

BWIS Seminar Nuclear Safeguards And Arms Control

Carol Ruth Kempf of the Technical Support Organization (TSO) in BNL's Department of Nuclear Energy will be the speaker at the next Brookhaven Women in Science seminar, on Friday, August 10, at noon, in Room B, Berkner Hall. She will talk about "Nuclear Safeguards and Arms Control — Current Status."

This lecture will focus on domestic and international nuclear safeguards; the roles of the U.S. Department of Energy in the U.S., in the International Atomic Energy Agency, and in the support programs internationally; types of treaties and agreements under which safeguards are implemented; current areas of concern with respect to safeguards effectiveness; the present negotiation status for conventional forces and chemical weapons; and projects under way in TSO.

Kempf received her B.S. in chemistry in 1976, her M.S. in electroanalytic chemistry in 1980, and her Ph.D. in physical chemistry in 1982, all from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute. In 1981, she was an assistant professor at Fort Lewis College in Durango, Colorado.

After joining BNL in 1982, Kempf spent six years in radioactive waste management working on problems of source-term definition for the commercial low-level waste sector, on management options for mixed wastes, and on modeling radionuclide releases for cesium, strontium, cobalt, tritium, and carbon-14 from waste packages in a low-level waste burial site.

In 1988, she joined TSO, where she has worked on international nuclear safeguards, spent fuel safeguards, and arms control verification issues.

As part of his two-week stay, van Bakkum will present a lecture of Lab-wide interest on Wednesday, August 15. At 4 p.m. that day in Berkner Hall, he will discuss "Bone Marrow Transplantation: Developments and Restrictions of its Application in Clinical Medicine and in the Treatment of Radiation Victims."

DOE Deputy Secretary Visits Brookhaven

To become better acquainted with the many U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) programs at Brookhaven, DOE Deputy Secretary W. Henson Moore (front, second from left) visited the Laboratory on Friday, July 27.


One stop during Moore's visit was in Bldg. 902, where magnets are under development for BNL's Relativistic Heavy Ion Collider (RHIC) and for the national Superconducting Super Collider. There he was joined by (from left) Erich Willen, head of the Magnet Division in the Accelerator Development Department (ADD); John Sondericker, who heads ADD's Engineering Division; Charles Baxter, head of DOE's New York Support Office; RHIC Project Head Satoshi Ozaki and BNL Director Nicholas Samios.

The group is shown here looking into an equipment trench where a RHIC full cell, consisting of two dipole magnets and two corrector quadrupole/sextupole assemblies, is being tested under simulated machine conditions.

Other areas Moore visited during his afternoon at Brookhaven were the Alternating Gradient Synchrotron, the High Flux Beam Reactor, the Medical Research Reactor, the National Synchrotron Light Source, the RHIC ring and PETT IV, BNL's positron emission tomograph.

In addition to touring facilities, Moore received an environmental briefing concerning groundwater contamination problems and remediation programs.

BNL in Partnership With Education

Tune In! — Cashing Credit Union Checks

The Tune In! program is designed to give employees a confidential means of directing questions or complaints to members of management, who respond in writing. If the letter is of general interest, it may be published in the Bulletin while maintaining the employee's anonymity.

For example, this Tune In! came to the Bulletin Editor recently on one of the orange forms contained in plastic Tune In! boxes all around site. The Editor determined that the question could best be answered by the Lab's Fiscal Officer, Mark Israel, so the Tune In! was retyped and sent to him with just a number to identify it. Israel sent the response to Tune In! #772 to the Editor. The reply was then forwarded to the questioner.

Tune In!

I have worked at the Lab for many years and I have always cashed checks, usually weekly. I rarely recall any lines at the

Cashier's office in Bldg. 134 during that time.

Now the cashier will no longer cash Teachers Federal Credit Union (TFCU) checks. It is much more convenient for me to cash checks at the Cashier than at the Credit Union, and I feel this is true for all those who work in buildings closer to Bldg. 134, than to Bldg. 193.

If there's no cost to BNL, why not let the cashing of TFCU checks continue?

Mark Israel's reply

The primary purpose of the BNL Cashier is to carry out specific functions related to the DOE-funded activities of the Laboratory. This includes processing cash travel advances, collecting housing and telephone charge payments, processing bank deposits and fund replenishment vouchers, and reconciling the fund activity daily. About 70% of the Cashier's total job function is not evident to employees who are only familiar with "window activities."

Given the existence of the Cashier for these Lab business-related purposes, we are able to extend certain limited accommodations to BNL employees, visitors and guests as long as there are no alternative on-site means of accomplishing these activities, and no additional operating costs to the Laboratory for which we are

not reimbursed by DOE. The Cashier's function is not now, nor has it ever been, to serve employees' personal banking needs.

It should also be noted that the Fiscal Division has not changed its check-cashing policy. When Barclay's Bank was located on site, it closed its doors at 3 p.m. The Cashier only cashed employees' checks drawn on Barclays after this hour. We previously cashed TFCU checks for employees because while Barclays was on site, the Credit Union did not maintain any cash on hand, and would only issue checks to members withdrawing funds.

Currently, TFCU is open until 4:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday, and until 5 p.m. on Friday, and provides its members with full banking services, including maintaining cash on hand. Therefore, it is not necessary or proper for the cashier to provide personal banking services during these hours to TFCU members.

However, the Cashier will cash personal checks up to \$200 drawn on financial institutions not located on site. Also, any employee having an emergency requirement or non-recurring, justifiable need for cashing a Credit Union check at the Cashier will be accommodated by obtaining prior approval from the Fiscal Officer, Assistant Fiscal Officer, or Manager of Accounting.

Minority High School Apprenticeship Program For Summer Apprentice, BNL is a Family Affair

When Elise Vestal participated in the first of three sessions of BNL's Minority High School Apprenticeship Program, family history was made: three generations of the Vestal family were working on site at the same time. From June 25 to July 27, the tenth-grade Longwood High School student was working at learning science — on the same site where her grandfather, grandmother, father and stepmother have worked for a total of 71 years.

grandfather Alvin Vestal. "She's very willing to learn and she worked hard at it this summer, so we are very proud of her."

This year's program runs from June 25 to August 24 and is offered by BNL's Office of Educational Programs. During the three overlapping sessions of four weeks each, local high school teachers have been introducing this year's crop of 35 students to a new science subject each week.

For the first and third sessions, physics is introduced during the first week by Barbara Riess of Baldwin High School; Arthur Pitschi, also of Baldwin High School, teaches life sciences during the second week, and, for the last week, he discusses energy and engineering; during the third week, Clayton Hudson of Central Islip High School is the chemistry instructor.

During the second session this year, the high schoolers had two weeks of physics taught by Riess, then two weeks of environmental science taught by Jean Clark of Patchogue-Medford High School.

Mornings, the high school students attend classes and see demonstrations on the different subjects. Afternoons, they visit relevant research facilities on site or do lab experiments.

"Biology and medical science were my favorites — because they have to do with people," says Elise Vestal, who, as a ninth grader last school year, took an honors class in high school biology at Longwood and whose best subject is math.

"The lectures were interesting and the demonstrations were fun," she adds, "but I liked the hands-on stuff best of all. We did a lot of work in the hydroponic greenhouse, planting fruits and vegetables in solutions instead of soil. The other two groups will get to reap what we've sown."

"This has been a great experience for her — to learn about science and the Lab," says Elise's father, Alvin Vestal Jr. "She was impressed with what goes on here, and she's impressed the family with all she now knows."

Elise Vestal also participated in a discussion with members of Brookhaven Women in Science. "I was impressed — not many women go into science and even fewer go into engineering," says Vestal. "One of the women, Chu Ng, talked about the difficulties for minority women in science and engineering, and I could relate to what she was saying."

"It has been a good educational opportunity for Elise," reflects her stepmother Donna Vestal. "Now it's up to her to decide whether or not she wants to go into research. One thing is for sure — she's been to more places on site than we have."

"I don't know what I want to be — I keep changing my mind," admits Elise Vestal. "Now it's psychology, before it was journalism — but I still have three more years of high school, then four years of college to figure it out. After my summer here, I'll consider science — maybe biology."

"Before, all I knew about the Lab was that it was a research facility and that my family works here," concludes Elise Vestal, "but now I know what goes on in almost every building on site." — Marsha Belford

Fifteen-year-old Elise is eldest of three daughters of Alvin Vestal Jr., a storeskeeper in the Supply & Materiel Division; his wife Donna Vestal works as a senior technician in the Reactor Division. Elise is also the eldest grandchild of Alvin Vestal, an oiler mechanic in the Central Shops Division, and Grace Vestal, a senior telephone operator in the Computing & Communications Division.

"Elise's such a smart kid and I want all the best for her, so I think this program was a great opportunity for her," says her grandmother Grace Vestal.

For the past decade, the Minority High School Apprenticeship Program has been offering an intensive introduction to modern science to ninth or tenth grade minority students in Suffolk County or New York City high schools who have a demonstrated potential or ability in science.

"This program gave her the chance to learn more about science and to see if that's what she likes," says Elise's

Community Summer Science Program Lectures and Internships For Suffolk High Schoolers

Almost 40 scientists have given freely of their time and talents during BNL's five-week Community Summer Science Program. And some 25 high school students hailing from school districts throughout Suffolk County have been the beneficiaries of their presentations, which began July 9 and run through August 10, under the auspices of the Office of Educational Programs (OEP).

Open to commuting students who have finished their junior or senior years, the annual program consists of daily morning lectures by Lab scientists, as well as tours of appropriate facilities. Seniors may also participate in afternoon internships, doing research with a sponsoring BNL scientist.

Today the participants attend a session on groundwater resources. Earlier sessions were devoted to lectures on condensed matter and atomic physics, nuclear physics and chemistry, nuclear and particle physics, and accelerators.

Next week, the students will learn about medical and environmental science, from physics and medicine of the eye to global climate change. The lectures are open to the Lab community. For more information about next week's schedule, call OEP, Ext. 4503.

High School Honors Science Program Summer Science Studies For Super Students



They've been cycling around site since July 25, and they'll continue using this means of transportation until their program ends on August 7. They're the 59 students now at BNL as part of the nationwide High School Honors Science Program, sponsored by the U.S. Department of Energy.

For the fifth consecutive year, governors of the nation's states have selected high school students to study science at Brookhaven. Students have also come from the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico. This year's program further includes participants from Canada, France, Northern Ireland, Italy, Japan, Mexico, the United Kingdom and West Germany.

The goal of the program is to interest these outstanding academic achievers in science and engineering careers. Six other DOE labs across the country are also participating.

Eleven of these students are shown here as they leave the National

Synchrotron Light Source (NSLS), the focal point of the two-week program at BNL, organized by the Office of Educational Programs (OEP).

At the Lab, the students are divided into ten teams of six, each with a BNL mentor to guide them, from their first formal assignment calculating the Light Source's photon flux to the primary requirement of the program — a written laboratory report that each team must submit on its NSLS experiment by program's end.

Organized by Seymour Katcoff (front, right) of BNL's Chemistry Department, with the support of BNL's Office of Educational Programs, SSNC was established to encourage college chemistry majors to consider careers in nuclear chemistry.

From June 25 through today, 12 juniors and seniors attended lectures four mornings a week. These were given by John Alexander, of the State University of New York (SUNY) at Stony Brook, Daeg Brenner of Clark University, and J. Robb Grover (front, left) of BNL's Chemistry Department.

Lectures were followed by afternoons of laboratory work in Chemistry Department labs and counting rooms. This was supervised by Yung Yee Chu (front, second from left) of the Chemistry Department, with assistance from James Keenan of the Albany Medical College and Edward Baum (front, second from right) of the University of Kentucky.

In addition, two symposia were organized: a half-day session to introduce the students to the nuclear power industry, and a full day devoted to the application of radiochemistry to nuclear medicine.

To earn three lecture and three laboratory credits from SUNY at Stony Brook for their SSNC participation, students wrote three exams and a term paper, and presented oral reports of those papers last Wednesday.
