

Two New ATF Experiments Approved

The third annual Accelerator Test Facility (ATF) Users' Meeting, held at Brookhaven on October 15, resulted in the outright approval of two new experiments for the facility and a phase-one approval of another.

The centerpiece of BNL's Center for Accelerator Physics, the ATF is a small linear accelerator, which operates in conjunction with a high-power, short-pulse laser to produce one of the brightest electron beams in the world. By the middle of next year, the ATF will be used by accelerator physicists for research into new methods of accelerating high-brightness beams of electrons and other particles, and producing intense, coherent electromagnetic radiation.

The ATF Users' Meeting drew 38 physicists from around the Lab and the country, who were updated on the progress of the ATF itself and the six previously approved experiments, and presented with proposals for four more.

As the users learned, the ATF injection system has been operational since this spring, producing pulses of electrons with energy up to 4.5 million electron volts (MeV). Within two months, the electrons are expected to be injected into the 20-foot-long linac to be accelerated up to 50 MeV.

By mid-1992, ATF beam will be delivered down a 100-foot-long transport line to three experimental beam lines. Users gave progress reports on the six experiments so far approved to be located at the ends of those beam lines: a laser linac, a visible free electron laser (FEL) oscillator, an inverse Cerenkov accelerator, a non-linear Compton scattering experiment, a FEL spiking phenomena study, and a pulsed FEL wiggler.

After listening to four new proposals the day of the meeting, the CAP advisory committee, which advises CAP Head Robert Palmer on the ATF experimental program, deliberated those proposals for an extra day. The committee is chaired by Maury Tigner of Cornell University and includes Horst Foelsche, BNL; Samuel Krinsky, BNL; and Andrew Sessler, Lawrence Berkeley Laboratory.

They decided and Palmer agreed to approve fully the development of a far-infrared radiation source by Dartmouth College, and an experiment in harmonic generation, to be performed as a proof-of-principle experiment

for the ultraviolet FEL facility proposed by the National Synchrotron Light Source as Brookhaven's future light source.

Further, an inverse FEL experiment has been given phase-one approval. This provides the experimental team with the opportunity to demonstrate important technologies needed for the success of the experiment before beam time is allocated.

AUI Distinguished Lecture

From Laboratory To Boardroom

As a postdoctoral fellow at Brandeis University, Michael Schulhof did research at BNL, from 1970 to 1972 in solid-state physics involving magnetic phase transitions. Since then, he has made a major transition of his own — going from the laboratory to the boardroom.

Today, Schulhof is the highest-ranking American at Sony Corporation, the Japanese-based corporate giant. He is vice chairman of Sony USA, the American division of Sony Corporation. He was also recently appointed president of Sony Software Corporation, a new company created by Sony Corporation to oversee its film, music and electronic publishing interests, which last year netted \$5 billion and employs 18,000 people worldwide.

This prominent business leader has

spearheaded the development, introduction and marketing of compact discs in America, and he was instrumental in Sony's acquisition of Columbia Pictures, Inc.; Guber-Peters Entertainment Company; and CBS Records, Inc., which is now Sony Music Entertainment.

In an AUI Distinguished Lecture entitled "Phase Transition: The Physicist as CEO," which will be held on Thursday, November 7, at 4:30 p.m. in Berkner Hall, Schulhof will discuss his transition from the research labs at Brookhaven to the global hierarchy of Sony Corporation. One of his conclusions is that corporate boards of directors would benefit significantly if they included more scientists. Schulhof's talk will be introduced by BNL's Deputy Director Martin Blume, with whom Schulhof interacted when he came to the Lab as a postdoctoral student.

Schulhof has been a key member of upper management in the Sony Corporation since the mid-70s. He was the first American to be appointed to the board of a major Japanese corporation, Sony Corporation of Japan. He also serves on the boards of directors of Sony USA; Sony Corporation of America; Sony Music Entertainment; Sony Pictures Entertainment; The Museum of Broadcasting; and Computer and Business Equipment Manufacturers Association.

A native of New York, Schulhof earned his B.A. degree at Grinnell College, his M.S. at Cornell University and his Ph.D. at Brandeis University.

Schulhof's talk is part of the lecture series started by Associated Universities, Inc. in 1965, focusing on topics of general interest to the public presented by experts in various fields.

and technical fields; career-oriented displays by various companies that do business with the Lab; a panel discussion on education; and a tour of the Exhibit Center/Science Museum.

T.D. Lee Back as Haworth Scientist

Nobel laureate T.D. Lee, University Professor and Enrico Fermi Professor of Physics at Columbia University, will arrive on Sunday, November 3, to continue his appointment as a Haworth Distinguished Scientist in the Physics Department. Before he leaves on November 8, Lee will have delivered two talks:

• "Fundamental Theories in Terms of Difference Equations" will be discussed on Monday, November 4, in a lecture of Labwide interest, to begin at 4 p.m. in Berkner Hall. A reception will follow.

As Lee will explain, conventionally accepted fundamental theories of physics, such as QCD, the standard model and general relativity, are approximations. He will suggest that since they are not exact, they should be based on difference equations.

• "Are Black Holes Black Bodies?" is the question that Lee will address in his physics seminar on Thursday, November 7, at 11 a.m. in the Physics seminar room, Bldg. 510.

T. D. Lee has had a long relationship with BNL: As a summer visitor here in 1956, he worked with C.N. Yang on the theory of parity nonconservation, for which they shared the Nobel prize in 1957.

The Haworth Distinguished Scientist appointments honor the memory of Leland J. Haworth, BNL's second Director. Haworth lecturers spend from one to three weeks per year in residence at Brookhaven, for up to three consecutive years.

Ukrainian String Artists in Concert

Two prominent Ukrainian musicians — violinist Oleh Krysa and pianist Mykola Suk — will join together to play three Beethoven sonatas at the season's second BERA concert on Wednesday, November 6 at 8 p.m. in Berkner Hall.

A highly-respected artist in the Soviet Union for many years, violinist Oleh Krysa won critical acclaim when he first toured the U.S. in 1971. American critics were again greatly impressed with his performances when he returned 18 years later to give recitals at Carnegie Hall, the Kennedy Center, and other prestigious concert halls. Krysa has won top prizes in the Paganini, Tchaikowsky and Wieniaski competitions, as well as the Montreal International Violin Competition.

In 1971, pianist Mykola Suk won first prize at the International Liszt and Bartok competition in Hungary, and more recently, he made his conducting debut. His reputation as a virtuoso on the keyboard was further enhanced when he performed the complete cycle of Beethoven's violin and piano sonatas with Krysa,

which won great critical praise.

The two artists will perform three Beethoven sonatas in the BERA concert: Sonata No. 3 in E-Flat, Op. 12, No. 3; Sonata No. 5 in F, Op. 24, *Spring*; and Sonata No. 9 in A, Op. 47, *Kreutzer*.

Tickets for the concert can be purchased at the door. Prices are \$12 for general admission, \$9 for students and people over age 65, and \$5 for youths under 18.

Save on Medical and Day Care Expenses With Reimbursement Accounts

If you spend more than \$300 per year on medical deductibles, and unreimbursed health costs or uncovered medical expenses such as eyeglasses and physical exams, then setting up a Health Care Reimbursement Account may save you money.

If your expenses for either private or center-based care for children under 13, or elder care, or day care for a physically or mentally disabled dependent are more than \$300 annually, then establishing a Dependent Day Care Reimbursement Account may save you money.

And, if you have both of these expenses, then you may benefit doubly by signing up for both types of accounts.

What Are Reimbursement Accounts?

Also known as flexible spending accounts, reimbursement accounts allow employees to withdraw tax-free dollars that were set aside through salary reduction to pay for eligible health care and/or dependent day care expenses. By paying such expenses through reimbursement accounts, the cost of these expenses is decreased because of tax savings.

Enrollment for reimbursement accounts is going on now through December 2. For calendar year 1992, eligible employees may set aside \$300 to \$1,500 in a Health Care Reimbursement Account. From \$300 to \$5,000 may be deposited in a Dependent Day Care Reimbursement Account.

Those who work at BNL at least 20 hours a week are eligible to enroll for one or more reimbursement accounts, and all those who want to sign up for 1992 must fill out new forms. For their convenience, those who have 1991 accounts will be sent new enrollment forms, and those employees whose children are enrolled at BNL's Child Development Center will receive a special mailing on the dependent day care account.

"Starting January 1, the Major Medical deductible will be increased to \$250 per person and \$650 per family. And many of our employees with children are now paying \$475 to 495 per month for day care at our own Child Development Center. So, those who have not established reimbursement accounts before should reconsider their options again this year," states Richard Schonberg, Deputy Manager of the Personnel Division. Reimbursement accounts allow employees to use tax-free

dollars to pay for health care and dependent day care costs. By using these before-tax dollars to pay these expenses, employees effectively lower the actual cost of these expenses.

Franklin Federmann, Chief Internal Auditor for Associated Universities, Inc., provided examples of total federal income, New York State income and FICA tax savings based on current tax rates. For instance, if a married employee who has two dependent children, files a joint tax return and takes a standard deduction were to set up a Health Care account with \$750 or \$1,500:

"As you can see, \$750 in medical expenses paid through a Health Care account would cost an employee with a taxable income of \$25,000 or \$35,000 only about \$520 — because of a \$230 savings through a reduction in taxes. Likewise, \$1,500 in medical expenses would be reduced to \$1,040 by a \$460 savings in taxes," explains Federmann.

Federmann's example for the Dependent Day Care account is a married couple earning less than \$53,400, who contribute \$5,000 to the account. Their tax savings comes to about \$2,180, so a \$5,000 expense for day care actually costs that couple only \$2,820.

A Few Caveats

There are a few tips — such as estimating your expected expenses for next year — and caveats — including the "use it or lose it" policy of the IRS regarding money left over in these accounts at the end of the year — that should be understood before signing up for these accounts.

Completed forms must be returned to Personnel Services by December 2, for coverage to be effective January 1, 1992.


