## Former Interior Secretary Udall 10th AUI Speaker

Stewart L. Udall, 37th Secretary of the Interior under Presidents Kennedy and Johnson, will be the 10th AUI Distinguished Lecturer at BNL on Wednesday, November 12.

Since January, 1969, after a change in administration, Udall has been Chairman of The *Overview* Group, an international consulting firm working for government and industry to create a better environment for man.

According to Udall, "This is a logical and natural extension of and expansion upon the total environmental concerns..." which he had developed during his tenure as Secretary. *Overview* brings together multi-disciplinary teams possessed of the specialist insights and generalist capacities essential to total planning.

As an integral part of all projects on which it works, *Overview* builds in economically, socially, and politically viable action programs. "The emphasis is not on paper plans or futuristic studies, but on the now, on the practical political implementation of concepts, plans, and projects."

In his first book, *The Quiet Crisis*, Mr. Udall outlined the land and people story of our nation, advancing the "proposition that men must grasp completely the relationship between human stewardship and fullness of the American earth."

But as the nation increasingly faced problems of pollution, of racial discord and urban decay, Mr. Udall evolved a "new conservation" whose subject was man himself. In his second book, *1976: Agenda for Tomorrow*, Mr. Udall said: "I came to see that the total environment

approach demanded concepts large enough to relate conservation to the overriding issues of our age. You cannot save the land unless you save the people. True conservation begins wherever the people are and with whatever trouble they are in."

"There is a value revolution upon us, and we realize, as never before, that houses alone do not make communities, that private wheels are no substitute for superior mass transportation systems, and that what's in the freight cars must serve man's needs - not merely demonstrate his capacity to fill up cubic space. In short, the value revolution has to do with the quality of - not the quantities in - life."

On the personal side, Mr. Udall is an avid reader and an equally avid outdoorsman. He has entertained the Soviet poet, Yevtushenko, in his home; he arranged for Robert Frost to read from his own poetry at the Inaugural of President Kennedy, and later Frost accompanied Udall on a trip to Russia. Udall brought live theatre back to Ford's Theatre after a silence of more than a century. He has

## Stereo Moon Pictures Displayed Next Week

Unusual stereo pictures of the surface of the moon taken by Apollo 11 astronauts will be shown in the Conference Center on Thursday and Friday of next week.

The pictures, taken on a special stereo camera conceived by AUI Trustee Thomas Gold, show a small portion of the lunar surface in great detail. Colors, shapes and composition of the soil are quite unusual and are entirely dissimilar to anything seen on earth.

The stereo pictures will be projected on a screen and can be viewed with special polaroid glasses to see them in full color. Present plans are to set up the screen and viewing glasses in the center room of the meeting rooms near Berkner Hall. All who have seen the pictures so far have been enthusiastically impressed with the stark beauty of the lunar landscape.


## UN Birthday Celebrated Here
