Nursery School Registration Opens

The Upton Nursery School is now registering children for the 1973-74 school year. The School offers three- and four-year old children a variety of opportunities in social activities, art, dramatic play, music, outdoor activities and experiences that build readiness for work in elementary school. Classes are held in the Recreation Building in the Apartment Area. Professional teachers are in charge of all classes.

There are two sessions of the school - one meets on Monday, Wednesday and Friday and the other meets on Tuesday and Thursday. Within each session there is a three- and four-year old class. The school term begins after Labor Day and ends in mid-June. Classes begin at 8:30 a.m. so that children can be dropped off by their parents on their way to work. The school day ends at 11:30 a.m.

The School is a non-profit, self supporting, cooperative BERA activity operated for the benefit of pre-school children of BNL employees. The parents of the students contribute some of their time to the School's operation so an excellent program is provided with minimal tuition fees.

Anderson to Head Public Relations

As announced last week by Laboratory Director George Vineyard, an Office of Public Relations has been established under the overall responsibility of Dr. R.C. Anderson, Assistant Director.

As of May 1, the Laboratory's programs to provide information to the news media, to arrange conferences and group visits, to provide speakers for outside groups, to establish liaison with public officials, and to create publications, films, tapes, and exhibits describing the activities of the Laboratory have been consolidated in an Office of Public Relations.



Carl Thien has become the Public Information Officer and is responsible for media relations and for the preparation of news releases, as well as for such publications as the *Brookhaven Bulletin*, of which he remains the Editor. He reports to Dr. Anderson.



Alf Christoffersen has become the Public Affairs Officer, under Dr. Anderson, and is responsible for the scheduling and arrangements for public activities such as conferences, tours, briefings, group visits, exhibits, and Visitor Days. In addition, he is responsible for the preparation of films, tapes, and exhibits for public display and will maintain the master calendar of events of the Laboratory, including the Weekly Calendar.



Virginia Sayre, as Special Programs Coordinator, will continue to be in charge of on-site arrangements for conferences, tours, and public events, under the overall responsibility of Mr. Christoffersen.



In addition, an Office of Academic Relations has been established to coordinate educational and related activities of the Laboratory. Dr. G.A. Price is Head of this Office, while retaining his titles and responsibilities as Laboratory Security Officer and Foreign Scientist Advisor.

Dr Price is responsible for educational activities such as the Summer Student Program, the Brookhaven Semester Program, In-Service Teacher Institutes, and cooperative education. Appointments of visiting scientists and of students will be made through this office, as well as all working visits of foreign scientists, whether of short or long duration.



The Head of the Office of Academic Relations will report to Dr. R.C. Anderson. Dr. Anderson continues to be responsible for the Office of Scientific Personnel, which deals with scientific staff appointments, policy, and relations.

Tatsuo Shirane - Son of Dr. G. Shirane, Physics; resides in Bellport and attends Bellport Senior High School.


