Scholarship Applications Due November Fifteenth

Application forms for the 1969 AUI Trustee Scholarships are now available, and must be completed by the applicant in order to be in the hands of the Educational Testing Service before the deadline of November 15.

Since the scholarship award program was started three years ago, forty children of Lab employees have each received \$900 annually towards the expense of a college education. The first ten winners of the AUI Scholarships are now entering their senior year, and the most recent winners (from 1968) are entering their freshman year.

Requirements for application are simple. The applicant must be the son or daughter of a regular BNL employee who began employment no later than January 1, 1968, and must be a secondary school senior who will be graduated during the current academic year and who will enter college next fall.

The scholarships are awarded on a competitive basis and winners will be selected by an independent scholarship committee reporting to the Educational Testing Service, Princeton, New Jersey. Candidates are required to take the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) and three Achievement Tests of the College Entrance Examination Board. Winners are generally announced early in the spring of each year.



950 Eat Lunch At New Cafeteria On First Day Of Use

After a summer-long wait for the opening of the new cafeteria, 950 employees of BNL had lunch there on the first day of operation.

The new building, which includes meeting rooms and a lecture hall as well as the cafeteria, was started in the spring of 1966, and was expected to be ready for use in the spring of 1968. The \$2.3 million complex opened at 7:30 a.m. on Monday, and served free coffee to all visitors who came during the breakfast hours.

While there was some confusion on the part of the diners as to where to find the knives and forks, and how to operate the coffee and milk dispensers, most of the first-day customers were pleased with the general layout of the food service areas.

In the dining area are a large variety of tables, some round and some rectangular. Along some of the walls are built in cushioned benches. All of the tables are equipped with salt and pepper shakers and a sugar dispenser set on a white doiley. The new service trays are blue with a BNL seal imprinted in the corner. All of the china for the cafeteria is new, and in spite of looks, the coffee cups hold the same seven ounces as the cups in the old cafeteria.

The new look has even been extended to the serving personnel who are now supplied with chic blue uniforms. Counter tops over the cold buffet and dessert area have a large fruit display, and on a massive Lazy Susan near the entrance is a display of baked goods and extra desserts. The entire floor of the food service and dining area is carpeted in a dark brown close-woven material.

Many of the first-day customers came early and stayed late. One man, was overheard telling his friend, "Imagine this, I am here on my own time! I should be home now, but this is really worth staying to look at." Another visitor, not quite so enthusiastic looked at the outside of the building and said, "It looks like two cement trucks collided and overturned."

The cafeteria had only been open for a few minutes when it was discovered that the salt and pepper shakers from one table had vanished. By the end of the day they had still not been found.

Architects for the job, The Office of Max O. Urbahn, describe the building as "a piece of living sculpture." The engineers were Seelye Stevenson Value & Knecht of New York City. Construction of the building complex was by the George A. Fuller Co., General Contractor.

For the AEC, the project engineers were D.C. Moore and W.E. Myott. The Cafeteria Committee of BNL consisted of G. Norris Glasoe, Harold Euler, Mariette Kuper, Don MacCornack, Alf Christoffersen, Gerhart Friedlander, George Collins, Joseph Washburne and J. Georges Peter (retired).

Fred Baumfalk of Plant Engineering and Planning and William Webster of Staff Services worked closely with James Simons of the ARA staff on the equipment of the cafeteria.

Temporarily, the automatic food vending machines will remain in operation in the East Room of the Old Cafeteria. A cigarette machine and a candy vending machine have been placed in the new cafeteria near the entrance to the Snack Bar.

Four Marshallese Return To Islands After Recuperation

The four Marshallese patients who were at the BNL Medical Research Center since August 4th were operated on at New England Baptist Hospital in Boston during the week of August 19.

Surgery was performed by Dr. B.P. Colcock of the Lahey Clinic. The thyroid glands of the three boys, Elio Boas, George and Lekoj Anjain, were removed due to injury of that organ from fallout radiation, to which they were exposed 14 years ago. They returned to BNL on August 25 and recuperated satisfactorily from their operations.

On August 30, the three boys and Namiko Kalal accompanied by their guide and interpreter, Sebjo Shoniber, departed for Hawaii from Kennedy International Airport. They will spend one day sight-seeing in Hawaii under the auspices of the AEC before going on home to Rongelap Atoll in the Marshall Islands.

During their stay at BNL, the group was entertained by many of the staff members of the Medical Department, and were deeply appreciative of all the many courtesies that were extended them. Their visit was a rich experience that will enable them to take back memories and photographs that they will long cherish.

The Marshallese will be examined again next spring at the time of the annual medical survey in the Marshall Islands.

Advantages of Certain Non-Cash Contributions by Frank Bloom

Contributions of certain non-cash property that has an appreciated value well in excess of its original cost can prove very advantageous for taxpayers in the upper tax brackets and for those taxpayers desiring to make specific large charitable contributions. (An example would be to a church or university building fund.)

The current income tax laws allow the taxpayer a deduction in full for the market value of real or personal property contributions, without taxing the donor on appreciation in value over cost. As an example of the foregoing:

Mr. A owns 100 shares of stock that cost him \$10 per share (\$1,000). The present market value of the stock is \$50 per share (\$5,000). Mr. A wishes to make a \$5,000 contribution to his favorite charity. By donating the stock to the charity, Mr. A gets a \$5,000 contribution deduction without having to pay any tax on the \$4,000 increase in market value over cost (\$5,000 less \$1,000).

If Mr. A were to sell the stock and then donate the \$5,000 cash to the charity, he would have to pay income tax on the \$4,000 gain and would still get only a \$5,000 contribution deduction.

Property items that usually can be readily used for this purpose are: stocks, bonds, real estate, works of art, etc. It should also be noted that taxpayers wishing to contribute appreciated property with a market value far in excess of their allowable contribution deduction for the year (i.e., a very valuable painting), could surrender possession of the object to the charity. However, the actual contribution would be made over a number of years by giving a specified interest each year (example: 1/3 each year for 3 years). This method of contribution avoids having an excess contribution carry forward that might have limitations on its application.

There is another method of contributing appreciated property called a *bargain sale*. In this instance, the taxpayer sells the property (stock for instance) to the charity for the amount that it cost the taxpayer; the charity thereby acquiring the stock for an amount well below the fair market value (hence the term "bargain sale"). The taxpayer can then take a charitable contribution deduction for the difference between the fair market value at the time of sale and the proceeds he received. That way, the taxpayer recovers his original cost and gets the benefit of a deduction for the increased value of the stock without having to pay income tax on the increase.

**BERA Opera Tickets
