## Hearings Open On Simulated Plant

Hearings on a simulated nuclear power plant were opened Monday night in Berkner Hall as part of the In-Service Institute for High School Science Teachers.

The simulated plant is proposed by a group of students representing the "Suffolk Illuminating and Power Co." (SIPCO). Opposing the plant will be two groups, Citizens for Clean and Safe Power and, Citizens for Stability.

The hearings will be conducted by the Special Regional Planning Commission, which was appointed by the Governor.

On December 11, a pre-hearing conference was held to identify the intervenors and to get rules for the conduct of the hearings.

Citizens for Stability, represented by Carl Dippel, Jr., initiated a head-to-head confrontation with the hearing officers when he charged that panel members did not truly represent state residents. SIPCO VP Paul Stengel also expressed doubts about the qualifications of the hearing officers.

The pre-hearing recessed after granting full intervenor status to SIPCO and Citizens for Clean and Safe Power. Citizens for Stability were designated to be "limited intervenors."

The next hearing will be held on Monday, December 18, and will be reported in the *Brookhaven Bulletin*.



## Concrete Polymer Materials Meeting

A meeting on Bridge and Highway Applications of Concrete Polymer Materials was held on December 7, 1972 at Brookhaven National Laboratory.

Approximately 20 bridge and highway engineers and administrators were present from the New York State Department of Transportation in Albany and Babylon, from the New York City Department of Highways, and from the Federal Highway Region I Administration in Albany.

Members of the Department of Applied Science, including B. Manowitz, M. Steinberg, L.E. Kukacka, M. Reich, J. Powell, P. Colombo, and J. Fontana, presented information on polymer impregnated concrete and polymer concrete for new bridge constructions, structural bridge deck overlays, repairing deteriorated highway construction, and new techniques for inspection of the structural condition of bridges and overpasses.

The new materials and techniques may be of value in repairing the badly deteriorated West Side Highway in New York City, and a number of overpasses over the New York State Thruway.

## Social Security Rate To Change Next Year

As a result of recent legislation in Congress, Social Security (FICA) contributions are scheduled for another increase beginning with the first wages paid in 1973. Presently both employee and employer contribute 5.2% on the employee's first \$9,000 in annual wages. In 1973 the tax rate will rise to 5.85% and the maximum taxable earnings base to \$10,800. This will produce a maximum tax of \$631.80. In 1974 the tax rate will remain at 5.85% but the taxable earnings base will increase to \$12,000. This will up the maximum tax to \$702.00.

Until recently, Congressional approval has always been required before Social Security taxes or benefits could be increased. The system has now been changed so that, after 1974, both taxes and benefits will be automatically adjusted as the cost of living changes.

## Donors Needed Now

There will be a severe blood shortage in the Long Island area during the first weeks of January. Unfortunately, it is of crisis proportions.

The Greater New York Blood Program has asked to bring a bloodmobile unit to the Laboratory on January 4, 1973. In order to meet the anticipated blood demand, at least 60 donors are needed. This is not a regularly scheduled visit but the Lab will receive credit toward the quota for 1973.

Children of Laboratory employees are regularly covered under the employee's Family Medical Insurance Plan until the December 31st following their nineteenth birthday.
