

Minority Firm Wins Contract

A \$1 million contract has been awarded to Mundo Developers, Ltd., a minority-owned firm in Great Neck, N.Y., by DOE's Brookhaven Area Office, to install sprinkler systems in three buildings at the Laboratory.

The contract is one of the largest awards made by DOE under the Small Business Administration's "8A Program" to encourage minority-owned and disadvantaged businesses to compete for federal contracts.

The sprinkler systems and other fire detection improvements will upgrade the Brookhaven buildings to current DOE safety standards. Automatic sprinklers will be installed in Biology, the Environmental Research Center and the basement of the Medical Research Center. Fire protection and alarm systems will also be installed in on-site housing units.

Construction is scheduled for completion by the end of 1981.


New No. - Old Rate

Although the exchange will change when BNL's new computerized telephone system goes into effect on April 6, there will be no change in the rate which will be charged for calls made either to or from the new 282 exchange.

The change in exchange, from 345 to 282, is necessitated by the fact that BNL phones will physically tie in to the Bell System in Patchogue instead of in Yaphank. However, for billing purposes the new 282 exchange will be interchangeable with existing 345 and 924 exchanges.

Delete Form SF-46

Drivers of Government vehicles are alerted to the fact that a U.S. Government Motor Vehicle Operators Identification Card (SF 46) is no longer required. Effective February 15, a valid State driver's licence, appropriate for the vehicle being operated, is all that is necessary. But the emphasis is on "appropriate" — for instance, you don't drive a tractor-trailer with a class 5 license. Information pertaining to the use of Government vehicles both on and off site can be found in the recently revised section 5-05 of the Standard Practice Instruction (SPI).

Now, the 8 o'clock contract has been awarded and work on the 10 and 12 o'clock areas is scheduled to start in the next fiscal year. Tunnel construction is shown by lines: —, complete; - - - - - , 85% complete; , 3% complete.

Around The Clock With ISABELLE

The Ammann & Whitney Inc./Safeguard Construction Corporation recently awarded two contracts totaling more than 7.5 million dollars to two firms for work on separate aspects of ISABELLE construction.

A \$2,952,000 contract to build the Major Facility Hall at the 8 o'clock position on the ISABELLE "clock" was awarded to Lasker-Goldman, which is also working on Phase I of the ISABELLE Service Building, and is in the latter stages of work on the Wide Angle Hall.

The 8 o'clock facility will take approximately a year and a half to complete. Plans call for the construction of contiguous buildings separated by a wall of portable concrete shield blocks averaging about seven feet thick. When the shield wall is removed, a 40-ton capacity overhead crane will be able to travel between the buildings to transport experimental equipment between the assembly building and the research hall. The assembly building is a conventional structure, 61 feet long by 60 feet wide and 47 feet high. The research hall is the same size except 3 feet narrower. To either side of this hall, smaller side halls approximately 53 feet long, 30 feet wide and 22 feet high will be constructed to complete the experimental area. With these dimensions, it will be suitable for large experimental detector systems.

In December 1980, the J.F. O'Healy Construction Corporation of Bayport, L.I. was awarded a \$3,639,000 contract for the Injection/Ejection Beam Tunnel. This, the second largest sin-

gle contract awarded to date, is a "significant step in the progress of the project," said Paul Mohn of ISABELLE Construction Division, "because it physically ties the ISABELLE project into the AGS." The beam tunnel will be under construction for another year. J.F. O'Healy is presently completing its work on two other ISABELLE contracts, for the 2 o'clock and 4 o'clock facilities.

Overall, ISABELLE construction is on schedule and within budget. The feelings of everyone involved were summed up by Parke Rohrer, Head of ISABELLE Construction Division, who said, "I am very satisfied. Although the harsh weather caused some delays this winter, things look very good in our overall schedule."

Art Show Lecture

Susan Chrien will talk on Graphic Processes on Thursday, February 26 at 1 p.m. in Berkner Hall. A member of the BERA Art Committee, she holds a MFA degree from Cleveland Institute and Western Reserve University and teaches painting and drawing for the Town of Brookhaven.

The lecture is scheduled in conjunction with the current BERA art show featuring the work of artists from the Graphic Eye, a cooperative gallery for printmakers in Port Washington. The show will run through February 27, on weekdays, in Berkner Hall, from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.

Rau To Head Magnet Program

R. Ronald Rau will head the ISABELLE Magnet Division, effective February 23. As announced this week by ISABELLE Technical Director, Kjell Johnson, Rau will be responsible for the research, development and subsequent production of all superconducting magnets for the project.

Rau, who will head a staff of 200, says "it is my contention that the magnet program is the biggest challenge the Laboratory has ever faced. It will require the best of every scientist, engineer and technician in the Magnet Division." He maintains further that "it is essential that within a reasonable time, less than a year, we reach the point where the cosine theta magnet shows promise for use in ISABELLE."

He credits Ed Bleser, former head of the division, with the fact that "the magnet program is on the right track and improving, in spite of the setbacks it has suffered over the past two years. Bleser will remain a prime member of the scientific team working on the magnets," Rau said.

After serving as Associate Director for the last ten years, Rau is no stranger to administration, but he notes that, in his new job, he will be more closely involved with the staff, and will be directly in touch with the technical details of the program.

Rau joined the Physics Department in 1956, and his early career at BNL was devoted to the development and

construction of hydrogen bubble chambers and their use in high energy particle physics experiments at the Cosmotron and the AGS. He was appointed deputy chairman of the department in 1964, and chairman in 1966. He became Associate Director for High Energy Physics in 1970 and also served as chairman of the High Energy Advisory Committee. During these years, Rau was a leading proponent of the ISABELLE project.

Power Monitoring

Sitting in front of the TV on a long winter's night, being warmed by the glow of a quartz electric heater, a question may come to mind: How fast is my electric bill growing? The answer can be found fairly easily, using the power company meter (located on the side of the house or in the basement) and a watch with a second hand.

A number, designated Kh, appears on the face of the meter. This number will vary from meter to meter. Using this number and a timing of the revolutions of the meter disc, the power level can be calculated from the equation

Power in kilowatts=
 $(3.6 \times \text{revolutions} \times \text{Kh}) / \text{seconds}$
 where 3.6 is a time factor and Kh is the time taken to complete the revolutions.

For example, if the Kh factor is 7.2 and the meter makes 5 revolutions in 75 seconds,

$\text{Power} = (3.6 \times 5 \times 7.2) / 75 = 1.728 \text{ kW}$
 At LILCO's December rate of approximately 10¢ per kWh, this amount of power would cost 17¢ for each hour of operation.

The power use of a single appliance can be checked by turning off all other electric loads. Be sure to unplug the instant-on TV, but don't bother with electric clocks. After making sure that the meter disc is stopped, turn on the appliance to be checked, time the disc revolutions, and calculate the power.

Q. & A. On Credit Unions

Approximately 400 people attended the information meetings held on February 4 regarding credit unions. Representatives of the Teachers Federal Credit Union were on hand to provide the presentation and answer questions from BNL employees. Here are some of the questions raised and the answers given. This information may be helpful to you in responding to the survey form being distributed to all BNL employees on Monday, February 23.

Q. How many branches does Teachers Federal Credit Union have and where are they located?

A. We have five branches with a sixth under construction in Farmingville. They are located in Bay Shore, Elwood, Farmingville, Great River and Stony Brook.

Q. Do you have checking accounts?

A. Yes, we call it "Share Drafts" which is the equivalent of a checking account. There is no minimum balance requirement, no monthly service charge, and an interest rate of 5 3/4% is paid on balances from day of deposit to day of withdrawal.

Q. What is the interest rate on savings accounts?

A. A 6% dividend rate which results in an annual yield of 6.14%. In addition free life insurance up to \$4,000 on savings accounts is provided.

Q. If there is a positive response to the survey, and Teachers Federal Credit Union is successful in acquiring a charter amendment to cover BNL employees, will it mean that there will be an "on-site" branch?

A. No. At this time the consideration is that BNL employees would have access to our various branches. One could handle all banking needs through a payroll deduction and the mail.

Q. How do your loan rates compare to the rates available at the Barclays on-site bank?

A. Our rates are substantially lower, here are some comparisons:

In addition, VISA and Master Charge loan rates are 15% with no membership charge. Teachers loans also provide life insurance for the amount of the loan at no additional cost.

Q. Is there an advantage to joining an established credit union as opposed to starting our own?

A. We feel that joining an established credit union offers a considerable number of advantages, including the amount of resources initially available. Teachers has assets of \$68 million dollars, 42,000 members, and a professional staff. Generally, for the first year of operations, no interest is paid to depositors in a newly formed credit union.

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
