## Alvin Weinberg In Federal Energy Post

Alvin M. Weinberg, who resigned his post as director of Oak Ridge National Laboratory to head the new ORAU-formed Institute for Energy Analysis, was appointed by William E. Simon, administrator of the Federal Energy Office (FEO), as director of the New Energy Research and Development Office.

This new office will permanently remain in the FEO as part of the Executive Office of the President, Simon's announcement said.

Dr. Weinberg is taking a leave of absence from the IEA for a period of at least six months to assume his post in Washington. In the interim, H.G. MacPherson, deputy director of IEA, will serve as acting director of the Institute.

As head of the Office of Energy Research and Development, Dr. Weinberg will report directly to Administrator Simon. His major responsibilities will be to:

Formulate energy research and development policies and plans to implement them;

Assist the administrator of FEO in evaluating new research and development programs;

Work with the Atomic Energy Commission, the Environmental Protection Agency, the National Science Foundation, and the Department of the Interior to ensure that research and development programs are coordinated and balanced throughout the federal government; and

Work with the Office of Management and Budget, the Council on Environmental Quality, and other Executive Office agencies in presenting research and development alternatives to the President.


## Engineers Week

## Brookhaven And The Energy Emergency

What are we doing at Brookhaven to bring our talents to bear on the many problems presented by the energy emergency?

Perhaps not everyone is aware of the fact that we have had programs in the field for several years; the Department of Applied Science has foreseen the present problems and has organized programs aimed at helping to solve them. Also we have underway a joint Accelerator Department-DAS program on power transmission through superconductivity at very low temperatures, a program that has joint support from the National Science Foundation and the AEC.

More recently we have been exploring in detail Brookhaven's capabilities for making more extensive contributions to the energy program. We find that many people have good and new ideas; for some we have obtained government support, for others support has been requested; many other ideas are still in the process of evolution. There may be other contributions of which we are not yet aware. This is one of many reasons for the present article and several which will follow. We plan to describe for you the ground rules under which we feel that we should operate, the schemes that have been proposed, and the actions that are being taken to implement them. At all times we shall welcome your comments, criticisms, and suggestions.

### Brookhaven's Talents

First, what are the qualifications that we bring to bear on the energy problem? We can certainly say safely that we have an impressive array of talent in the fields of pure science - mathematics, physics, chemistry, and biology. We are also very strong in many aspects of engineering - here we include reactor engineering, accelerator engineering, heavy mechanical engineering (not to mention delicate mechanical engineering), electric power engineering, cryogenic engineering, and other pertinent engineering fields. We have distinguished Medical and Biology Departments which, in collaboration with other Departments, can make important contributions to the field of bio-conversion of energy, to the solution of environmental problems, and to many more esoteric aspects of the energy program.

Evidently we have no lack of talent to enter the energy program. The question then arises - what sort of programs should we undertake? This question has been discussed with many of Brookhaven's scientists and engineers, and with Brookhaven's trustees. The present conclusion is that the problems that we attack should be of long-term significance and should be problems that cannot easily be solved elsewhere. There is no way in which we can produce by next week thousands of gallons of "Brookhavenate" that you can use in your car in place of gasoline. On the other hand, we have a number of ideas which eventually could provide solar energy to us and our neighbors. Further, for the following decade, we have a number of proposals that fit very well into the program for development of fusion reactors.

It seems appropriate at this point to comment on the duration of the "energy crisis." There is no reason to believe that it will not be with us for at least a decade. Without

regard to the situation in the Middle East, we have been approaching a peak in worldwide production of petroleum and natural gas (the peak in U.S. production was passed several years ago). Coal reserves we have are adequate for several hundred years, but we do not have on hand the capabilities for mining it and utilizing it without damaging the environment. In later articles in this series you will learn of Brookhaven ideas for converting coal to liquid or gaseous fuels.

### Energy Proposals

The proposals that we have on hand for Brookhaven activity in the energy field fall under several broad headings. First, are numerous suggestions for activities related to the impact on the environment of energy-related projects. This is a field in which the Laboratory, particularly through the Biology Department, has been active for many years. A second large group of ideas relates to controlled thermonuclear (or fusion) research. Some of these possible programs relate directly to demonstrations of feasibility of fusion reactors; others assume success of that program and provide ancillary facilities. A third group of possible projects lies in the area of utilization of solar energy; one of these is a scheme for building a solar furnace during the next couple of years to supplement Brookhaven's central steam heating system. Another large area that overlaps some of those mentioned is the field of applied superconductivity. Brookhaven has been a leader in this field for some years; our activities on superconducting magnets and superconducting power lines bear directly on the energy problem and particularly on the controlled thermonuclear research program of the AEC. A number of other ideas are not so easily cate-

gorized. We are expert on analysis of energy systems as Ken Hoffman made clear in his talk in Berkner Hall a week ago. We are equally skilled on studies of hydrogen as a possible fuel and energy storage material. (Frank Salzano discussed this in the Berkner Hall series a couple of weeks ago.)

The fact that we are studying these various programs and asking for Federal support does not mean that they will immediately become part of Brookhaven's program. Although the Administration plans greatly expanded financing for energy programs, there remain many administrative problems to be unscrambled in Washington, and at the same time there are many other volunteers in the fight against the energy shortage. In any case, we plan to keep you informed about our activities. The next article will be about the controlled thermonuclear program and Brookhaven's possible role therein.

## IAEA Announcement

The Analytical Quality Control Service of the International Atomic Energy Agency has recently announced its proposed schedule for the availability during 1974 of standards, reference materials and samples for intercomparison. These include materials useful to analytical laboratories for fuel technology, materials related to the determination of environmental radioactivity, and materials for use in the determination of stable trace elements in environmental and biomedical research.
