## Relief In Sight

According to officials of the NY State Department of Transportation, the last link of the Long Island Expressway will soon be opened.

## International Science Fair Winners Go To Argonne

Ten high school science students have won Atomic Energy Commission Special Awards for their outstanding nuclear-related exhibits in the 21st International Science Fair at Baltimore, Maryland.

Each received an AEC Certificate of Achievement on Friday, May 15 at the Special Awards Convocation which, with the awards banquet, climaxed the week-long fair in Baltimore Civic Center.

With the AEC certificate goes an invitation for each winner and his science teacher to attend an expense-paid "Nuclear Research Orientation Week" in mid-August at the Commission's Argonne National Laboratory near Chicago. Ten other student exhibitors, who won honorable mention and certificates, will be alternates for the Argonne study tour if any winners are unable to attend.

Dr. Paul W. McDaniel, Director of the AEC's Division of Research, presented the certificates. The AEC Special Award winners and the project upon which they based their exhibits are:

Caruthers, 16, Jr., Grandview Senior High School, Grandview, Missouri - Mechanism of Electrical Dis-

charge in Gases; David S. Adams, 16, Sr., Miami High School, Miami, Oklahoma - Exploring Subnuclear Physics; Christopher R. Ellis, 15, Soph., Upper Dublin Senior High School, Ft. Washington, Pennsylvania - Light Production by Euglena; John W. Amuedo, 17, Jr., Ross Sterling Senior High School, Houston, Texas - Anti-Polar Particle Acceleration Theory; Robert Bismuth, 16, Jr., Sir Winston Churchill Secondary School, St. Catharines, Ontario, Canada - Linac IV: Probing the Nucleus; George A. Zdasiuk, 18, Sr., Silverthorn Collegiate School, Toronto, Canada - Plasma Physics.

Exhibits were evaluated by 12 judges selected from the AEC Headquarters and other AEC offices and installations in the U.S. atomic energy program. Each winner was determined by the scientific excellence of his project and its relationship to nuclear science, the effectiveness of the exhibit in providing information to the general public, and knowledge of relevant nuclear science displayed by the exhibitor during interviews with the judges. Serving on the judging panel from BNL were: Dr. Eugene Cronkite, Chairman of the Medical Department; Dr. Harold Siegelman, Chairman of the Biology Department; Dr. John Blewett, Deputy Chairman of the Accelerator Department; and Norbert Dernbach, Public Relations Officer.

The orientation week at Argonne will be held August 14 through 21. It includes tours of all unclassified research facilities, conferences with scientists who are working in the visitors' special fields of interest, and experimental work in the instructional laboratories of Argonne's Institute of Nuclear Science and Engineering.

## Electron Microscope Photographs Atom

Dr. Albert Crewe, speaker at the Atomedic '70 conference being held at BNL, will describe on Thursday morning, how he and other scientists at the University of Chicago have photographed a single atom of Uranium and Thorium by using a new technique.

Using a scanning electron microscope designed and built by Crewe, the University scientists saw and photographed single uranium and thorium atoms set in molecular chains and magnified a million times.

Professor Crewe is in the University's Department of Physics in the Enrico Fermi Institute and was formerly director of the AEC's Argonne (Illinois) National Laboratory.

Crewe's electron microscope provides both high contrast and high resolution. He accomplished the imaging of single atoms within a molecular chain with the help of two graduate students, Joseph Wall and John Langmore.

Crewe said the ability to see individual atoms within molecules should greatly enhance research in many fields, especially medicine, biochemistry and genetics. He said the technique would be particularly valuable in analyzing chromosomes and cancer cells.

Commenting further on the technique's impact, Crewe said: "The ability to see the atom, even of high atomic numbers, will certainly enlarge the scope of biochemistry and molecular biology because many chemical techniques have been established whereby foreign atoms can be introduced at known sites in complex molecules.

"The ability to see such atoms may make it possible to determine shapes of molecules and their relationships. In addition, the chemistry of this technique could be examined more closely if the atoms could be seen and the precision of atomic locations and the degree of reaction could be studied."

Atoms, the basic unit of all elements, measure about 5 angstroms, or 5 billionths of a centimeter, in diameter.

Because atoms are smaller than the wave length of visible light it is impossible to reveal them with an optical microscope, no matter how powerful it may be. Although individual atoms have been imaged by the field ion microscope, until now there has been no way to view single atoms within a molecular structure.

Since the microscope's resolving power is 5 angstroms, Crewe and his team decided "to construct various molecules containing heavy atoms whose spacing was greater than 5 angstroms, to insure that the expected geometrical arrangement could be achieved and measure the visibility factor . . . by visual observation of the signals from the detectors on an oscilloscope."

Dr. Crewe credits Michael Beer, professor of biophysics at the Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore, Maryland, and A.K. Kleinschmidt, professor of biochemistry at the New York University Medical Center, New York City, for devising the chemical preparation techniques necessary for placing single heavy atoms in molecules so that these atoms could be distinctly imaged.

In one experiment, two uranium atoms were placed on each side of a long organic molecule. In the second experiment, thorium atoms were incorporated in a long chain of organic molecules. In each case, the atoms were placed on a carbon film 20 angstroms thick.

The result, Crewe's team reports, is the appearance on the oscilloscope of pairs of dots corresponding to pairs of uranium atoms. In the thorium experiment, the oscilloscope revealed teams of dots.


These bright dots on the oscilloscope were close to the calculated visibility factor and "within reasonable error limits," the researchers report in the *Science* article. This expected visibility factor was initial evidence that the spots were single atoms.

Furthermore, Crewe's team report, "the geometrical arrangement of the bright spots corresponds to the expected one."
