## Energy Study Group Starts 3-Week Meet

More than 100 scientists and engineers will participate in a three-week summer study on "The Quantification of the External Costs of Energy" at Brookhaven Lab, starting this Monday, August 6, and running until Friday, August 24.

The participants of the study group will be meeting, for the most part in the Cosmotron Building, and will be housed on site for the duration of the conference.

Phil Palmedo, Department of Applied Science, is the BNL host, and will be assisted by members of the DAS, and the Visitors Service Group of the Public Relations Office.

During their stay at Brookhaven, the participants will have a full program of conference activities as well as an opportunity to visit points of interest in the immediate area.

Evening programs planned for the Brookhaven Staff will be opened to the visitors, as will all of the facilities of the Brookhaven Employees Recreation Association.

**Movie Tonight**

This week the BERA Summer Film Festival presents *The African Queen*, directed by John Huston and starring Humphrey Bogart, Katharine Hepburn, Robert Morley, Theodore Bikel, and Peter Bull.

Humphrey Bogart won his only Academy Award for his remarkable performance in this acclaimed adventure-romance. In a change of pace from his previous roles, Bogart plays Charlie Allnut, the unshaven, unheroic, hard-drinking skipper of "The African Queen," a sleazy steamer which he navigates along an African river during World War I.

The Germans destroy a village, and leave stranded Rose Sayer (Katharine Hepburn), the prim sister of a missionary. Charlie agrees to take her along with him. When she proposes taking the boat through uncharted waters in order to destroy a 100-foot German gunboat, Charlie is reluctant, but eventually he agrees. While battling malaria, insects, rapids, and menacing German boats, this extremely unlikely couple find themselves falling in love. Their adventure continues to a surprising and exciting conclusion.

Many of John Huston's film's, from *The Asphalt Jungle* and *Treasure of the Sierra Madre* to *Fat City*, are concerned with people on the outskirts of society who fail in their attempts to achieve difficult goals. Here his viewpoint is more optimistic, although the protagonists succeed purely by the unlikeliest of accidents. Huston collaborated on the script with James Agee, the film critic who later wrote *Night of the Hunter*. Jack Cardiff (*Black Narcissus*) executed the beautiful location color photography.

Bosley Crowther of the New York Times has said of the film: "There is rollicking fun and gentle humor in this outlandish *African Queen* . . . beauty and excitement in the lush and colorful scenes of a broad and forbidding African river . . . Without two accomplished players, Mr. Huston could never have achieved his highly audacious purpose of a virtually two-character film, but Miss Hepburn and Mr. Bogart are entirely up to their jobs."

Show time is 8:30 p.m. in Berkner Hall. Tickets are available at the door and are priced at \$1.00 for adults, and 50 cents for those under 18. Employees, families, friends, and the general public are invited.

Next week's movie will be *Georgy Girl*, a British film with Lynn Redgrave, Alan Bates, James Mason, and Charlotte Rampling.



You might find you hate the one you love.



## Diving and Racing Livens Swimming Pool

"Victory is sweet," goes an old saying. But certain victors in last Friday's BERA diving contest at the swimming pool found that it could sting a bit, as well. The Summer Recreation staff conducted the diving contest for children over eight years of age, while younger children participated in a paper plate race at the shallow end of the pool.

Three categories of dives were presented to both contestants and judges. The prettiest dive, the worst dive, and the craziest dive would all be awarded ribbons at the end of competition. The judges, consisting of parents, and Rich Parsons of the BERA staff, then watched as bodies glided, fluttered, tumbled and twisted off the diving board into the water. Belly-floppers abounded, but one persistent lad endured three such stinging flops in a row and was promptly awarded first place for having the worst dives.

The loveliest dive was less painful, but fully as deserving of recognition. A graceful cartwheel off the board caught the attention of the judges and spectators and brought the contestant a blue ribbon. The craziest dive once again provided its performer with a harsh and splashy entry into the water. In what was labeled a "leaping, twisting, screaming, half-turn, back-slapper," watchers were entertained with a flying show of arms, legs and water. The contestant, in turn, was "entertained" with a solid clap of unusually hard water, and a blue ribbon.

The younger children were busy pushing soggy paper plates across the width of the pool while all the other splashing was going on. After several preliminary races to single out the fastest of the plate paddlers, the final run was among six finalists. In something of a show for women's equality, two of the three top finishers were girls. Men can take heart, however, for the girls could only manage to come in second and third.

Another water show is on for all to participate in, or just watch, today at the pool as the BERA staff presents its relay race competition at 3:00 p.m. All are welcome!

## A Reminder for Pool Participants

Just a reminder for all those who participate in swimming pool programs of the specific hours designated for the various activities:

12:00-1:00 p.m. - employee swimming only.

1:00-2:30 p.m. - swimming lessons, registered students only.

2:45-9:30 p.m. - general swimming, open to all.

Employees are reminded that lockers must be registered at the film service desk by the cafeteria. No locks may be left on unregistered lockers.

## Pool Regulations - Parents Please Note

All parents who have registered their children for the summer swimming program should heed the following items:

1. Children not accompanied by parents should be instructed to remain in the pool area and not wander on site.

2. Children should sit on the benches outside the pool until it opens at approximately 12:50 p.m.

3. Children are to line up (single file) when the door opens. All children are to show season passes or buy tickets. (all children over 6 years old - 50¢ admission each day.)

4. Bring a towel - do not leave valuables in lockers.

5. Remember - **Safety First**, any child who consistently disregards safety regulations will be eliminated from the pool program. (Note: The lifeguards' duty is safety only - they will not provide change for the vending machines. Please provide your children with change when they come to the pool.)

6. Upon completion of the swimming lessons (approx. 2:30) children will be asked to leave the swimming pool and either shower or sit at the pool deck until the pool reopens at approximately 3 p.m. Please inform your children of this.

7. No children are allowed in the gymnasium until 5 p.m.

## BERA Scavengers Scour The Land
