

## Optimizing Optics At NSLS

The National Synchrotron Light Source is a highly specialized machine designed for one job: to produce light in the form of synchrotron radiation. This kind of radiation is "white," that is, it covers a wide range of wavelengths — from infra-red, through the visible and ultra-violet, to x-rays. To be useful for experiments, the white radiation coming from the machine must first be narrowed down to one wavelength and then delivered to a sample. This function is carried out by a series of optical components, says Malcolm Howells, a physicist with the Light Source specializing in the design of optical instruments.

Howells is not talking about ordinary windows, lenses and prisms. Those devices would not work because they are not transparent at most of the wavelengths produced by the Light Source. Instead, he is referring to mirrors, diffraction gratings and crystals — all devices that work by reflection. Mirrors are used to direct radiation into an instrument, aptly named a monochromator, which contains gratings or crystals which can select radiation of a particular wavelength and send it toward a sample.

Ideally, says Howells, the perfect optical system would deliver monochromatic radiation to the sample without any losses, and would survive perfectly in the rigorous vacuum and thermal conditions which are needed. In practice, real optics always fall short of this ideal.

One problem is damage due to heat or radiation exposure. Howells and his collaborator Peter Takacs, physicist with the Instrumentation Division, have been working on two solutions to the problem. Looking promising, although still being studied, is silicon carbide, a ceramic material. Takacs characterizes it as practically indestructible — a material that is unaffected by radiation and will not distort under intense heat. But he says it's a relatively new optical material, and few manufacturers have experience working with it.

Using existing technology, the other solution to the heat problem is metal mirrors that can be water cooled. Howells and Takacs have been using an approach based on a technique called

diamond turning. This uses a single crystal diamond to cut shapes out of metal turned on a special lathe. The machined surface of the metal, usually aluminum, copper or nickel, has minute groove patterns left by the cutting tool, but proper post-polishing can give a finish as smooth as glass.

A big advantage of diamond turning over conventional mirror fabrication techniques is that it can produce surfaces of any shape. The Light Source will require over a hundred optical elements, most of them having exotic shapes like ellipsoids (picture an egg), paraboloids (remember those old-fashioned bullet lamps), and toroids (donuts). The optical pieces are being manufactured commercially, and Takacs spends considerable time testing them to make sure they meet specifications. He is also commissioning optics in the beam lines and most of the monochromators for the Light Source's ultra-violet ring, which will be ready soon for experiments.


The UV ring produces most of its useful radiation at wavelengths ranging from 2,000 angstroms in the ultra-violet down to eight angstroms in the soft x-ray region (one angstrom is a ten-billionth of a meter or roughly the width of an atom). For experiments using wavelengths longer than 300 angstroms, conventional mirrors are satisfactory. These operate at normal incidence (light going perpendicular to the surface). At wavelengths shorter than 300 angstroms, there are no materials which reflect well at normal incidence, and grazing incidence must be used. For this arrangement, the rays hit the surface at a shallow glancing angle like skipping stones across water.

Takacs says the problem with grazing incidence is that images get more distorted as the angles get more shallow. The only solution is to use very exotic shapes for the reflectors, and this is partly why manufacture of synchrotron radiation mirrors is so challenging.

The problems of using extremely grazing incidence reflectors are particularly severe for x-ray applications, says Howells. A large number of x-ray experiments are planned at the Light



## A Long Step . . . . .



The Power Transmission Project took a major step Tuesday when superconducting cable was successfully threaded through two 430-foot cryogenic pipes. The cable was made in one 1,000-foot length and wound around a 10-foot diameter reel which was carried to the site by (from left) Thomas Muller, mechanical engineer in charge of cable construction; Kurt Minati, senior mechanical engineer; and Kevin Stevenson, electrical technician. There, the cable was attached to a steel wire and pulled through the first pipe, a process that took about an hour. At that point, the cable was cut, a new pulling head was attached, and the remaining length was pulled through the second pipe. John Wilcenski (left), technical supervisor, and Project Manager Eric Forsyth examined the 2-1/4-inch diameter cable as it emerged. Forsyth commented that the five-year plan written in 1976 called for pulling the cable through by the end of fiscal 1981, a deadline that was missed by only weeks.

## Reflections On The Light Source



A conference on "Reflecting Optics for Synchrotron Radiation" was held at Brookhaven Lab this week. The meeting was the first of a pair of conferences, the second one being on "High Resolution Soft X-Ray Optics." Both are relevant to the general issue of designs for optical systems for the National Synchrotron Light Source (see accompanying story), and both were co-sponsored by the Society of Photo-Optical Instrumentation Engineers and by the NSLS, in cooperation with the Optical Society of America. The purpose of the first meeting was to provide a forum for contacts between scientists in the synchrotron radiation community who use optical components and technologists from the optical manufacturing industry who make them. ## BNL Lecture Particle Beams: A Military Option?

This lecture departs from the usual format of Brookhaven Lectures in that it is not concerned with research done at BNL. Rather, it is to be a discussion of several issues concerning the possible application of accelerator particle beams to missile defense problems.

The lecturer, Mark Q. Barton of the Accelerator Department, will speak on "The Particle Beam Weapon Controversy" on Wednesday, December 9, at 8 p.m., in Berkner Hall. It is the first lecture in the 1981-82 series.

Since 1969, Barton has been studying this application in various workshops sponsored by the Department of Defense. During 1980, he served on a task force under the Defense Science Board reporting to the Undersecretary of Defense for Research and Engineering. This task force was charged with an in depth evaluation of the technology relevant to the development of such weapons.

His lecture will review the history of the studies of particle beam weapons and will develop some of the technical issues that must be resolved in order to develop such weapons. All of these studies have been intensely criticized

and the opposition views will be described. The implications of such weapons on defense systems and on disarmament negotiations will also be discussed.

Mark Barton, a Sr. Physicist, has been with the Accelerator Department since 1955 and served as its chairman from 1974-78. He is head of the Accelerator Division of Project ISABELLE.

many years, electron accelerators have been used as sources of synchrotron light, but in general, they were not built for that purpose and were not especially good light sources. For those cases, the optics were not usually a limitation and traditional methods could often be used.

"In recent years, dedicated machines like the NSLS have been designed and built exclusively for use as light sources, and a great deal of effort goes into making them as bright as possible. As the storage ring light source becomes brighter and brighter, it places greater and greater demands on the accuracy of optics. The design of components and instruments which can fully utilize the present generation of storage rings is a new and challenging branch of optics."

Source, and the larger of two storage rings is dedicated to x-ray research. Commissioning of the larger ring will follow that of the UV ring. For the x-ray optical systems, the bulk of the design work has been done by different people. Physicist Jerome Hastings has developed a series of beamline designs which are unique to Brookhaven and which will represent an advance in the way x-ray synchrotron light sources are utilized. In arriving at these designs, he has leaned heavily on computer simulations of the complicated ray patterns involved. This geometrical analysis has been carried out by physicist Steve Heald of the Metallurgy and Materials Sciences Division of DEE, in collaboration with Hastings, and resembles in many ways a similar analysis used by Howells and Takacs for their UV work.

Howells' feeling is that from a world-wide perspective, the x-ray ring at the Light Source is "more unique than the UV ring and will put Brookhaven in a pivotal position in the x-ray research community." The Bulletin will carry stories on this subject in the future.

Howells sums up the challenges faced by designers and fabricators of synchrotron radiation optics: "For



Photographs like this one are used to measure the quality of an optical surface. Briefly, a laser beam is split into two. One part goes to the optical device being tested and the other goes to a reference mirror that is known to be accurately flat. Both laser beams are reflected back and combined together to produce an interference pattern that can be photographed. The beam bouncing back from the optical surface has been distorted by the imperfections in that surface, and the interference pattern shows these distortions in visible form. In this case, the picture is of a toroidal diffraction grating, 2"x1", made of fused silica with a gold coating. The center pattern, resembling Saturn surrounded by rings, is caused by the curvature of the grating's surface. Errors in the surface shape would show up as irregularities in the pattern. This particular grating meets specifications.
