Naval Reservists Updated On Radiation Control Info

Thirty-two officers of Naval Reserve Research Companies from Boston, Philadelphia and New York, attended a symposium on "Hazards Control in Nuclear Research" at BNL on June 8 and 9.

NRRC 3-9, based at Upton was the host company for the symposium. Commander L.A. Baker, Executive Officer of 3-9 was Officer in Charge of the Symposium, and Captain V.P. Bond, Commanding Officer of 3-9 was the Symposium Sessions Chairman. Lt. J.R. Halpin was acting as Symposium Tour Officer.

During the course of the weekend symposium the officers listened to lectures on Nuclear Physics, Biological Effects of Radiation, Basics of Radiation Protection and Cryogenic Hazards. After a tour of the Alternating Gradient Synchrotron, the program continued with lectures on Laser Hazards, Alkali Metals Hazards, Criticality Safety, and a Report on Reactor Accidents Throughout the World. The program ended with a tour of the High Flux Beam Reactor.

The entire program was jointly sponsored by the United States Naval Research Company 3-9 of Upton and the Office of Naval Research, Boston, Massachusetts.

FAS To Sponsor Film

On Monday, June 17, 1968, the Brookhaven Chapter of the Federation of American Scientists will sponsor the showing of the British Broadcasting Company documentary film, "The War Game." This film relates an imagined nuclear incident on a small English city, starting off with the alert and civil defense preparations, and ending with the aftermath of the nuclear explosion. The technical facts which form the basis of this documentary are the US-AEC study of the "Effects of Nuclear Weapons" and the British data on the Fire Bombing of German cities in World War II.

This film should be seen by every thinking individual who is concerned with the realities of today's world. Because of the particular competence of the Brookhaven staff to discuss the technical details presented in this film, a panel consisting of Dr. Paul Craig, Physics; Charles Meinhold, Health Physics; and Dr. Robert Conard, Medical, will answer questions and lead a discussion after the showing of the film.

The presentation will take place in the Lecture Hall and will start at 8:00 p.m. All Brookhaven employees are invited to attend. Admission is free. It is not a good idea to bring children.

Dr. F.A. Long Chosen Interim Head Of AUI

Effective July 1, 1968, Dr. Franklin A. Long has been authorized as Chairman of the Board of Trustees of AUI to exercise all powers of the President pending selection of a successor to Dr. T. Keith Glennan.

Dr. Long, Vice President for Research and Advanced Studies at Cornell University, first became a member of the Board of Trustees of AUI in 1947. He was elected Chairman of the Board on November 8, 1967.

A native of Montana, Dr. Long completed his undergraduate training in that state before completing graduate work in chemistry in California. Since coming to Cornell in 1937 as instructor in Chemistry, he has risen to his present position in research and advanced studies. During the war years and after, he has served on numerous important committees of government and industry. He is a member of the



National Academy of Science, the Chemical Society, and the American Academy of Science.

Associated Universities, Inc. operates the National Radio Astronomy Observatory in Greenbank, West Virginia for the National Science Foundation, as well as Brookhaven National Laboratory for the Atomic Energy Commission.


In Case Of Fire

This interruption of the fire alarm system is needed for the relocation of equipment in the firehouse to a new watch room.

Robert Francis Kennedy

November 20, 1925 - June 6, 1968

"Let us begin in the aftermath of this great tragedy to find a way to reverence life, to protect it, to extend its promise to all of our people, this nation, and the people who have suffered grievously from violence and assassination."

Thus spoke President Johnson on Wednesday night, June 5, as Senator Robert F. Kennedy lay dying from a bullet fired by an assassin.

Physicists View Neutron Research 6-523-68

On June 5th, the Laboratory was visited by the European-American Committee on Reactor Physics which had been meeting in New York throughout the week. This Committee, sponsored by the European Nuclear Energy Agency, has a membership consisting of scientists working in the field of reactor physics in all of the major countries of western Europe, Japan, Canada, and the United States.

The Committee meets periodically for an exchange of information on research being conducted in the various countries, and for discussion of problems in the neutron physics of nuclear reactors.

The group visited the AGS, the HFBR, and facilities in the Nuclear Engineering Department. A dinner was given in the evening, with the guest of honor and speaker being AEC Commissioner, Dr. Gerald F. Tape, formerly Deputy Director of BNL, and President of Associated Universities, Inc.

Old Roads Just Fade Away

During the past week, the checkered career of one of the original streets of BNL came to an end. With very little fanfare and a complete lack of ceremony, bulldozers, graders and a work crew obliterated the last remnants of North Harvard Street.

Known as 13th Street before BNL was started, Harvard Street ran south from the Nuclear Engineering Building (T-197) to the vicinity of the present large animal quarters, and then turned east to join the present Rochester Street at the Heavy Machine Shop.

The first break in the continuity of Harvard Street came when the building that houses the Systems and Data Processing Division was built by the Army. After BNL was well established, another section of the street was cut off to allow for the building of the Medical Research Center. After this,

it came to be known as North and South Harvard Street.

When the Chemistry Building was started, North Harvard was cut to one short block running from Brookhaven Avenue north to Lewis Road. South Harvard is now not much more than a service road starting at Rochester Street and ending at the Cow Barn.

North Harvard has been eliminated from the centerfold map in the newly-issued telephone directory, but the name still lives on in the alphabetical listings of this book. The Reactor Theory Group is listed as having its quarters at 7 N. Harvard St.

While North Harvard has disappeared as a roadway, it will soon be re-born as a pedestrian walkway. Plans have been formulated to make such a walk in conjunction with the construction of a nine-foot wide sidewalk along the north side of Brookhaven Avenue from Center Street to Johns Hopkins Street.

Real Estate Taxes - Up, Up & Away!

High real estate taxes got you down? If you are a World War II, Korean, or post Korean veteran who has received veterans benefits such as mustering out pay, disability payments, insurance dividends or educational allowances, you are probably entitled to some real estate tax relief which may have been overlooked.

Generally, a limited tax exemption is granted when certain veterans benefits have been received and applied to the purchase of real property. The amount of the exemption depends on the amount of benefits received and the regulations of the Town in which the property is located.

The savings can be substantial. I save a minimum of \$168 each year as a Korean veteran living in the Town of Brookhaven. Here's how:

Taxes have been known to go up, so that as your rate increases, your dollar savings in future years will also increase. If continuing benefits such as disability or insurance dividends are received, a supplemental application should be filed each year to update your exemption, otherwise you need only file once.

The exemption applies to County, City, Town, and Village taxes, *not* school or special district taxes.

Grievance day is the annual filing deadline. In Suffolk County this is the third Tuesday in July; in Nassau County, the third Tuesday in May.

Although your application may be obtained and filed directly with your friendly Town Board of Assessors Office, I recommend working through a Veterans Administration Service Agency representative (he's on your side). My experience has been that he will do everything for you except sign your name. Here are the V.A. agency offices you can contact in this area:

If you have considered this exemption in the past, and after doing battle with local government red tape and confusion decided it was not worth the trouble, I think you'll be pleasantly surprised at the treatment given you by the V.A. representative. Helping you is his job.

Remember - The exemption belongs to you - not to your house. If you move, a new application should be filed, and your exemption will move with you.
