



1969 Year-End Statement By AEC Chairman Glenn Seaborg

Putting nuclear energy to work on the moon highlighted 1969 for the Atomic Energy Commission.

An isotope-fueled heater for a seismometer experiment was placed in operation on the lunar surface by Apollo 11 astronauts, and Snap-27, a nuclear generator, is the sole source of electric power for instruments left on the moon by Apollo 12. These historic accomplishments are forerunners of larger nuclear space applications to come.

Snap-27 has endured the extreme temperatures of the moon and continues to produce in excess of 70 watts of electricity. Another Snap-27 atomic battery will perform a similar job on the Apollo 13 moon flight in 1970.

Last April NASA launched the weather satellite Nimbus B2 carrying two nuclear generators. It was the first civilian use of nuclear energy in space. In June, AEC and NASA conducted the first full power run for the NERVA experimental engine. The 50,000-pound-thrust trial, under simulated altitude conditions, was the last in the present series of tests to obtain data for developing a nuclear engine for flight.

Major medical accomplishments during 1969 included the successful implantation of nuclear powered heart assist devices in

dogs as a preliminary study to human application, and success in experiments by Brookhaven National Laboratory and Department of Agriculture scientists in which mice were protected against foot-and-mouth disease through stimulation of their natural virus-fighting defense by injections of synthetic, double-stranded RNA (Ribonucleic acid).

AEC's Argonne National Laboratory, working with the National Institutes of Health, made solid progress in efforts to develop a small, inexpensive artificial kidney for the patient to use at home. A testing program for prototypes has been set up.

Discovery of Element 104

The positive discovery of three isotopes of element 104 was reported by scientists at the Lawrence Radiation Laboratory which is operated for AEC by the University of California at Berkeley.

Added emphasis was placed on environmental and pollution control studies during 1969. New studies include development of a nuclear analysis of oil slicks to identify shippers who pollute waterways, isotopic radiation to increase the destruction of bacteria in sewage wastewater, and the use of isotopic tracers to track atmospheric sulphur pollutants from fossil fuel plants.

To these can be added such diverse accomplishments as operation of an experimental traffic sign in Arizona illuminated by a self-contained, longlived radioactive source; and the return to the U.S. Treasury from Oak Ridge, Tennessee, of the last of \$400 million worth (14,700 tons) of silver

borrowed during World War II to substitute for scarce copper in electrical conductors in a vital production process of the Manhattan Project.

Expanded Information Program

Nuclear Energy, especially in the area of power plants, experienced protest along with progress in 1969. Concern was voiced over possible environmental effects of nuclear power plants. It became more apparent that there was still a lack of understanding of nuclear energy within a large segment of the public and that fear of the atom, because of its introduction in a weapon, was still a factor in resistance to its peaceful applications. The Commission is working to increase public understanding of nuclear power through forums, public debate and an expanded educational program.

The number of new nuclear plants ordered in the U.S. dropped in 1969 following a trend begun the previous year. Seventeen units totaling nearly 16 million kilowatts were ordered in 1968 and only six units totaling six million kilowatts in 1969. Public concern was a factor but the setbacks were caused primarily by rising costs and construction delays. The Commission forecast of a 150 million kilowatt production capacity for U.S. nuclear plants by 1980 has not changed.

Meanwhile, the breeder reactor technology has developed to the point where we can predict that transition to large commercial breeders - which make more fuel than they consume - will begin in the mid-

1980's. This reactor is the key to fulfilling expanding energy demands for a growing population by furnishing an abundance of cheap, clean electrical power. Contracts are being negotiated with three firms which will compile preliminary construction and operation data for a demonstration plant in AEC's liquid metal fast breeder reactor program.

Plan For Sale of Plants

Of major significance to the nuclear industry was President Nixon's request that the AEC begin operating its three gaseous diffusion plants in a manner more closely approaching a commercial enterprise. The President said this plan was to prepare for eventual sale of the plants to private industry, ending a government monopoly in uranium enrichment. AEC is now preparing to operate the plants under a directorate which will maintain separate accounting records and publish financial reports similar to those of commercial enterprises, to provide a basis for negotiating the future sale of the plants.

The year also saw a rapid expansion of the AEC's toll enrichment program, which began January 1. The service, performed in the gaseous diffusion plants, is part of a transition from the government to private ownership of nuclear material. Under the program the customer furnishes uranium feed material and pays an enriching charge to AEC, receiving enriched uranium in return as fuel for nuclear power plants. Nearly \$1 billion in toll enrichment contracts were signed during the year.

Medical Insurance For Dependent Students

Children of Laboratory employees are regularly covered under the employee's Family Medical Insurance Plan until the December 31st following their nineteenth birthday. Dependent Student Coverage is available for a child over age nineteen provided he is attending school on a full time basis and provided the employee applies for the coverage.

If there is a full time student in your family who will reach age 19 this year, be sure to apply for Dependent Student Coverage on his behalf as soon as possible. There is no additional premium required to obtain this coverage.

Gifts and Prizes

The holidays have been fabulous – you've won a Nobel prize (\$50,000), the New York State Lottery (\$100,000), and you've received a gift of \$75,000 from your in-laws. Are you \$225,000 richer? The answer is no. Your new found wealth will be shared with the federal and state governments.

The Nobel prize is tax exempt because the prize is made in recognition of scientific, educational, literary or civic achievement and the recipient is selected, without any action on his part.

The New York State Lottery is taxable as ordinary income. This prize, unlike the Nobel prize, is similar to wagering and requires the recipient or someone else to take specific actions in order to win the prize. In the case of non-cash prizes, the amount subject to tax is the "fair market value" of the prize.

The gift is not taxable to the recipient. Gifts, while tax exempt to the recipient, are taxable to the donor. Each individual donor is exempted from gift taxes to the extent of \$3,000 per gift per individual recipient per year, and in addition, each donor has a "lifetime" exemption of \$30,000. In the example cited, assuming the donors had never used their lifetime exemptions, they would pay a tax on \$9,000 (\$75,000 less \$30,000 lifetime exemption for each donor and less the \$3,000 exclusion for each donor).

All in all our lucky winner is truly a winner. As we hope all of you will be in 1970. Happy New Year!
