. . . Will stay these couriers from the swift completion of their appointed rounds. The only thing that stays the BNL couriers is the sheer volume of the mail.

The BNL Mail Room handles approximately 260,000 pieces of mail each month. This total includes some 115,000 incoming pieces of mail, 1000 incoming packages, and 70,000 pieces of inter-office mail. All of this mail is delivered and picked up three times a day at the 93 mail drops around the Laboratory.

A significant fraction of this mail is personal, non-technical material. Nonscientific magazines, personal copies of newspapers, catalogs from mail order houses, bulk advertising from wholesale houses and department stores, personal packages, personal bills and the like swell the mail load, and seriously impede the prompt distribution of regular Laboratory mail.

However, it is hoped that employees will eliminate the large volume of 2nd, 3rd and 4th class personal mail presently being handled by the BNL Mail Room and reduce the amount of 1st class mail so that restrictions on personal 1st class mail will not be necessary.

Change of address forms can be obtained from the on-site U.S. Post Office. It is requested, in the interests of efficient Laboratory mail handling, that all employees receiving mail that is not essential to the work at the Laboratory make good use of them.

Mail boxes at the U.S. Post Office are available for rent at a nominal fee for those employees who find it more convenient to receive their mail on site.

With a cooperative effort on everyone's part, the mail will get through - on time.

## Yarmolinsky To Be AUI Distinguished Lecturer

The Seventh AUI Distinguished Lecturer will be Professor Adam Yarmolinsky of Harvard University. On Thursday, November 7, he will speak on "The Limits of Violence."

Professor Yarmolinsky received his AB from Harvard in 1943 and his LLB from Yale Law School in 1948. He was a law clerk with Mr. Justice Reed of the U.S. Supreme Court; a special assistant to the Secretary of Defense; Deputy Director of the President's Task Force on the War Against Poverty in 1964; Chief, U.S. Emergency Relief Mission to the Dominican Republic; and Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for International Security Affairs before joining the Faculty at Harvard.

## 3800 Brave Rain For HS Visitor Day

### 191 Schools From 5 States Send Students to BNL

In spite of stormy weather and downpours of rain, over 3800 students from schools as far away as Rhode Island and Pennsylvania came to BNL to attend the annual High School Visitors' Day.

The first visitor to register was a junior high school science teacher from East Islip, Richard Wickman, who brought along his two sons. After Mr. Wickman came a steady stream of visitors, some in cars, but most in busses that continued to arrive on site until the gates closed at 3:30 p.m.

When the approximately 300 BNL staff members arrived earlier in the morning the weather was threatening, but rain did not start until almost 10 a.m. Early arriving visitors were generally not prepared for rain, but later arrivals came equipped with umbrellas and raincoats.

BNL Bus dispatchers were supplied with foul weather gear from Grounds Maintenance, but not until most were soaked almost to the skin. Most of the new arrivals at the Reception Center went directly to the Cafeteria for a while before braving the elements for the walk to the theatre or the Exhibit Hall.

At the Physics exhibit, the show-stopper was the Van de Graaff display ably managed by Harvey Wegner. Whenever the small Van de Graaff generator was activated the students gathered around to watch the "magic" show that followed. After leaving the Exhibit Hall visitors went next to the gymnasium before boarding a bus for a tour of the site.

At the biology exhibit, the *tradescantia* plants on display were found to have wilted during the night, and new replacements had to be found before opening the gymnasium. All of the displays in the gymnasium were well received, and staff members attending the exhibits were impressed with the attention given them by the students and teachers alike.

The BERA Radio Club exhibit was swamped this year by requests for messages to be sent to servicemen. At the end of the day over 400 messages had been sent to the various relay stations at home and abroad.

The BGRR and HIRDL had a constant stream of visitors until the last bus left at 4 p.m. New stops on the bus tour this year were the AGS exhibit on the experimental floor, and the 80" Bubble Chamber where visitors were shown the control room and the chamber itself. At Applied Math, staff members were busy all day answering questions about the array of computers that operated during visiting hours.





**The Cost of Being Charitable**

An important appeal in a recent *Bulletin Board* provided us with an opportunity to discuss the tax effects of charitable contributions. The announcement suggested that an employee's Fair Share contribution to the *United Fund of Long Island (UFLI)* should be one hour's pay per month, or more if you desire to make a contribution that is proportionately larger.

Because of high tax rates, however, your actual net cost of contributing is considerably less than the hour's pay pledged. In fact, your cost may be only 75 percent or less of the amount pledged. Why is this so?

Charitable contributions, if you itemize deductions on your federal and state tax returns, is an allowable deduction from gross income. The taxes you pay are only on the income remaining after deductions and exemptions. Therefore, any income that is not included in taxable income because of deductions you subtracted saves you tax that would have been paid had such deductions not been claimed. The effect is that your contributions to UFLI or other recognized charities is shared by Uncle Sam, and your net after-tax cost is something less than the amount you pledged.

The table below, which reflects the 7.5% surcharge we have all heard about, shows the approximate net after-tax cost per \$100 of a deductible charitable gift by individual taxpayers in '68 for selected brackets:

Taxable income before deducting contribution	Cost per \$100 of deductible charitable contributions		
	Single person	Married filing jointly	Head of household
\$ 8,000-\$ 9,999	\$70	\$76	\$73
10,000- 11,999	66	76	71
14,000- 15,999	58	73	66
20,000- 21,999	48	66	57

This same thinking also applies to other expenses that are allowable as deductions on your tax return. Your net after-tax cost of medical expenses, interest, and real estate taxes is considerably less than your payments for these items.

As a final thought on your UFLI pledge, consider the effect to both 1968 and 1969 taxable years while deciding whether to make your contribution by payroll deduction or in a lump amount.

## Radiation Info Service Inaugurated For NY Area

A Health Physics Information Bureau has been organized by the Greater New York Chapter of the National Health Physics Society. The announcement of its organization was made by Andrew P. Hull, I & HP, who is the President of the Chapter.

A major purpose of the Bureau is to provide newsmen and science writers with reliable information on the effects of radiation on living tissues, from plants to man and to enable them to present comprehensible and undistorted facts about radiation hazards and safety to their readers.

The area to be served by the Bureau includes Suffolk and Nassau counties, all of New York City, Westchester and Rockland counties, northern New Jersey, and southern Fairfield county in Connecticut. Dr. Mortimer B. Heller, Department of Radiology of the Meadowbrook Hospital, will serve as contact for the Bureau. Dr. Heller is the Public Information Officer of the local chapter of the Health Physics Society.

While not staffed to handle individual inquiries from the general public, it is hoped that through proper reporting by newsmen the public understanding of radiation and the health physics profession will be improved.

## French Group Meets Monday

The first meeting of the BNL French Group will be held Monday, October 28, at 8:30 p.m. in one of the meeting rooms of the new Conference Center. Mr. George I. Duca, Executive Director of the Federation of French Alliances in the U.S., will speak on the subject "Profil de la Jeunesse Americaine vue par un Europeen" ("A View of American Youth as Seen by a European").

A contribution of \$1.00 will be collected from each person attending.

Mr. Duca was born and educated in Romania and spent many years in the diplomatic service of his native country. During World War II he was active in initiating secret contacts with the Allied powers, and he emigrated to the U.S.A. after the war. An American citizen since 1959, he has been active in various international organizations, including the International PEN Club, Free Europe, Inc., and the Assembly of Captive Nations. Since 1961 he has been Executive Director of the Federation of French Alliances.



## Studded Tires Again

With the cold weather approaching, the question of studded tires will be coming up again. The studs, usually of tungsten carbide, are mounted in the tread of regular snow tires to increase traction on ice. This practice has gained wide acceptance in recent years and studded tires will probably equal 30% of all winter tires sold this season.

Studded tires are still illegal in five states: Arkansas, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas. They are legal in New York state from Oct. 16 through April 30 and in New Jersey from November 1 through April 15.

A recent report from the Cornell Aeronautical Laboratory reveals that studs on rear tires will reduce stopping distance and increase acceleration traction up to 30% on ice. Studs on all four wheels raises this figure to 50% and significantly improves cornering ability.

The studs wear down and after about 5,000 miles lose their prime effectiveness, although they still do improve traction to some degree. The motorist equipped with studded tires should keep this in mind as he approaches an icy turn in March which he negotiated at 30 mph in December. Also, when brand new, the studs may be a bit more slippery, particularly on bare pavement, until they are "broken in."


