


## Extracting Protons By The Bunch

After a couple of hundred thousand turns, in the space of about 0.5 second, the protons that circulate in the Alternating Gradient Synchrotron (AGS) are extracted and sent down an experimental beam line. Until last week, two methods were used to take those protons away — a slowly extracted beam (SEB) mode and the fast extracted beam (FEB) mode. Tests at the AGS on Monday, January 17, proved that a third extraction mode — single bunch extraction (SBE) — is now ready to offer new opportunities to researchers.

SBE is exactly what its name implies — a method of extracting only one bunch of protons at a time from the AGS. During most of the accelerating cycle, the circulating protons are divided into 12 tight bunches. All 12 bunches are used in SEB and FEB, but for SBE, said Wu-tsung Weng, physicist in charge of the project, "the name of the game is to just pull a single bunch out without disturbing the other eleven."

The SBE mode of operation is crucially dependent on the operation of a beam extraction magnet, which has to meet three critical requirements. First, in the 180 nanoseconds (ns) (ns = one billionth of a second) between proton bunches, enough power, 3 kiloamperes (kA), must be generated to kick out the oncoming bunch. Next, the power must stay within tolerable limits for 40 ns to encompass and eject the entire group of protons. Finally, within the next 180 ns, the power must drop to its zero level, so it will not disturb the next bunch. A sinusoidal waveform with a base of less than 400 ns was found to be ideal for this situation.

To do all this, the SBE mode is dependent on a new magnet, the E-5 kicker, which owes its own existence to another magnet, the H-5 kicker,

employed in 1981 to extract 12 bunches of protons for neutrino experiment 734. The H-5 takes only 180 ns to rise in current from 0 to 3 kA. Then it levels off for 2.5 microseconds to kick out all the beam.

"About a year ago, we went through several conceptual designs for the single bunch extraction," said Weng. "The one we chose was based on putting a spare H-5 magnet at the E-5 position of the AGS ring, to extract a single bunch into the slow beam channel before fast extraction is used on the remaining 11 bunches. The only thing we had to rebuild was a new charging circuitry, to create a very short pulse." This task was assigned to Walter Frey and Steve Bennett.

The final design was chosen in August 1982, and, Weng said, "Everything got accomplished in four months. Because we used the spare H-5, it could be finished quickly; otherwise it would have taken one year just to order the required material."

The January 17th test was the first to combine the magnet body and its new charging circuitry in actual extraction conditions. On hand to observe the results of this crucial test were members of several groups in the Accelerator Department, including the Beam Component Group, which built the magnet kicker; the Electrical Support Group, responsible for the new charging circuitry; the Experimental Areas Group, which set up the D-line to receive the protons extracted by SBE; and the AGS Operations Group, which assisted in the commissioning of the magnet.

Testing began at 9 a.m. and at 1 p.m. observers first knew that one bunch had been extracted (see photos). "It was quite an exciting thing,"

## Safeguards — And The Limits Of Authority

When may shooting someone be justifiable or excusable? That is a question Jerry Cadwell wrestles with as part of his job at Brookhaven.

Cadwell is a lawyer in the Technical Support Organization for Nuclear Safeguards, DNE, which advises the U. S. Department of Energy on how to safeguard nuclear and other sensitive materials. He is the group's expert on constitutional law, criminal law, and administrative law. He also has extensive experience in nuclear engineering, having worked for over 15 years in the nuclear industry as a mechanical engineer.

Shooting — or the use of deadly force — is a major issue in safeguards. Cadwell says there are three ways to safeguard special nuclear material: build a better mousetrap, such as metal detectors; use better computers to keep track of sensitive materials; and employ guards.

The last area is where Cadwell's expertise comes in — knowing the laws on the books, how they work and what new laws are needed. On the practical side, he is also involved in making sure that guards understand their legal position, so they can operate effectively.

Cadwell says that before December 4, 1981, the guards at DOE's sensitive facilities had the same arrest authority as private citizens. In other words, if they made a mistake, they could be charged with false arrest, false imprisonment, and invasion of privacy, among other things.

On December 4, 1981, Congress passed a law pertaining to U.S. property in the custody of DOE or its contractors. It gives DOE guards limited arrest capabilities, which means that if a guard has probable cause, he or she may make an arrest. If it turns out that there was no crime committed, the guard is allowed a reasonable mistake. So if he or she operates reasonably, then there is no liability associated with what they are able to do. The guards now have the same arrest authority as a police officer, but, again, only when pertaining to

## Astronaut To Speak At BNL

Dr. Joseph Allen, Mission Specialist on last November's Columbia shuttle flight, will pay a return visit to Brookhaven on February 7. He is scheduled to speak on "NASA Space Shuttle for Fun and Profit?" at 3:30 p.m. in Berkner Hall. An informal reception will precede the talk at 3 p.m. and those attending the lecture are also invited to the reception.

Allen will be able to renew old acquaintances at BNL. From 1963 to 1967 he commuted between Yale University and the Laboratory where he was doing research for his doctoral thesis in nuclear physics. He was selected for the NASA program in 1967.

He completed flight training at Vance Air Force Base, Oklahoma, and has now logged more than 2,800 hours flying time in jet aircraft. Allen was a member of the astronaut support crew for Apollo 15 and also a staff consultant on science and technology to the President's Council on International Economic Policy. He was NASA Administrator for Legislative Affairs in Washington, D. C. from 1975 to 1978.

Allen returned to the Johnson Space Center in 1978 and was assigned to the operations mission development group. He served as a support crew member for the first orbital flight test of the space transportation system, and in 1980 and 1981 worked as the technical assistant to the Director of Flight Operations.

A telephone interview with the scientist astronaut appeared in the Bulletin on November 5, 1982, prior to his flight in Columbia on November 11. At that time, he was looking forward to doing a space walk with Dr. William B. Lenoir, the first walk from the Columbia shuttle. Although the pair were unable to leave the shuttle because of faulty space suits, they and the two other members of the crew of STS-5 (Shuttle Transportation System), successfully concluded many other tests during their 81 orbits of the earth.

Dr. Allen's talk is sponsored by the AUI Lectureship Committee.

U.S. property in the hands of DOE or its contractors. Cadwell describes the law as part of a general tightening of security. "DOE believes that in light of world affairs, it is prudent to improve security," he says.

He also says passage of the law raised more questions about the guards' capabilities. And that's what led him into his most recent project for DOE — developing a new policy on the use of deadly force.

"When is shooting someone justifiable in the interest of national security?" says Cadwell. "That's a controversial issue, for several reasons."

First, he points out that there are three sets of laws. Under common law, any fleeing felon can be shot. Under modified common law, a fleeing felon can be shot only if he or she has committed a dangerous felony, such as burglary, robbery, rape or arson. Under the model penal code, shooting is justifiable only if the escape of the felon would cause an immediate danger of serious bodily harm or death to someone.

Different states apply different laws, says Cadwell. For example, Texas and Kentucky have adopted the model penal code. New York uses the modified common law. Most other states apply common law.

"There are actually very few federal cases on the books. And where there is no applicable federal law, as is the case in the use of deadly force, the state law normally applies," says Cadwell. So, for example, a guard at a DOE facility in Texas is operating under a different set of laws than one in New York.

To add to the confusion, under the model penal code, it is not clear what constitutes immediate danger or serious bodily harm in the theft of special nuclear materials. In Cadwell's opinion, it depends on how much is being

stolen. He also takes the legalistic approach. What is the law in that state?

"Militant types say, 'shoot first, ask questions later. After all, it is special nuclear material.' In the interest of government security, they say shooting is justified," says Cadwell.

"But, gradually, we have been getting away from a military approach and have been heading toward a more liberal viewpoint," he says. "President Truman could not take over the steel companies in the interest of national security during the Korean War. President Nixon could not authorize wire-tapping. Yet, within this new consciousness, we want to safeguard nuclear materials as best we can. The problem is that the field of safeguards is so new. There are no precedents."

"So the debate continues," he concludes. "And lawyers will do as they always have - look at the law and try to predict how it will be applied."

## Tax Tip: Pension

Effective with the tax year beginning January 1, 1982, employment related pension and annuity income of up to \$20,000 a year can be excluded (subtracted from adjusted gross income) for New York State and New York City income tax returns.

This change in the tax law will apply to retired Brookhaven employees who have attained the age of 59-1/2, and are receiving annuity benefits from TIAA-CREF. This law also applies to beneficiaries of BNL employees who are receiving monthly TIAA-CREF annuity benefits.

Individuals who are required to file a declaration of estimated tax for New York City or State should consider this pension benefit exclusion in computing their estimated taxes for 1982.

## Tune Up The Tune-In Program

What's a Tune-In? Old hands are well aware of it, and over 600 of them have used this device to air a complaint, question a practice, or sound off generally — all in the strictest confidence. Newcomers should know that Tune-Ins provide a means of directing questions or complaints to members of management, while the sender's name is protected.

To transmit your message, get one of the orange Tune-In forms addressed to the Editor of the Bulletin. These should be contained in a plastic box in your building. If there is no such box, let your department administrator know. To order a supply of Tune-In forms, call Frank Norton, Ext. 2534, or Public Relations, Ext. 2345.

When a Tune-In is received at the Bulletin office, it is numbered and

typed without the author's name and forwarded to the appropriate person for reply. The reply is then sent to the employee, and no record is kept of the identity of the writer. Sometimes letters of general interest are published in the Bulletin.

Tune-In queries cover a broad field. In the past year, for instance, they have explored such subjects as the repair of a manhole cover, the 1982 holiday schedule, the cooking facilities in Fleming House, the new IPAP system, and the meaning of an item on paycheck stubs.

said Weng, who explained that this first test was run at a fairly low intensity for the AGS,  $2 \times 10^{12}$ . Testing at full intensity,  $1 \times 10^{13}$ , is scheduled for early February, and will focus on refining techniques for transporting the bunch of protons to a target down the D-line.


As to last week's test, Weng said, "It worked beautifully. The success was a result of a job professionally done by a group of conscientious and competent people." The results were good news not only for all those who helped create the E-5, but also for those who plan to reap its benefits, the researchers who will participate in AGS experiment 745.

In 1979, a CERN/Columbia proposal was submitted for an experiment they called "An Improved Test of QED." QED stands for quantum electrodynamics, a cornerstone of particle physics. Derek Lowenstein, Deputy Chairman of the AGS, explained that the experiment "would put stringent limits in an area of QED where they have not been well-measured." The proposal was approved as AGS experiment 745 with I-Hung Chiang as BNL liaison physicist.


A key component of 745 is that a laser irradiate a target of helium at the same instant it is being bombarded by mu mesons produced by the AGS protons. Since the laser pulse width is limited to a timespread of 50 ns, all of the mu mesons have to arrive on target during the same time interval, which requires the AGS to supply  $10^{12}$  protons (one bunch) in this time window. That was the original motivating factor behind the development of SBE.

Besides expanding the research opportunities available at the AGS during scheduled FEB time, single bunch extraction has ramifications for the Colliding Beam Accelerator (CBA) injection system. Weng explained, "In our original proposal for CBA injection, we required 11 bunches of protons from the AGS, determined by the circumference ratio of the AGS and CBA. So as a bonus, by removing a single bunch out of 12, we have also realized the injection scheme for CBA."

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## A French Scandal

## Quiet, Please

The National Radio Astronomy Observatory in Deer Creek Valley, West Virginia, is within the only National Radio Quiet Zone in the world. In this zone, using giant saucer-shaped telescopes often likened to electronic ears, radio astronomers "collect" radio waves emitted by many kinds of celestial objects, to study the cosmos. Their instruments are now so sensitive that radio silence is imperative if the astronomers' observations are to be precise.

Radio telescopes measure signals so weak that an ordinary fly landing on the back of a deer releases 10 times more energy than all the energy received by all the world's observatories since radio astronomy started in 1933.

And, according to a story from the National Science Foundation, some homely items can make celestial observations go awry.

Interference was once traced to a cow rubbing against an electric fence. Automobiles are barred from getting near the telescopes because spark plugs cause radio interference. NRAO astronomers move about the area in old Checker cabs that have diesel engines which don't use spark plugs. An unexpected series of impulses was found to be caused by a pair of electric hair clippers being used by a nearby housewife. A local resident's electric blanket with a faulty heat sensor was found to be the culprit when radio interference ruined an astronomer's observations.

As special Quiet Zone rules and regulations do not apply to household items, the NRAO relies on the cooperation and goodwill of its neighbors to help solve these problems. In the matter of the electric blanket, for instance, NRAO bought the householder a new blanket that worked properly, and everyone was happy. And the housewife with the electric hair clippers agreed to use these only when they were not liable to cause interference.

To request an analysis send a check to the Cooperative Extension Association, 246 Griffing Avenue, Riverhead, N.Y. 11901. The charge of \$5 for a one-day analysis and \$7.50 for a three-day analysis covers expenses for this non-profit program.

In return for your check, you will receive a food diary form on which you will list the food items and amounts eaten during the selected time period. When the food list is returned, the Cooperative Extension will run it through the Nutri-C.U.E. microcomputer program, written by a nutrition expert in association with a programmer. When the analysis is completed, you will receive a packet which includes a printed analysis of your diet, a customized sheet of comments and suggestions, and two booklets on nutrition and diet.


