



## Active Again: BNL's Amateur Radio Club

They talk to others locally and internationally without the use of telephones. They make emergency contacts when ordinary channels of communication are out of commission. They're BNL's "hams" — amateur radio operators who belong to BNL's Amateur Radio Club.

Formed in 1967, the Amateur Radio Club remained active at the Lab until the late 1970s, when interest lagged — but now it's back with a healthy new enrollment of 31 members.

One spark that led to reigniting the on-site amateur radio operators' interest in getting together again was the acquisition of a sophisticated piece of radio equipment known as a "repeater."

"This 10-year-old, \$14,000 repeater had been excessed by the Federal Protective Service, and I was able to obtain it from the Federal Excess Property System using the club's funds, for the cost of transporting it from the Pan Am Building in Manhattan to the Laboratory," said club president Andrew Feldman, Division of Contracts and Procurement.

Feldman explained that, ordinarily, amateur radio enthusiasts with low-power walkie-talkies can only reach a five-mile radius, but with the repeater in place at the base of the Lab's 300-foot meteorology tower, the communication radius increases to about 60 or 70 miles.

Club members joined together to install the repeater on site, and they are now using it to establish new radio contacts as far away as Westchester County. In addition, all club members can use the high-frequency equipment for voice and Morse code transmission in the club's room at the Recreation Building.

According to Alan Bieber of the Department of Nuclear Energy (DNE), the club's secretary, there are various reasons why people become hams. Many amateur radio buffs are interested in electronics and build their own equipment. Others are

primarily interested in long-distance communications and take pleasure in talking to people in as many as 314 countries recognized by the International Telecommunication Union.

Depending on their expertise and the sophistication of their equipment, hams can either use amateur radio to make contacts that are mainly local, or they can make contacts as far away as outer space.

For instance, using equipment that he had set up in his backyard, Feldman was one of 40 ham operators who spoke with astronaut Owen Garriott on the STS-9 mission of the space shuttle *Columbia* on December 4, 1983. In August 1985, Feldman was successful in contacting astronaut Tony England on board the *Challenger* Space Lab II.

Amateur radio operators are often public service minded, and many are active in the Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service. This organization works with the Police and Fire Departments, the American Red Cross, and the Civil Air Patrol to provide emergency communication in times of disaster.

In the aftermath of last year's Hurricane Hugo and San Francisco earthquake, some of BNL's hams connected their computers and radios to the National Traffic System, a data communications network, to aid people in contacting their relatives and friends.

Feldman recalled that he helped Kathryn Lancaster, a librarian in DNE's Technical Support Organization, determine the safety of her parents' boat located in a boat yard off Puerto Rico directly in the path of Hurricane Hugo. Lancaster's father is John Lancaster, a former BNL employee. Fortunately, he and his wife, Phyllis, were in Europe at the time of the storm, and their boat was not severely damaged.

Five days after the San Francisco earthquake, Robert Bacharach of the Management Information Systems

Division (MIS), the club's vice president, was stationed at the ham radio at St. Charles Hospital in Port Jefferson communicating the availability of beds to the Suffolk County Civil Defense office. Bacharach was a volunteer in a practice drill set up by the Federal Emergency Management Agency to determine the feasibility of transporting earthquake victims from the west coast to the east. Coincidentally, the date for the drill had been set weeks before the actual San Francisco earthquake.

Bacharach currently is offering a free, on-site course in Morse code, electronic theory, and Federal Communications Commission (FCC) rules and regulations to prepare BERA ham-radio enthusiasts to take the FCC-sponsored test to get their novice licenses. This is the most elementary of five classes of licenses for which they can apply. Ten students are currently enrolled in the class, which meets every Wednesday in the MIS Conference Room.

Bacharach administered the test early to one student — sixteen-year-


old Shay Berant. The son of a visiting scientist from Israel, Zvi Berant of the Reactor Division, Shay Berant is now a full-fledged ham with a novice license.

In June, BNL Amateur Radio Club members are planning to participate in the nationwide field-day exercise. This event involves a test to determine how quickly hams can set up a portable communication system. Bacharach explained, "We will set up transmitters and receivers powered by generators on site to test how well we can react in an emergency."

The BERA Amateur Radio Club will meet in Berkner Hall, Room A, on Thursday, February 22, at noon.

## In Control at the AGS

Newly remodeled, the control room of BNL's Alternating Gradient Synchrotron (AGS) has a nearly doubled working space (see photo above). At three of the five new consoles,



or workstations, are (left) Pepin Carolan, (right) David Gassner and (foreground, from left) Project Engineer Peter Ingrassia and Donald Barton, Head of the AGS Controls Section. Jonathan Reich (center, back) works at a special safety console, which is used for controlling access to radiation enclosures and managing any response to an emergency.

Flexibility marks the five new general consoles, each of which is linked to a network that allows the console operator to control several, any or all of the accelerator processes throughout the AGS complex. Previous equipment was linked to specific areas.

The new, user-friendly environment incorporates space for future expansion, as well as additional equipment for the Booster, a new accelerator now under construction that will boost proton and polarized proton beam intensities and will enable the AGS to inject all species of heavy ions into the proposed Relativistic Heavy Ion Collider.

And if all goes well, said Robbins, "BNL will have a budget that generally supports our programs and the operation of our facilities."

### 1992 — In Preparation

"Even as we assess 1991 and pick through the dust of 1990, we're preparing for 1992," said Robbins in the Budget Office.

Hauser observed, "The total budget at the Lab has been pretty stable over the past three years — about \$300 million." Whether that will hold true in the Lab's 1992 budget request will not be apparent until after it is submitted to DOE in early April, then reviewed and included in the President's budget next January.

When the BNL budget for FY92 is ready for submission, it will have been reviewed by AUI and DOE. It will consist of some 3,500 pages packaged in about 650 books. By the time that budget is finalized and a reality for BNL, about two years will have passed since it was born in the Budget Office — and the Budget Office will be grappling with a Presidential budget for FY93 and a new budget submission for FY94.

"The whole funding process is very complicated and requires a tremendous amount of coordination and attention to detail," said Henry Grahn, BNL's Associate Director for Administration, to whom the Budget Office reports. "I'm proud of the work that Don Robbins and his Budget Office staff do in managing the budgetary affairs of the Laboratory."

## Pick A Student

Applications for three summer programs run by the Office of Education Programs (OEP) will be available for review between February 20 and March 9, from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., in the Solarium, Bldg. 490, Medical Department. Use the Clinical Research Center entrance and follow the signs.

The three programs are:

- **Summer Students** - The 39 year-old, traditional summer program will provide junior and senior undergraduates with ten-week summer research appointments, June 11 to August 17. OEP pays the individual stipends of \$200 per week and round-trip transportation. The sponsoring department pays for the student's housing at \$75 per week.
- **Summer Interns** - This is similar to the Summer Student program except that appointments are offered to students who have participated in a prior High School Honors Program conducted by the Department of Energy (DOE) at several DOE labs. Generally, these students are finishing their freshman year of college, but a few may be recent high school graduates. OEP pays all costs associated with these students — stipend, travel and housing.
- **Teacher Research Associates** - This DOE program provides an eight-week summer research appointment, June 25 to August 17, to secondary-school teachers of science, mathematics or technology. All applicants have been nominated by their school systems; some were recruited from Nassau and Suffolk Counties, while others come from across the nation. OEP pays all costs associated with these individuals — stipend, travel and housing.

The Laboratory's placement policy is to select the best-qualified candidate for an available position, with consideration given to candidates in the following order of priority: (1) present employees within the department and/or appropriate bargaining unit, with preference to those within the immediate work group; (2) present employees within the Laboratory as a whole; and (3) outside applicants.
