

Fire Fighting Foam

Fire Safety Week Marks Anniversary Of Chicago Fire

The week beginning October 4, 1970 has been proclaimed "Fire Prevention Week" by the President of the United States, commemorating the Great Chicago Fire of 1871, which killed 250 people and destroyed 17,430 buildings at a cost of \$168,000,000.

The constant threat of fire hangs over all laboratory operations, regardless of size or location. In just a matter of seconds, given the proper conditions, a small spark can mushroom into a full-scale blaze bringing injury or death to employees, destruction of property, and the loss of many years of work. Prevention of fire is a continuous, serious concern of BNL.

The nature of the Laboratory's research program often requires the conduct of experiments and the use of a combination of materials which are inherently hazardous, unless the most stringent precautions are followed.

Every week at the Laboratory must therefore be "Fire Prevention Week."

Historically, accidental fires in laboratories most often occur from the following sources:

- Spillage and ignition of flammable liquids
- Accidental release and ignition of flammable gases
- Mixing of incompatible chemicals and spontaneous ignition of materials
- Improperly used or defective electric ovens, heating devices, electric motors and equipment
- Open flame devices coming in contact with combustible materials
- "Rube Goldberg" repairs and alteration to equipment
- Combustion of trash can materials

Fortunately, Brookhaven's fire loss record has been extremely favorable. In an effort to maintain this favorable record in spite of higher concentrations of values and greater loss potentials, increased attention within the last year has been directed to fire protection at the Laboratory. New and supplementary fire protection systems are being provided for many BNL facilities. These new systems, combined with the continued vigilance by members of the staff in avoiding fire producing situations in their every-day work, should continue the Laboratory's fine record.

Telephone Girls Handle Thousands Of Calls Each Day

The staff of telephone operators is a service group with which everyone at BNL comes into contact. These Brookhaven employees perform a difficult, and sometimes hectic, job cheerfully and efficiently. The BNL switchboard handles a total of approximately 3000 to 3500 calls each day. The hours of 10 a.m. to 12 noon and 2 to 4 p.m. are the busiest of the day for the switchboard and the operators. Since employees can dial from one extension to another within the Laboratory, the bulk of calls handled by the operators are incoming and outgoing off-site calls, information and service calls.

The BNL switchboard is a 4-position multiple dial system. This means that four operators can be on duty at the same time. The word "multiple" refers to the fact that each operator can answer calls from any of the extensions in the Laboratory and receive calls from any of the incoming trunk lines.

The BNL switchboard is in service 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. There are regularly 4 operators on duty during the busy weekday regular work hours. During the early morning hours and on weekends, when there are far fewer calls, usually only one operator is on duty. Telephone information requests are referred to Extension 400. In the evenings and on weekends, however, the operators perform information duties and handle transportation requests for conference visitors. They also receive and send out telegrams during these hours.

Although many of the calls which the operator handles each day are routine, some of them are quite challenging. Approximately 30 overseas calls are placed each month. From time to time conference calls are set up whereby people on up to four Laboratory extensions may talk to an off-site party.

Many of the operators' duties require their full attention for several minutes. For example, it is sometimes difficult to locate people for whom there is an incoming call. This is especially true in the case of guests and visitors at BNL. Each personal call requires the operator to record detailed information on a toll ticket.

When the operator is on duty alone, or when many calls come in at the same time, as frequently happens during the busy work hours, hectic situations may develop. This is particularly true when emergencies, such as snowstorms, arise and the switchboard is deluged with calls. Patience and courtesy, (continued on page 2)

Ornithological Note

What is probably the rarest addition to the avifauna of BNL was observed this past Monday, September 28, just to the east of the Biology Department greenhouses. In the area between the fenced-in corn field and the greenhouses Dennis Puleston and Dan Schaeffer identified a Wheatear, our only bird with a white rump and black inverted T on the tail.

This bird, brown above and buff below, is a relatively new arrival in the Western Hemisphere. It breeds in Greenland and farther west in the Arctic. Each fall it migrates across the North Atlantic and through Europe to winter in Africa. What it was doing here, way off course, is an interesting subject for speculation.

Shoreham Hearings Start With Bang And End Low Key

The long-awaited hearings on the permit to construct a nuclear power plant in Shoreham started last Monday with a full audience and several sensational announcements.

As the week-long session progressed, the audience dwindled, and the proceedings slowed down to tedious statements and detailed cross examinations delivered in a hot, airless auditorium at the Rocky Point School.

On Friday, the hearings were recessed for an indefinite period, probably to resume "late in October," according to Jack Campbell, charman.

While the first session of the hearings was attended by politicians and taxpayers as well as proponents and opponents of nuclear power, the closing sessions were mainly witnessed by technical experts and representatives of intervenors who heard volumes of formal testimony supported by mountains of paperwork submitted by interested parties.

Testimony from the hearings was developed at the rate of about 250 pages of typewritten copy each day, and has been available to the public at the rate of \$2.50 per page. Those who are formal parties to the hearings are given copies of the testimony of the previous day before the start of the next day's hearings.

With the addition of three new intervenors, it is expected that when the hearings reconvene in October, proceedings will liven up once again.
