Cotzias, Head of the Medical Research Center's Physiology Department, will be awarded the American College of Physicians Award for distinguished contributions in science as related to medicine. The award of a bronze medal and a certificate will be presented to Dr. Cotzias on Monday, April 1, at the opening of the 55th Annual Session of the American College of Physicians.

Following his acceptance of the award, Dr. Cotzias will make a television appearance in a program to be shown during the four-day annual session of the College. On April 4, he will present an award lecture on a topic of his choice.
