Art Show Opens to Enthusiastic Acclaim

On Wednesday evening Brookhaven art enthusiasts gathered in Berkner Hall for the gala opening of BERA's current Art Show. Entitled BROOKHAVEN COLLECTS, the show includes a wide range of art in the private collections of Brookhaven staff. The opening night crowd, even before enjoying the pleasant refreshments, agreed that it is a splendid show and all BNL personnel are encouraged to visit the Berkner Hall exhibit rooms.

Art of many periods, techniques, and styles are included in the show, ranging from ancient Egyptian sculpture, Roman glass from the third century A.D., graphic work by Whistler, Picasso, and Miro, and a variety of contemporary paintings and sculpture. Visitors to the opening were particularly enthusiastic about the early work shown which includes a fifteenth century Austrian polychrome wood figure. On special request, visitors to the show can "play" a huge Indonesian gong.

Despite the variety of periods and styles represented, the exhibit is unified by a creative and informative installation. On one wall an ancient Chinese scroll is tellingly juxtaposed with a contemporary abstract canvas by Ohashi. A Japanese head of Buddha stands impressively next to a splendid Tabriz carpet.

The show will be open from 12 to 2 p.m. and 4 to 6 p.m. during the week until May 11. It will also be open at 7:30 p.m. on the evenings of April 26 and 27 and May 3 and 7.

Cotzias and Friedlander Elected To NAS

Dr. George C. Cotzias and Dr. Gerhart Friedlander were elected to membership in the National Academy of Sciences at its Annual meeting on Tuesday, April 24.

The two men were among 95 distinguished scientists who were elected this year to the nation's most prestigious academy.

The National Academy of Sciences is a private organization of scientists and engineers dedicated to the furtherance of science and its use for the general welfare. The Academy was established in 1863 by a Congressional Act of Incorporation, signed by Abraham Lincoln, which called upon the Academy to act as an official advisor to the Federal Government, upon request, in any matter of science or technology.

Dr. Cotzias, Head of the Physiology Division of the Medical Research Center, is a native of Greece. He attended the National University in Athens before receiving his degree from Harvard Medical School in 1943. He continued the study and practice of medicine for the next 10 years and in 1953 was named Head of the Physiology Division at the Medical Research Center at

tion for "outstanding contributions to the nuclear energy program." In March, 1973, he won an Oscar B. Hunter Award in Therapeutics.

Dr. Cotzias resides in Bellport.

Dr. Friedlander, Chairman of the Chemistry Department since 1968, was born in



Munich, Germany, and was educated at the University of California in Berkeley, where he did his graduate work under Nobel Laureate Glenn T. Seaborg. After serving as instructor at the University of Idaho, he joined the Manhattan District at Los Alamos Laboratory. After World War II, he was a member of the staff of GE's Research Laboratory at Schenectady, working with the 100 MeV betatron.

In 1948 Dr. Friedlander joined the Chemistry Department at BNL, and has been here since, except for brief leave periods at the Weizmann Institute of Science in Israel and at Washington University in St. Louis. In 1967, Dr. Friedlander received the American Chemical Society's Award for Nuclear Applications in Chemistry. In addition to his research publications, he has authored, with the late Professor J.W. Kennedy, the textbooks *Introduction to Radiochemistry* (1949) and *Nuclear and Radiochemistry* (1955); the latter appeared in a new edition in 1964, with Professor J.M. Miller as co-author.

Dr. Friedlander is a member of the American Chemical Society and the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and a Fellow of the American Physical Society.




Brookhaven. Since 1955 he has held the titles of Senior Scientist and Attending Physician. He received the 1969 Albert Lasker Award for Clinical Medical Research for his demonstration of the effectiveness of L-Dopa in the treatment of Parkinson's Disease.

In 1972 he received the Borden Award for "outstanding research in medicine conducted by a member of the faculty of an affiliated college." In that same year he was named to receive an Atomic Energy Cita-


Way To Go



The 30-ton straddle crane requires a ten-foot climb for the operator to get into the cab. When he arrives, there is no chance for his feet to get wet! In contrast, the operator of the all terrain vehicle ducks his head to get into the drivers seat, and takes a chance that his feet will get thoroughly soaked if he leaves his vehicle at the wrong time. The straddle crane is used to move shielding blocks at the AGS, and the ATV is used by Plant Engineering and Biology researchers in the wetlands area to the east of the Biology control fields.
