





Nine Week Strike Ends

At a meeting of the IBEW Local 2230 attended by more than 450 members, a contract was ratified last Monday night bringing to an end a nine-week work stoppage that involved 550 union members.

The strike, which started on July 1, was over when pickets at the main gate to the Laboratory laid aside their signs after hearing the results of the ratification vote from members who attended the meeting.

On Tuesday morning when non-striking employees arrived at the main gate, the police van which had been assigned since the beginning of the strike had left, and the familiar bouquet of flowers placed each day by the strikers was missing.

The only evidences of the long labor dispute were the construction trailer used by IBEW members as a temporary shelter, and a trash barrel filled with empty coffee containers and strike placards.

On Tuesday afternoon a contingent of Union members cleaned and raked the area used for a parking and assembly place, and prepared the trailer for removal.

Smiles were the order for the day on the faces of all employees, strikers and non-strikers.

When he took the sign off his chest and placed it in a trash can, one of the strikers echoed the sentiments of all - "Thank God it's over!"

IBEW Settlement

The new labor agreement, ratified by a vote of 331 to 125, is effective as of July 1, 1971, and will continue for 12 months until June 30, 1972. However, President Nixon's wage-price freeze prohibits the Laboratory from paying wages in excess of those that were being paid prior to the freeze. Therefore, Union members will return to work at the wage rates that were in effect June 30, 1971, and these rates will continue until the freeze is lifted on or after November 12, 1971. At that time, IBEW members will receive a 6 1/2% wage increase.

Issues involving "Exhibit B", which deals with the jurisdictional delineation between bargaining unit and non-bargaining unit work, were resolved by clarifying existing practices in the assignment of such work.

In addition to the above, the following changes were agreed to:

- One holiday has been added, to increase the total number of annual holidays from 10 1/2 to 11 1/2. In 1971, this holiday will be divided into two parts. One-half day will be added to the half holiday already scheduled on the last working day before Christmas, and the other half day will be observed on the last working day before New Year's Day.
- The retirement plan will be changed in 1972 to include a lump-sum payout option upon retirement at age 55 or later. If TIAA-CREF makes an anticipated change in its present rules, the payout can be 10% of the total accumulation. Otherwise, the payout will be limited to 10% of accumulations resulting from contributions made after July 1972 to an alternate plan.

- Employees will be given the option of reducing their contributions to the Laboratory's retirement plan. The Laboratory's 10% contribution to the retirement plan will remain unchanged, and employees who elect to reduce their contributions will receive reduced retirement benefits. Employees now contribute 5% of base salary over the Social Security base, which is \$7,800 at present and will go to \$9,000 on January 1, 1972. Effective January 1, 1972, employees will be required to contribute 2 1/2% on the excess of base salary from \$9,000 to \$12,000, and 5% of their base salary in excess of \$12,000. On January 1, 1973, the required contribution will be 5% of the excess of base salary over \$12,000 (or over the Social Security base if this is higher than \$12,000).

- Certain changes in the basic medical insurance plan will become effective January 1, 1972. Coverage for hospital room, board, and essential services and supplies will be increased to a maximum of 365 days. In addition, the allowance for diagnostic x-rays and tests will be increased to \$150.

In the past, benefits extended to one group of employees have been offered to all employees. In keeping with this practice, the above four improvements will be extended to all employees.

All of the above modifications are subject to any mandatory standards established by the Federal Government.

SUBJECT: End of Strike

The membership of the IBEW, Local 2230, at a meeting held last night ratified a new labor agreement with the Laboratory and will be returning to work on Thursday, September 2.

The Union, representing about 550 employees in Plant Engineering and Planning, Central Shops, Staff Services, Supply and Materiel, and the Plant Protection group, has been participating in a work stoppage since July 1, 1971.

The new contract is for a period of one year from July 1, 1971 to June 30, 1972. Details of the settlement will be announced shortly.

I wish to express my appreciation for the extra efforts of all those employees who were responsible for the continued operation of the Laboratory's vital services during the work stoppage.

We welcome back the members of the IBEW and feel confident that all of us will once again work together toward our common goals.

Strike History

- June 30 - 2 p.m. Union breaks off negotiations and declares intention to strike at midnight.
- July 1 - Mass picket line forms outside main gate of Lab, and a small group of pickets at North gate.
Union files unfair labor practices charge with NLRB, citing wasted time in bargaining.
- July 2 - Lab files charge with NLRB against Union for secondary boycott at North Gate.
- July 6 - Union gives out letter at gate asking for support of non-striking employees.
- July 8 - *Brookhaven Bulletin* publishes list of Union demands and Laboratory responses. Commissioners of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service call meeting of Union and Lab in Plainview on Monday, July 12.
- July 12 - After meeting for 7 hours in Plainview, both parties announce "no progress." Another meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, July 14.
- July 14 - Second post-strike meeting in Plainview.
- July 15 - Meetings recessed. Federal mediators to call next meeting. Union votes at general meeting to continue strike.
- July 16 - Lab issues statement on status of negotiations.
- July 19 - Third post-strike meeting scheduled for Thursday, July 22 at Plainview by Federal mediators.
- July 22 - Contract negotiating session convenes at 10:30 a.m. in Plainview.
- Aug. 4 - Fourth post-strike meeting convenes in Plainview.
- Aug. 5, 6, 9, and 10 - Meetings in Plainview continue with both sides reporting "progress."
- Aug. 11 - After coming to tentative agreement on fringe benefits, talks reach impasse on question of wages.
- Aug. 15 - President Nixon announces Wage/Price freeze.
- Aug. 19 - Federal Mediators call for meeting of Union and Lab because of President's announcement. Union rejects request to return to work and continue negotiations.
- Aug. 25 - Negotiating teams meet again.
- Aug. 26 - Wage talks continue - agreement near.
- Aug. 30 - Agreement reached on one-year contract.
- Union ratifies contract.
- Pickets withdrawn at Midnight.
- Sept. 2 - Union members return to work.

Semester Faculty Leaves For Home

The seven Brookhaven Semester Faculty Participants have left BNL to return to their home towns. These professors from colleges participating in the Brookhaven Semester Program spent the summer at Brookhaven as research collaborators. While here, they lived on site while working on research projects designed to enhance their teaching ability in their home colleges.

Dharam Dev Malik is a Professor of Biology at Jarvis Christian College in Hawkins, Texas; he is married, has two children, and resides in Hawkins. While at Brookhaven Mr. Malik worked with Darrel Joel of BNL's Medical Department on his research project, lymphopoiesis and extracorporeal irradiation of large animals.

John A. Duplantier is an Instructor of Biology at Grambling College in his home town of Grambling, Louisiana; he is married and has two children. This summer he worked with Howard Curtis of BNL's Biology Department on analysis of mitotic index of liver in mice after irradiation.

Dennis B.K. Strete is an Instructor of Biology at Tougaloo College in Tougaloo, Mississippi; he is married, has two children, and resides in Tougaloo. While at BNL he worked with Myron Ledbetter of the BNL Biology Department on his research project, cytological studies on the formation of plant cell walls, using an electron microscope.

Piara S. Gill is a Professor of Chemistry at Tuskegee Institute in Tuskegee, Alabama; he is married, has one child, and lives in Tuskegee. At Brookhaven he worked with H.A. Schwarz in the Chemistry Department on his research project, radiation chemistry, the pulse radiolysis of gases.

Charles Schilling is a Professor of Chemistry at Knoxville College in his home town

of Knoxville, Tennessee; he is married and has eight children. At BNL he worked with James J. Egan in the Department of Applied Science; his project was investigating a new method for determining the thermodynamic properties of the system, sodium-bismuth.

Samir Mouftah is a Professor of Biology at Texas College in Tyler, Texas; he is married, has two children, and lives in Tyler. During the summer he worked with Harold Smith of the BNL Biology Department; his research project was electrophoretic determinations on genetically controlled characteristics in species hybrids on radiation-induced variants on the genus *Nicotiana*.

V.R.G. Moorti is a Professor of Chemistry at Grambling College in his home town of Grambling, Louisiana; he is married and has one child. While at Brookhaven he worked with Donald MacKenzie of the Department of Applied Science on his research project, study of kinetics of symmetrical molecules, particularly bicyclo-hexyl.

State Opens Hearing On Shoreham Reactor

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation opened hearings on Tuesday at the County Center in Hauppauge on the environmental impact of the proposed Shoreham nuclear power plant.

At the same time that the State hearings opened, the AEC prepared to reopen the hearings it completed in May. Under a new set of regulations drafted on August 27, every utility which was issued a construction permit after January 1970, or has an application pending, will face a new set of hearings. A meeting will be held on September 16 to schedule new hearings for the Shoreham plant.

The hearings which began Tuesday will concern themselves with the discharge of heated water into Long Island Sound. The Lloyd Harbor Study Group, which actively opposes the plant, will be the principal opponent in this series of hearings. The group will challenge LILCO's ability to meet state standards on thermal discharge as well as standards of the Federal Water Quality Act.

The new set of hearings by the AEC would cover the emergency core-cooling system of the Shoreham plant as well as its environmental impact. It will also consider standards set by other state and Federal agencies, such as those on water quality.

"Sometimes my views conflict with my mother's, and yet I can always find that I can talk to my parents. Their understanding attitude has helped all of us kids to be open-minded and fair."

As one of the 78 students participating in the 20th Annual Summer Student Program, Janice worked in the Public Relations Office as a feature reporter for the *Brookhaven Bulletin*. In addition to her writing chores, she was active on a committee for managing a Summer Seminar Series, and a member of the unofficial committee to coordinate the social activities of summer visitors.
