



## Nuclear Safeguards Subject of Lecture

The 85th BNL Lecture will be given by Dr. Herbert Kouts of the Department of Applied Science on June 11. The lecture will be entitled "Limiting the Nuclear Club."

This lecture will be based on one of the newer aspects of life at Brookhaven, which is the provision of technical advice and assistance to the Atomic Energy Commission in connection with nuclear nonproliferation and safeguarding against unauthorized use of fissionable material. The subject will be discussed in the context of developments toward control of nuclear weapons as these have taken place since the second World War.

Dr. Kouts was born in Bisbee, Arizona. He graduated from Louisiana State University, at Baton Rouge, Louisiana, in 1941. After wartime service with the U.S. Air Force, on technical and operational aspects of airborne radar equipment, he returned to graduate study in physics. He received an MS in physics at Louisiana State in 1946, and a PhD at Princeton University in 1952.

Dr. Kouts joined the staff of BNL in 1950, to do research on radiation shielding. He became Assistant Group Leader of the Shielding Group in 1951. In that year he formed a group to begin subcritical experimental studies of the neutronic properties of lattices of slightly enriched uranium rods in light water, a subject of interest for the design of electricity-producing power reactors. This experimental program received increasingly heavy emphasis by the AEC as the interest in development of nuclear power plants grew. The nuclear power plants that are now being built in large numbers in this country are of the water lattice type. For this research, Dr. Kouts was awarded the E. O. Lawrence Award of the AEC in 1964.

He is at present head of the Technical Support Organization, which is a Division of the Department of Applied Science, furnishing technical assistance to the AEC on safeguards.


Kouts is a Fellow of the American Nuclear Society, and a member of Sigma Xi. He is a member of the Mayor's Advisory Committee on Radiation of the City of New York, and is Chairman of the Nuclear Advisory Committee for the New York Museum of Science.

The lecture will be held in Berkner Hall, beginning at 8 p.m.

Louis G. Stang (DAS) has been voted the American Nuclear Society Distinguished Service Award for his service as Editor of NUCLEAR APPLICATIONS since its inception in February 1965. This award will be conferred at the forthcoming Seattle Annual Meeting.

## BNL Host To Science Writers

On Monday and Tuesday of next week, BNL will host ATOMEDIC '69, the first of what is hoped will be an annual AEC affair.

Sponsored by the Atomic Energy Commission and the National Association of Science Writers, ATOMEDIC '69 will bring especially invited science writers up-to-the-minute on a variety of medical subjects in which nuclear energy plays an important role. Several BNL speakers are included.

On Monday evening there will be a reception and dinner at which AEC Commissioner W.E. Johnson will speak on the subject "A Spoonful of Science." The evening program will also be in honor of the President of the Greek Atomic Energy Commission and his party plus the AEC Budget Review Committee, which will be at BNL at the time.

The ATOMEDIC '69 seminar will get underway Monday morning with a short welcome from Dr. Maurice Goldhaber on behalf of BNL, and Dr. John Totter, Director of the Division of Biology and Medicine, on behalf of the AEC. Following the brief welcoming remarks, Dr. Alexander Gottschalk of the Argonne Cancer Research Hospital will speak on "New Ways to Diagnose Disease." He will be followed by Dr. George C. Cotzias of BNL's Medical Research Center on "New Therapeutic Approaches to Neurological Disease."

Monday afternoon will be devoted to a panel discussion entitled "Immuno Suppression and Transplants," with Dr. Charles Congdon of Oak Ridge National Laboratory discussing Bone Marrow Transplants; Dr. Eugene Cronkite of BNL (Director, Medical Research Center) explaining the use of Extra-Corporeal Irradiation (ECIB and ECIL) for Immuno-Suppression; and Dr. David Hume of the Medical College of Virginia discussing Portable Extra-Corporeal Irradiation and Kidney Transplants.

Tuesday morning's session will get started with Dr. Takashi Makinodan of Oak Ridge National Laboratory speaking on "Immunity and Aging." He will be followed by Dr. James D. Regan of ORNL on "Nutritional Needs of Cancer Cells - A New Approach to Cancer Therapy."

Following lunch, Dr. Norman Anderson of ORNL will speak on "Bio-Engineering and the Molecular Anatomy Program." He will include a description of the zonal centrifuge which is capable of producing extremely pure serums. The seminar will conclude with Dr. Victor P. Bond of BNL (Associate Director for Life Sciences) speaking on the "Prospects for the Future." External neutrons, Californium-252, and Pi-mesons in radiotherapy will be covered in his discussion.

Many of the science writers are planning on staying over to tour the Laboratory on Wednesday, and possibly conduct interviews with individuals.

ATOMEDIC '69 is open only to invited science writers, who will be attending from many parts of the country.



**Da Vinci Exhibit At Berkner Hall**

More than twenty models of the inventions of Leonardo da Vinci will be on view for two weeks starting tomorrow in the lobby of Berkner Hall. On loan from the IBM Corporation, and brought to Brookhaven by the BERA Art Committee, the exhibition demonstrates vividly the extraordinary historical precocity of Leonardo as scientist and inventor. Through numerous reproductions from Leonardo's notebooks as well as through the models, the show evokes the revolutionary and enigmatic character of the prototypical Renaissance Man.

The models in the show include scientific instruments, military devices, a printing press, designs for the hull of a ship (which Leonardo developed from his study of fish forms) and a number of objects related to his fascination with the possibility of human flights. All of the models are based on sketches and descriptions in the artist's notebooks and many of the most beautiful and interesting of these sketches are reproduced on panels in the show and in the catalogue.

George Sarton wrote that Leonardo's "outstanding merit is to have shown by his own example that the pursuit of beauty and the pursuit of truth are not incompatible." In the show this interaction between the artist and the scientist, the anatomist and the painter of the Mona Lisa, the investigator of the mechanics of flight and the man who bought birds in the market

place to set them free, can be appreciated. And one can wonder at the beautiful and practical machines of war designed by the artist who was called "that bestial madness." But despite the contradictions, one finds in the inquiring and creative imagination of Leonardo a significant insight into the common basis of art, science and technology.

The exhibition will be open daily during the week from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

**Summer Program Set**



## Gypsy — A Critical Review

Skeptical curiosity would have been a charitable description of my state of mind at certain time on May 24, for the final performance of BERA Theatre Group's Gypsy. The technical and artistic demands of this musical memoir could defeat all but the most determined of directors, the most devoted of cast and crews. Clearly Jerry Friedman is that most determined director and he had such a cast and crew — an unbeatable combination!

Though not overly addicted to the musical comedy form, which too often caters to drowsy intellectuals and soggy imaginations, I feel Gypsy was a wise choice for BERA, avoiding as it does, the typical gratuitous routines and set numbers.

The producers, Don Koenig and Florence Counadis; the choreographer, Rebecca Yamin; and the musical director, Kathleen Jones, should be most highly praised for realizing — with their hardworking staffs and crews — Mr. Friedman's almost 'impossible dream.'

The last performance was polished and very professional. Pat Towey, whom I last saw several dozen pounds ago in Hotel Paradiso, is in her element as Mama Rose, a role she can't help thinking was written with Pat in mind. Barbara Strohm, a most appealing Louise, is utterly convincing in her lightning transformation into the seductive siren, Gypsy. I was somewhat uncomfortable with Denise Norden's portrayal of June, though she admittedly looked the part to a 'T.' Charlie Meinhold was exactly right as the lovable and ineffectual Herbie.


The size of the cast makes it impossible to do more than mention outstanding performances. The three strippers, Anna Passell, Hennie Rogers, and Marie Garafola, did a marvelously assured job of 'You Gotta Have a Gimmick,' and the numerous young people exhibited a well-trained dexterity in the show numbers; Eddie Findling was particularly adept as Tulsa. Robert Kinsey, George Counadis, George Cox, Dan Hooper, and Bob Marr demonstrated creditable versatility in a variety of parts each, and Charlie Zavesky captured in a moment the essence of all 'Cigars.'

Costumes and make-up first to last were brilliant; the showgirls were simply dazzling in the Christmas-tree scene. The lighting effects and property management were excellent, markedly enhancing the effectiveness of the 2-dimensional painted drops used in the vaudeville-stage scenes.

The technical crews were as accomplished in their functions as the actors on stage, the whole complex running with admirable speed and smoothness. The vitality that characterized the show was sustained right to the poignant end when Rose finally gets her turn to 'sock it to us.' I was sorry when the orchestra occasionally 'covered' lyrics, but it must be nearly impossible not to confuse spirit with volume.

Unquestionably Gypsy deserves to be seen again. I find it intolerable to contemplate the vast expenditure of time, energy, money, and talent for so short a run. What a shame that Long Island cannot supply audiences for five or six weekends at least. I, for one, can think of a great many moments I would relish seeing a second time. Stay, Gypsy! —Penny Morris
