Dr. T. J. Thompson Nominated As AEC Commissioner

President Nixon announced his intent to nominate Dr. Theos J. Thompson of Winchester, Massachusetts, as a member of the Atomic Energy Commission. He will fill the unexpired term of Dr. Gerald F. Tape which expires June 30, 1971. Dr. Tape has resigned but agreed to remain on the Commission until his successor is confirmed.

Dr. Thompson is Director of the Nuclear Reactor at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Cambridge, Massachusetts. He received his AB degree from the University of Nebraska in 1941, and his MA from the same school in 1942. He received his PhD from the University of California, Berkeley, in 1952.

He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa, the American Physical Society, the American Nuclear Society, and Sigma Chi.

Dr. Thompson was on the staff at Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory from 1952 to 1955, an associate professor of Nuclear Engineering at MIT from 1955 to 1958, and since 1958, Director, Nuclear Reactor for Design, Construction and Operations at MIT. He served in the Army from 1942 to 1946 and attained the rank of Major. Dr. Thompson is married to the former Dorothy Sibley. They have four children.

Photo and Graphic Arts Staff Changes Announced

Kenneth Boehm will become Supervisor of Graphic Arts, with William Bottinger as assistant. John Laurie of the Printing Group will become leader of the Quick Copy section.

In Technical Photography, Robert Walton has been named Supervisor. Marshall Bull has been given the responsibility for film processing, color and nuclear emulsions.

It is hoped that everyone will take advantage of this opportunity to welcome newcomers and to become acquainted with other wives and employees.


Budget Process Told To Lab Supervisors

TIAA-CREF Changes Permitted This Month

Every year, during the month of May, participants in the A.U.I. Retirement Plan may request that the apportionment of their contributions between TIAA and CREF be changed. Such changes apply to contributions made by the Laboratory as well as those made by the employee and are effective the July 1st following the change request.

Participants who have previously applied all contributions to TIAA, the fixed annuity program, may apply as much as 75% of subsequent contributions to CREF, the variable annuity program. Conversely, participants may also reduce or terminate contributions to CREF and increase their TIAA contributions accordingly. Any such changes will affect only future contributions and will have no bearing on accumulations in either TIAA or CREF up to the effective date of the change.

Tape Begins AUI Presidency Today

Dr. Gerald F. Tape moved today from 1717 H Street in Washington, where he had his office as an AEC Commissioner, to 1717 Massachusetts Ave., N.W., the headquarters of Associated Universities, Inc., where he is completing his first day as the new President of AUI.

The announcement of the change was made in mid-March, but at that time it was not known just what the effective date would be.

Dr. Tape replaces Dr. T. Keith Glennan, who resigned last year for health and personal reasons. Since Dr. Glennan's resignation, Dr. Frank Long served as interim president until today. Dr. Long is Chairman of the Board of Trustees of AUI and Vice-President for Research and Advanced Studies of Cornell University.

AEC Chairman Glenn T. Seaborg stated that, "I want to congratulate my colleague and friend, Commissioner Gerald F. Tape, on his election as President of AUI. But, in another sense, we shall be sorry to see him leave the Commission... He will be sorely missed."

This sentiment has been echoed by many individuals in the AEC who know and have worked with Dr. Tape over the years since his initial appointment by President J.F. Kennedy.

Speaking for AUI at the March press conference, Dr. Long stated that "It is a source of great satisfaction that someone who has been part of our organization has come back." Prior to joining the AEC, Tape was at BNL as Deputy Director and as Acting Director for a time.

In addition to operating BNL, AUI also operates the National Radio Astronomy Observatory for the National Science Foundation. The NRAO has facilities at Green Bank, West Virginia; Charlottesville, Virginia; and Kitt Peak, Arizona.

New Procedure Starts For Real Estate Ads

In order to insure that all offerings of housing for sale or rent, and other real estate, listed in the Lab paper are available without regard to race, creed, color or national origin, a special form for Real Estate ads will be used. The Real Estate Ad form will be available only at the office of the Brookhaven Bulletin, Room 112, 40 Brookhaven Avenue. The regular Bulletin ad form cannot be used for real estate.

A recent incident of housing discrimination occurred because of an ad in the Bulletin that was placed by an employee for a non-employee friend. (Placement of such an ad is against the Classified Ad Policy No. 2 which states "All items for sale or rent must be the advertiser's property.") The employee signed the nondiscrimination clause of the ad blank, without consulting his friend, the owner of the property. Another non-employee saw the ad, answered it, and an apparent case of discrimination developed.

In order to avoid incidents of a similar nature from occurring again, it is mandatory that employees adhere to all of the rules concerning classified ads, as stated on the Real Estate ad form as well as those on the regular ad form that is printed in each issue of the *Brookhaven Bulletin*.

Do You Have Your H.S. Diploma?

Preparation courses leading to a New York State High School Equivalency Diploma were offered last year to BNL employees.

Gypsy Cast In Final Stages Of Rehearsal





Message From Mayaguez

Editor's Note: Jack Chernick is Head of the Reactor Theory Division, Department of Applied Science on Professional Leave of Absence in Mayaguez, Puerto Rico.

Many of our BNL friends are curious about our 6-month sabbatical at the Puerto Rico Nuclear Center in Mayaguez. Others have taken our invitation to come down and see for themselves and now know a great deal more about this burgeoning U.S. Commonwealth.

The Puerto Rico Nuclear Center is a joint USAEC-University of Puerto Rico institute with branches at Rio Piedras, San Juan on the northeast coast and in Mayaguez on the West Coast. Although each Center has the same Divisions (Chemistry, Physics, Biology and Engineering), one might characterize the research work at Rio Piedras as hospital oriented while that at Mayaguez is reactor oriented. All appointments are held jointly with the Center and the University. Staff members teach graduate courses at the University as well as carry out research work with their students at the Center.

The Nuclear Center at Mayaguez is well equipped for teaching and research with neutrons and gamma rays, reactors and radioisotopes. Vigorous research work is carried out in radiochemistry, radiation biochemistry and marine ecology. Its nuclear facilities include a water boiler reactor, an exponential assembly, a 1 MW swimming pool reactor, a pulsed neutron generator, neutron spectrometers and a multi-channel analyzer. Its swimming pool reactor will shortly be replaced by an advanced 2 MW TRIGA with pulsing capability and long-lived fuel elements.

The Center itself sits in a lovely sub-tropical setting across the road from the University and its adjacent Puerto Rico Agricultural Station, a fine, tropical botanical garden.

Puerto Rico is a fascinating Caribbean island, almost as long and twice as wide as Long Island. Lots of beaches, hills, palm trees, coconuts, bananas, humming birds, hibiscus, dogs and lizards. During the past two decades its Commonwealth status and large injections of U.S. dollars have awakened it from a malaria-ridden, single crop (sugar cane) economy. San Juan is now like Miami (with casinos) and Ponce like San Francisco (with old Spanish families, culture and hills), Mayaguez, its third city, is now reaping the benefits of large urbanizations (housing projects), hospitals and schools, and its surrounding hills are rapidly being filled with expensive homes and condominiums.

Friends who have visited found Mayaguez a fine base for vacation hobbies whether boating or fishing, swimming in the quiet bay at Boqueron, surfing at Rincon, or skin diving off the reefs at Parguera. Others found the Mayaguez-Hilton Hotel with its fine pool (and casino) more restful for a winter vacation than hectic San Juan.

My family and I have enjoyed our stay here, the opportunity for quiet work and recreation, the friendly people, our new friends and acquaintances. Still we are eagerly looking forward to coming home soon to Long Island and its more hectic activities. Jack Chernick

Formaldehyde Found in Space

Astrophysicists working with the 140-foot radio telescope at the National Radio Astronomy Observatory in Greenbank, West Virginia, have found that formaldehyde is widely distributed in the clouds of dust and gases that exist in interstellar space. The discovery intensifies recent speculation about the connection between the contents of these clouds and the origin of life on earth.

In the March 31 issue of *Physical Review Letters*, the radio astronomy team reports that 15 of 23 sources they surveyed showed a radio line that is characteristic of formaldehyde. This substance, which is widely used as a preservative, is composed of two hydrogen atoms and an oxygen atom bonded to carbon and is the most complex molecule ever discovered in space.

Authors of the report, Drs. Lewis E. Snyder and David Buhl of NRAO, Dr. Benjamin Zuckerman of the University of Maryland, and Dr. Patrick Palmer of the University of Chicago, say that the "widespread distribution indicates that processes of interstellar chemical evolution may be much more complex than previously assumed."

Formaldehyde is the third molecule that has been discovered in space within the past four months that scientists believe may play some role in the origin of planetary life.


Tenting On The Old Camp Ground

Harpichordist To Perform At BNL

Igor Kipnis, harpichordist, will perform at the last BERA Concert of the season at Berkner Hall, on Thursday, May 8.

Son of the Metropolitan Opera basso Alexander Kipnis, Igor Kipnis has been associated with music since his boyhood. He studied at the Westport School of Music and at Harvard University, from which he graduated in 1952. It was at Harvard that he became fascinated by the harpichord and the music of the Baroque period. He subsequently made an extensive study of the Renaissance and Baroque styles under Thurston Dart, among others.

Mr. Kipnis made his debut as a harpichordist in 1959. His first New York solo recital followed in 1961 at the New York Historical Society. Since that time he has appeared in concert and lecture recital



throughout the U.S. and Europe, and has performed with the Boston Symphony, the Symphony of the Air, the Brooklyn Philharmonic and many other orchestras. He has appeared with Erich Leinsdorf, Charles Munch, Seiji Ozawa, Alfred Wallenstein and Leopold Stokowski. Recording extensively for Epic, Columbia, Vanguard, Decca and others, he is currently engaged in a recording project for CBS featuring the harpichord music of different countries. He has also recorded the Mozart K. 271 and the Haydn D Major and a group of Bach.

During the summers of 1964 through 1967, Mr. Kipnis served as Chairman of the Baroque Department at the Berkshire Music Center (Tanglewood) at Lenox, Massachusetts, where he supervised the preparation of Baroque concerts by the members of the Berkshire Music Center Performance Department. He is currently an affiliated member of the faculty of music at Temple University in Philadelphia.

He is also an active critic and writer on musical subjects, reviewing for the New York Herald-Tribune, the New York Post, the Musical Courier and Listen. He is a contributing editor and reviewer for Hi-Fi/Stereo Review.

In the 1967-68 season, Igor Kipnis toured Europe extensively, and immediately on his return he toured the U.S. coast to coast. He appeared in Bogota, Colombia in August of 1968, his first Latin American performance, and in the spring of 1969, he made his second European tour.

The performance on May 8 will include Zipoli's "Suite No. 2 in g minor," Johann Joseph Fux's "Ciaccona in D. major," Tomkins' "Pavan in a minor," Bach's "Chromatic Fantasy and Fugue in d minor," Soler's "Fandango," "Les Fastes de la grande, et Ancienne-Mxxnxtrxxndxxs" by Francis Couperin.

Mr. Kipnis uses a "Rutowski-Robinette" harpichord.

The concert will begin promptly at 8:30 p.m.
