




Peace and Good Will

I thought he was finished, but he still pulled out more:


A firehouse, a tunnel, and Phase II to boot;

New ID's Next Year

New car stickers will be issued after the first of the year. Only this time, the stickers will be affixed to the driver's window, not to the bumper. They will also come in two parts: the piece to be placed on the inside of the window is a numbered decal; on the outside, a year tag will be placed in front of the inside sticker. (See diagram). Each year, the year tag will be replaced, otherwise, the sticker remains with the vehicle for as long as the employee owns it.

Safeguards and Emergency Services will be sending out renewal cards, soon, which should be completed and returned, as usual, to Bldg. 50. Drivers of cars which do not display a window

decal after February 15, will have to show a Lab identification card at the gate.

Another change is in the works. Within six months, Safeguards and Emergency Services will issue new identification cards. They will replace the ID's issued by Personnel. Cards expiring in 1984 will be honored until the new ID's are issued. Employees who *urgently* need an updated ID before they receive one in the normal course of events, should contact Personnel Records, Ext. 2875.

He probably won't do that, but if you're on hand next Monday, you can find out.
