## Lab Major Medical Features 3-Month "Set Back" Provision

The Laboratory's Major Medical insurance plan provides 80% reimbursement (50% in the case of a dependent's mental illness) to any insured individual who has incurred more than \$100 in out of pocket medical expenses during a calendar year.

BNL's plan is an all cause plan, meaning that expenses for different illnesses may be reimbursable under a single major medical claim. The major medical benefits, once qualified for, continue until the end of the calendar year. A new \$100 deductible must be established every year.

In accumulating your \$100 deductible for this calendar year you should keep in mind that certain expenses incurred during the last 3 months of the preceding year may also be included. Specifically, if you incurred expenses during the final quarter of last year, and if you did not receive any reimbursement for these expenses, they may be counted toward your 1973 deductible. This feature is referred to as a "set back" provision and it applies even though you may have established a major medical claim last year. Here are 3 different examples of how it works:

Calendar Year 1972	Out-of-pocket expense	Counted toward \$100 deductible	Eligible for 80% reimbursement
Jan-Sept	-	-	-
Oct-Dec	\$60	\$60	-

In this example the individual incurred only \$60 worth of out-of-pocket expenses and did not establish a major medical claim. However, since the \$60 was incurred during the 4th quarter of 1972 it may be counted toward the individual's 1973 deductible.

Calendar Year 1972	Out-of-pocket expense	Counted toward \$100 deductible	Eligible for 80% reimbursement
Jan-Sept	\$ 20	\$20	-
Oct-Dec	\$120	\$80	\$40

Even though the individual established a major medical claim last year \$80 of his 1972 deductible was incurred during the 4th quarter. Therefore, that \$80 may also be counted toward his 1973 deductible.

Calendar Year 1972	Out-of-pocket expense	Counted toward \$100 deductible	Eligible for 80% reimbursement
Jan-Sept	\$120	\$100	\$20
Oct-Dec	\$ 20	-	\$20

In this example there is no credit toward the next year's deductible because the 1972 deductible was satisfied in the first 9 months and the \$20 worth of 4th quarter expenses were eligible for 80% reimbursement.

In making out your 1972 income tax return you might check your medical bills to see if you have any unreimbursed 4th quarter expenses. If you find any, be sure to set them aside for submission toward your 1973 major medical deductible. Esther also notes that we get mail addressed to Upton Patch Avenue, and to the Research Library. And how about a zip code of NY119?


### Timely Animal

## An Evening of Songs With Jean Belliard

Jean Belliard will present an evening of songs of the French royal court at Berkner Hall, on February 9, at 8:30 p.m. The ambiance of the hall will be modified for the occasion by slide projections of illuminated manuscripts of the period.

In addition to singing and playing the guitar, Jean Belliard has provided the musical settings for some of the Renaissance poems he uses in his performance. He is also an authority on classical Arabic music, and was for a number of years a professor at the National Conservatory of Music at Rabat, Morocco; subsequently he was the French cultural attache in Oran, Algeria.



During the past two years, M. Belliard has presented programs of medieval and Renaissance songs throughout Western Europe, North Africa, and the United States. Critics have described his performances as follows:

"With Jean Belliard, one does not know which to admire most - the singer, the guitarist, the composer, or the poet who reminds us of the necessary relation between poetry and music . . ."
