Former Honor Guard Recalls JFK Burial

Thanksgiving will be a time for sombre reflection for Ray Mayo, Plant E&P. Five years ago, Mayo spent the day as honor guard at Arlington National Cemetery at the graveside of President John F. Kennedy.

Ray, who was drafted in 1961, was a Sergeant in a ceremonial unit at Fort Meyers, Virginia, at the time the President was assassinated. He had seen the President many times, and felt a close kinship to this man who was his Commander-in-Chief. "He came out to Fort Meyers a few times to inspect us, and always seemed to be truly interested in how we got along," said Ray.

On the day of the President's burial, Sgt. Mayo was in charge of a five-man detail at the graveside with the special responsibility for seeing that flowers were arranged properly and that the gate in the fence around the grave was opened only for members of the family. 11-1836-68

Shortly after the President's funeral Mayo left the army, and in 1964 started work at BNL. He is presently employed in the "Hot" Laundry, and works part-time as a bartender for ARA, the catering firm that runs the Brookhaven Center.


BNL Presents Program For Annual AEC Review

Members of the Solid State Physics and the Metallurgy - Materials Science Groups at BNL met last week with representatives of Universities and other National Labs to present a review of BNL's program to the AEC Materials Branch.

The two-day meeting was opened with a welcoming address by Dr. Ronald Rau, Chairman of the Physics Department. Dr. George Dienes, chairman of the meeting, introduced the program for the day which was devoted to crystal physics and energetic particle interactions.

On Friday, the session on metallurgy and materials science was introduced by Dr. Arnold Paskin. The three areas covered during the day included the BNL superconductivity program; liquid metals; and crystal physics.

Talk Binds Miners, Metals and Madness

Parkinson's Disease: Relationships to Miners, Metals and Madness, will be the subject explored in the 79th Brookhaven Lecture. Dr. George Cotzias, of the BNL Medical Research Center will deliver his lecture on Wednesday, December 4th at 8 p.m. in Berkner Hall.

Five years ago, Dr. Cotzias gave a BNL Lecture about life-sustaining and detrimental properties of trace metals, studied by his colleagues and himself. His second Brookhaven Lecture presents a new thesis, based largely on the previous work, that "Patients with brain diseases can now be chosen, so that they derive immediate, often dramatic benefit from the biochemical dissection of their respective diseases."

He will explain how some basic observations have generated therapeutic postulations. Movies will show the translation of hypotheses into challenging options for the practice of medicine. These new options have raised new biological questions. Dr. Cotzias will conclude that answering these new basic questions may generate additional options for clinical investigation and therapy.

George Constantin Cotzias, a native of Athens, Greece, interned at Peter Bent Brigham Hospital after receiving his MD from Harvard. After residency in Massachusetts General Hospital and Rockefeller Institute, he came to Brookhaven in 1953 as Head, Division of Physiology in the Medical Department.
