occurred around the beginning of this century opened up the most intensive period of significant artistic exploration since the Renaissance. The twentieth century artist, by rejecting arbitrary limitations on the nature of the artistic object and the artistic process has produced an almost systematic investigation of the nature and foundations of art itself. Although the explorations in painting have been of tremendous interest and importance, sculpture is gradually becoming the most exciting area of artistic exploration. The number of materials available to the sculptor, particularly in recent years, provides him with a richness of artistic vocabulary not available to the painter.

The emphasis of *Sculpture Now* is on the creative use of nonclassical sculptural materials. Among the materials employed are aluminum (by Robert Dhaemers of California), fiberglass (David Seccombe and Willard D. White, Jr.), artificial light (Giles Larrain of Paris and New York), and vinyl (by William King). One of this country's most prominent innovators in metal sculpture, Ibram Lassaw, will be represented by two recent works.

The success of abstract sculpture has had strong repercussions in a variety of cultural

fields. The *Sculpture Now* exhibition shows some interesting examples of such influence on painting (in the shaped canvases of Sydney Butchkes), printmaking (in the three-dimensional prints of Waldo Balart) and on ceramics (in the work of Toshiko Takaezu and Erik Nyholm of Denmark).

Much of what is shown in this exhibition is experimental in nature, but these experiments may be significant determinants of the future character of the art of sculpture.

As in the past, the show has been organized by the BERA Art Committee. This year the committee has been fortunate in enlisting the collaboration of Mr. Emanuel Benson who undertook the artistic organization of the exhibition. The Benson Gallery in Bridgehampton is particularly well known for its showing of significant contemporary sculpture.

The show will be open during the hours of 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. from Tuesday, October 8 through Wednesday, October 16. It will also be open on the Thursday evenings of October 10 and 17 from 7 to 8 p.m. All members of the Laboratory community, their families and friends are invited to the opening at 8 p.m. on Monday, October 7. In addition to Mr. Benson, several of the artists will be present and refreshments will be served.

Show You Care With A Fair Share

For the fourth consecutive year BNL will participate in the United Fund of Long Island Campaign. This fund, organized in 1964, now helps support 151 health, rehabilitation and character-building services in the Nassau-Suffolk area.

Last year approximately 10% of BNL's employees pledged \$14,000 towards this community campaign. This year, Peter Paige, Personnel, will be in charge of the mechanics of the fund-raising drive which will begin on October 14.

The 260 people from Brookhaven Lab who participated in the drive last year will each receive tickets to the Long Island Star Show, to be held on Sunday, October 13, at Roosevelt Raceway. The United Star Show will contain many top performers and will have a great number of donated prizes awarded during the show.

Brookhaven's drive will be aimed at getting people to pledge one hour's pay per month as a fair share for giving. Pledge cards will be distributed, and arrangements have been made for payroll deduction of the pledge amount.

Retirement Booklets Mailed To Homes

A new retirement plan booklet has been prepared for the employees of Associated Universities, Inc. and is being mailed this week to the homes of Brookhaven National Laboratory personnel.

Spruce Removal Causes Storm of Protest Letters

Reaction to a story in last week's *Bulletin Board* about the possible removal or trimming of a Koster Blue Spruce tree at the corner of Upton Road and Brookhaven Avenue has resulted in a flood of letters and petitions calling for the preservation of this tree.

As of press time on Tuesday afternoon, over one thousand names had been signed to letters and petitions asking that the tree be untouched. Some of the letters were written on memo sheets, some on ruled paper, and some were carefully typewritten, but all followed the same general theme of "Save the Tree."

The tree in question is a thirty-foot high Koster Blue Spruce which was donated to Camp Upton during World War II days by Henry Hicks, owner of Hicks Nursery in Westbury. According to A. Kostick, 75-year-old manager of the nursery, the tree is over fifty years old, and was imported from Holland as a seedling before 1918.

"We were never able to propagate the Koster in the United States," said Kostick. "We imported them from Holland for many years before the United States stopped the importation of live plants as a disease control measure. The Koster is a very good spruce because it does not lose its lower limbs as do most other spruce."

Kostick remembers that this spruce and another similar one was planted in front of the Post Headquarters at Upton early in the war when Hick's son was in training at Upton. Later, during the Battle of the Bulge, the son, William Hicks, was killed in action.

Mr. Kostick of Hicks Nursery was surprised to hear that the Koster spruce was still growing, and expressed the opinion that this was indeed a rare and valuable tree. He cautioned that any trimming or moving of the tree should be done with great care in order to preserve this scarce specimen.

After Brookhaven National Laboratory was formed, the spruce was moved from in front of the Security Office to its present location at the request of Dr. Philip Morse, then the Laboratory Director. For many years the tree was decorated with colored lights each Christmas season.

At the time of transplanting the tree, a guy wire was placed too tightly around the top of the trunk, and the following year it was discovered that the crown had died. Since the dead wood was removed, a new double crown has grown, and the tree has regained most of its original shape.

Juilliard Quartet To Return To BNL

The 1968-1969 concert season promises to be a series of six gala evenings. The Juilliard String Quartet will play the opening concert on Tuesday, October 22nd at the new Berkner Hall.

The Quartet has been a favorite with Brookhaven audiences, having performed here on many occasions. The Quartet (Robert Mann, violin; Earl Carlyss, violin; Raphael Hillyer, viola; and Claus Adam, cello) is considered the First Family of Chamber Music in the United States since its appointment as Quartet in Residence of the Library of Congress in 1962. This also gives the artists the privilege of using the Stradivarius instruments willed to the American people by Mrs. Gertrude Clarke Whittall.

Although entirely American-trained, Europe has hailed the Juilliard Quartet for its interpretation of Europe's own masters, and the Quartet is officially sent abroad whenever an important occasion offers itself.

Artists for the remainder of the season are: The Festival Winds, November 9; Paul Doktor, January 7; Bernede Strong Quartet, February 6; Joy Kim, March 6th; and Jerome Rose, April 1st.

Season tickets are on sale at \$10.00 for adults and \$5.00 for children. Single tickets may also be purchased for each event at \$3.00 for adults, \$1.50 for children, and \$3.50 for non-employee guests. All concerts will be presented at Berkner Hall at 8:30 p.m.

Unusual Medical Expenses

Occasionally, families are faced with unusual expenditures for medical purposes. Due to the nature of the expenditure, it may not on the surface appear to be a tax deductible medical expense. One particular example occurs when, under a doctor's instructions, central air conditioning has to be installed in a home because one or more members of the family have severe asthmatic conditions. This situation can result in a deduction for medical expense, calculated under specific guidelines. The deduction is limited to the cost of installing the central air conditioning less any increment in the value of the house due to the addition of air conditioning. The following example illustrates a typical situation.

Mr. & Mrs. BNL have a child with a severe asthmatic condition. On his doctor's advice, Mr. BNL has central air conditioning installed in his home in order to help alleviate the child's asthma. The cost of the air conditioning installation is \$2500. Based upon a competent appraisal, the addition of central air conditioning has increased the market value of Mr. BNL's house by \$1500. Mr. BNL has a medical expense deductible for tax purposes, computed as follows:

Cost of Central Air Conditioning	\$2500
Less: Increase in Value of House	1500
Net Medical Expenditure	\$1000

Examples of other unusual items that fall into this category are: elevator stair lifts for paraplegics, heart patients, special beds for back injuries, etc.

The important factors that control eligibility as a medical expense are: has the purchase been advised by a doctor and has any increase in home value due to its addition been taken into account in computing the net expenditure?
