

## Leaving the Lab — After 35 Years or More

# Accelerator Physicist Focuses on Retirement Projects

At the end of each month, the Bulletin salutes those employees who are retiring with 35 or more years of Laboratory service.


After a career extending back over 42 years at BNL and loaded with awards, Ernest Courant, a senior physicist in the Accelerator Development Department, is officially retiring on January 1, 1990.

However, since Courant's consulting plans for the future include projects for the Lab's proposed Relativistic Heavy Ion Collider (RHIC) and the proposed national Superconducting Super Collider (SSC), the field of accelerator physics is assured of the continuing participation of one of its foremost specialists.

Among Courant's outstanding achievements in accelerator physics was his role in inventing the principle of alternating gradient focusing in 1952, along with the late BNL physicists Stanley Livingston and Harland Snyder.

Also known as strong focusing, the alternating gradient principle has been critical to the development of advanced accelerators. Within accelerators, particles spin around in a circular path at nearly the speed of light and at energies that rival cosmic rays generated in the galaxy. Keeping the particles in place are two types of magnets: those that bend the particles around the turns, and others that focus them horizontally and vertically.

According to the alternating gra-

dient focusing principle, magnets focus the beam first in one direction and then another. This arrangement allows particles to be focused more strongly. As a result, the smaller particle beam created by strong focusing permits the use of much smaller magnets, and this makes it possible to build high energy accel-

erators at a reasonable cost and size.

Commissioned in 1960 and still focusing strongly, the 33-billion-electron-volt (GeV) Alternating Gradient Synchrotron (AGS) at BNL was one of the first applications of this idea — and one of the first accelerators for which this discovery opened new worlds of exploration into the

elementary constituents of matter.

Findings such as the Omega-minus particle at the AGS in 1963 and the W and Z intermediate vector bosons at CERN's Super Proton Synchrotron in 1983 were only possible thanks to the new principle.

It was also due to alternating gradient focusing that BNL's National Synchrotron Light Source exists today, and that the next decade is expected to see the start of construction of the 20 trillion-electron-volt SSC in Texas.

Courant's expertise with accelerators had been preceded by pioneering work in particle beam dynamics. He came to the Lab in its first year, 1947, as a summer visitor from Cornell.

After beginning work on theoretical aspects of the Cosmotron, BNL's first proton synchrotron, he joined Brookhaven's permanent staff in 1948. Courant developed theories relating to particle beam size growth and loss of beam for this 3-GeV accelerator — the largest in the world when it came on line in 1952.

For his contributions to accelerator physics, Courant has been awarded the 1987 Robert Wilson Award of the American Physical Society, the 1986 Enrico Fermi Award by the Department of Energy, and the 1979 Boris Pregel Award for Applied Science and Technology from the New York Academy of Science.

In May 1988, Courant was also granted an honorary Doctor of Science. (Continued on page 2)

## Longest Lab Library Career Shelved for Retirement

Marilyn Galli has worked within the Technical Library for only one year less than BNL has had a collection of scientific and technical books and journals, and a repository for them.

"My brother took a job here, so it seemed like a good place to work — and the commute was a lot shorter than going to work in the city," says Galli, a Ridge native and former New York City commuter, whose first day at the Lab was April 5, 1948.

After over 41 years of BNL service, all spent in the Technical Information Division (TID), Galli will put in her last day today. "With automation, the library is heading in the right direction, so I feel comfortable about leaving it now," says Galli.

As the library's number of volumes, building and services expanded over the years, so too did Galli's job within TID: She began as a clerk, advanced to library assistant in 1951, moved up to assistant librarian in 1957, was promoted to librarian in 1957, was named senior librarian in 1980, became a supervising librarian in 1981, and assumed the position of library administrator in 1982.

Before the appointment of the present TID head, Galli served as acting Division Manager, from July to November 1988. She was named Deputy Manager of TID in June of this year.

"When I started, I was the youngest member of the staff, and now I'm the oldest — time has gone by quickly," admits Galli. "I've worked in every group in this division, held every job or supervised it. It's been fun." She recalls, "I began by buying

periodicals — new issues and back sets going back to the 1830s," recalls Galli. "I found it interesting learning to recognize the foreign titles and browsing through the old issues.

"I spent the longest time as head of periodicals and circulation," continues Galli, "At the circulation desk, I got to meet a lot of name scientists — like I.I. Rabi — and I was thrilled to be able to help them with their information needs."

Not formally schooled in library science, Galli learned on the job over the years and through lots of seminars and short courses at Adelphi University, C.W. Post College, and the State University of New York at Stony Brook.

"I've worked for the five heads of this division — but the one who (Continued on page 2)

## Fire Chief Ends 42 Years Of BNL Uniformed Service

Having worn a uniform for 50 years — 44 of those years here on site — Fire Chief Frederick Strier of the Fire & Rescue Group, Safety & Environmental Protection, is retiring today after 42 years of service to BNL.

Strier's uniformed service began in 1939, when he enlisted in the Army Air Corps. After fighting World War II in North Africa, Sicily and Italy, he was discharged in August 1945, and went home to Yaphank.

Following his discharge, Strier used his pre-war firefighting experience to land a job at the Army's Camp Upton as one of the 98 firefighters then needed to protect the site. In 1946, when the site was transferred to the Manhattan District, which later was called the Atomic Energy Commission, Strier went along. With BNL's establishment in 1947, Strier became one of the Lab's first employees: Hired on March 21, 1947, he was assigned life number 385.

Moving up the ranks, Strier became Fire Chief in 1985. Under his tenure, the old Bldg. 99, one of two Camp Upton firehouses, and BNL's first and only firehouse, was torn down in 1986. It was replaced by Bldg. 599, the Lab's present, modern firehouse, which shelters two fire apparatus, an ambulance, a rescue unit and a high-pressure fog truck, in addition to the 29 members of the Fire & Rescue Group.

In hanging up his uniform, "I'll be packing in my firefighting days," says Strier. "I've enjoyed my work and the company I've kept, that's why I stayed so long. But enough is enough. I have a lot of work to catch up with around the house that my

wife Viola has been asking me to do for years — like renovate the bathroom."

An East Patchogue resident, Strier will keep close to home during his retirement. "We still have a son at home, Joseph, who turned 14 this Christmas eve, and keeping up with the youngster keeps me young," explains Strier. His three grown children and three young grandchildren also live locally, "so I don't have to go very far to visit — I had enough of traveling when I was in the service," he adds.

Though he'll be out of uniform and clothed in civvies everyday from retirement on, Strier will still polish his shoes every morning. "There are some good habits from the service not worth breaking," he concludes.

ence degree from Swarthmore College, from which he was graduated in 1940. His first doctorate was a Ph.D. in physics, which he earned from the University of Rochester in 1943.

Over the years, Courant has also combined his research with teaching at Yale, Princeton and the State University of New York at Stony Brook. Said Courant, "This was very stimulating to me. I believe that I have helped a few get started in productive careers."

A member of the National Academy of Sciences, Courant recently

served on a committee appointed by the National Academies of Sciences and Engineering to evaluate the proposed locations for the SSC.

Looking back to the first days at the Lab, Courant remembers them as a time of high adventure. "The

Cosmotron was a frontier," he said. "Now, everything seems well laid out, but we are still at a frontier. With the hopeful signs continuing for RHIC, I believe people have not given up on finding new directions for further progress." — Liz Seubert

taught me everything I know about libraries was John Binnington [one of BNL's first employees, hired as a librarian in 1947, who served as TID Officer from 1971-79]," recalls Galli. "I'm still thankful for his encouragement."

An active member since 1962 in the national Special Libraries Association (SLA), Galli became a charter member of its nuclear science division in 1963. She served as the division's secretary in 1975, chaired its nominating committee in 1984-85, and chaired the division in 1987. As well, Galli helped establish the SLA Long Island chapter as a charter member in 1972 and became its secretary in 1977. She also was a member of its editorial board, 1983-86.

In addition, Galli has been a trustee of the Long Island Library Resources Council (LILRC), 1983-87; its secretary 1986; and LILRC president 1987.

While enjoying the holidays at home in Remsenburg, Galli and her husband Jack, who is retired, have been contemplating what they will do next. Galli explains, "We have some property in Virginia and family on the east coast south of Washington, D.C., so we think we'll head south — but first for a vacation."

Galli adds, "So when it's cold and icy here on Long Island in February, I'll be thinking of the Lab — but on a beach in Florida."

To recognize the top 100 technological achievements of each year, Research & Development magazine has sponsored its annual R&D 100 competition for the past 27 years. In 1969, BNL earned the Lab's first such award, and every year since 1984, Brookhaven has captured at least one R&D 100 award, for a total of 13.

Last year's R&D-100-award winner from BNL, a real-time harmonic closed-orbit feedback system developed by Li-Hua Yu and his collaborators at the National Synchrotron Light Source, will be featured in a display, along with 23 other R&D-100 winners from U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) laboratories. On display from January 3 through January 30 in Berkner Hall lobby, the "DOE 1989 R&D 100 Awards" exhibit should make interesting viewing.

Inspired by the exhibit, consider entering the next R&D 100 competition. Eligible for entry is any new technical product that was completed and delivered by a federal laboratory, or became available for contract or licensing between January 1 and December 31, 1989.

To encourage participation in this competition, the Lab pays all entry fees. As well, BNL picks up the tab for any expenses associated with winning R&D 100 awards.


Finally, a heartfelt thank-you to the many people around the Lab who respond to our repeated requests for information or assistance with graciousness and timeliness.
