New Mandates Stress Accommodating the Disabled And Getting on Board With the Metric System

Have you been wondering why more handicapped-parking spaces have recently been designated around site? Or why the Bulletin now gives any references to weights and measures first in metric units, then, parenthetically, in English units?

The answers to both these questions — and lots more — lie in two seemingly unrelated federal mandates: the Americans With Disabilities Act and

Presidential Executive Order 12770, which requires the use of the metric system for business-related activities in federal agencies.

Though the two mandates deal with two very different issues, both have the potential to make a strong impact all around the Lab. The two articles that follow summarize these laws and explain how BNL is complying with them.

Task Force Guides Lab In Complying With ADA

When the Americans With Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990 became effective for large employers like the Lab this July, BNL was ready to comply with the letter and spirit of the law, according to Glenn Jennings, Assistant to the Director for Equal Opportunity, who heads BNL's Office of Equal Opportunity.

"Hiring qualified disabled people and providing them with reasonable accommodations when necessary are not new to the Lab because, as a government-owned, contractor-operated facility, we have been complying with the federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973," explains Jennings. "However, to ensure that all BNL's policies and practices were in line with the ADA's requirements as of the July 26 enactment date, an ADA Compliance Task Force has been reviewing them and revising where necessary since May."

Chaired by Robert D'Angio, Manager of the Personnel Division, the task force includes: Bryce Breitenstein, Occupational Medicine Clinic; William Casey, Safety & Environmental Protection Division; Susan Foster, Personnel; BNL Legal Counsel Michael Goldman; Jennings; Robert Kelly, Personnel; Marsha Kipperman, Personnel; and Thomas Timko, Plant Engineering Division.

A forerunner of the ADA, the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 has been prohibiting federal agencies and their contractors from discriminating against people based on disability in employment, programs and activities. Building upon this act and the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the ADA extends federal civil rights protection to the disabled.

"While not a statute requiring affirmative action and hiring goals or timetables, the ADA does give disabled persons the same civil rights as were extended earlier to minorities and women," comments Jennings.

The ADA defines disability as a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits an individual's major life activities, the record of having such an impairment, or being regarded as being so impaired.

According to the ADA, qualified disabled persons can perform what

are called the essential functions of the jobs for which they have applied or at which they work. Essential functions are activities to be performed by the employee that are the reason the job exists, that no or few other employees perform, and/or that require the employee to have certain skill or expertise to perform.

Reasonable Accommodations

If what is called a reasonable accommodation is necessary for a disabled person to apply for a job or a disabled worker to perform his or her job, an employer must provide the accommodation unless its provision would impose an undue hardship on the employer.

Jennings explains that reasonable accommodations include: making

Go Metric Tomorrow — 10/10!

For any country at the forefront of technology, industry and commerce, today's world has created a new essential: compliance with an international system of weights and measures.

In other words, it's time for America not only to wake up and smell the coffee, but also, to pour it out in liters, not cups!

While most of the world has operated under a decimal system of weights and measures based on the meter and the kilogram, most Americans have stuck bulldoggedly with their British cousins in using the non-decimal English system based on the foot and the pound.

Scientists have been more responsive to change, operating comfortably with both systems of weights and measures. So they were ready in 1975, when Congress passed the Metric Conversion Act, encouraging the U.S. to go metric. And they were all set in 1988 when Congress passed the Omnibus Trade and Competitiveness Act, designating the modernized metric system's International System of Units, or SI, as preferred for U.S. trade and commerce. In fact, the U.S. is not alone in making such a change — many countries that were using the pre-SI metric system are also converting.

Now it's time for everyone at BNL to get on the bandwagon and be ready to comply with Executive Order

12770, which President George Bush issued in 1991 and which states: "Each Federal Agency... use, to the extent economically feasible by September 30, 1992... the metric system of measurement in Federal Government procurements, grants, and other business-related activities... Metric usage shall not be required to the extent that such use is impractical or is likely to cause significant inefficiencies..."

Tomorrow — the tenth day of the tenth month — seemed therefore an ideal date for the national laboratories to cooperate in announcing the plans and actions that will ensure the U.S. Department of Energy's (DOE) compliance with the Executive Order.

"Here at BNL, we've been using the metric system in many scientific programs since the 1975 Conversion Act — and before that," commented John DiNicola, Manager of the Laboratory Operations Support Office. DiNicola has been named BNL Metric Coordinator, reporting to E. Parke Rohrer, Associate Director for Management and Physical Plant.

"However," continued DiNicola, "the 1975 Act called for voluntary compliance only, and there was no Labwide change. The new, mandatory policy requires us to accelerate the transition — but, in accordance with DOE guidelines, our focus at this stage is on identifying the barriers

and impediments to change. It's important to go slowly, see what the difficulties are, then work them out."

As Metric Coordinator, DiNicola's first task was to prepare the BNL Metric Transition Plan. "The word 'metrication,' is going to become familiar," said DiNicola. "It means 'an activity that increases the use of SI — the International System of Units.' It includes training and the real-life consequences of going metric, such as changing software and hardware systems and engineering standards."

existing facilities readily accessible and usable, like installing ramps or lifts for those in wheelchairs; restructuring jobs and/or work schedules, like allowing flextime for those who have frequent doctor appointments during the work week; acquiring or modifying equipment, like the Lab's providing telecommunication devices for the hearing impaired; adjusting materials, like making descriptions of open Lab positions available on tape via the telephone; and providing qualified assistants, such as sign-language interpreters during lectures.

"Accommodations are discussed on a case-by-case basis with the disabled employee, with the goal of allowing that person to function independently, with dignity and respect in the workplace," says Jennings. "While in certain circumstances we may not be able to accommodate disabled persons and so cannot consider them qualified for certain positions, most architectural barriers have already been removed in our compliance with Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act, and many personal accommodations are not beyond our ingenuity or financial resources."

43,000,000 Affected

Congress passed the ADA after finding that some 43 million Americans have one or more physical or mental disabilities, that discrimination against Americans with disabilities is a serious and pervasive social problem, and that, unlike individuals who have experienced discrimination based on race, color, sex, national

Because there are so many aspects to consider in making a smooth changeover, the Transition Plan has been broken up into task assignments divided among the department and divisions.

The Personnel Division's BNL Training Office, for example, will have primary responsibility for planning education and training in metrication. The Plant Engineering Division will handle the construction area; the Central Shops Division, mechanical fabrication; the Supply and Materiel Division, central stores. Studying the impact of changing specifications and standards will be the task of the BNL Quality Assurance Office.

Special attention will be given to the effects of conversion on small and disadvantaged businesses, which will be one concern of the Division of Contracts and Procurement. These companies are expected to need additional training, pilot plans and a longer adjustment period.

So far, seventeen task plans have been identified, each with specific efforts, methods and milestones. Tasks will be added, revised or closed as the general plan develops.

Additional Advice

In order to have a consistent approach to the metric changeover, the Lab is cooperating as part of a group of all DOE's Office of Energy Research multiprogram national laboratories. "By sharing what we learn, we should each avoid some problems," said DiNicola. "Also, we can use resources more economically."

Another resource to be drawn on for a well-thought-out transition plan will be the new Metric Transition Committee, selected by Rohrer from a cross section of the Lab. Chaired by DiNicola, the committee's charge is to review and comment on individual recommendations made in the task plans contained in the BNL Metric Transition Plan.

"With everyone working together in a concerted effort, we should be able to find solutions to most difficulties," said DiNicola.

origin, religion or age, those who have experienced discrimination based on their disabilities have often had no legal recourse to redress such discrimination.

In becoming law on July 26 for employers of 25 or more people, ADA Title I prohibits discrimination against qualified job applicants and workers who are or become disabled. This first section of the five-title law covers all aspects of employment: the application process, hiring, wages, on-the-job training, advancement, benefits, and employer-sponsored social activities.

Impact on Operations

As a result, the ADA Compliance Task Force reviewed the impact of this law on the Laboratory's operations and came up with some changes.

For example, when a position at the Lab becomes open, its job description is being rewritten so as to separate its essential functions from activities that are peripheral to the job. The Personnel recruiter and the hiring supervisor will then do their interviewing based on this revised job description, in conformance with the ADA.

Explains Jennings, "For a position that requires heavy lifting, an interviewer may not ask an applicant 'Do you have a back problem?' Since the essential function of the job is lifting heavy objects with or without a reasonable accommodation, an interviewer may ask, 'Can you lift 50 pounds?' A job applicant who has a back problem but can lift 50 pounds safely while wearing a lumbar brace, may then truthfully answer, 'Yes' and continue in the running for this job."

Sessler Returns as Haworth Scientist

As a theoretical physicist, Andrew Sessler's interests are wide-ranging, and his range is underscored by his upcoming return to Brookhaven on October 11, when he will begin his second stay as a Haworth Distinguished Scientist.

Last April, he began this appointment in residence at the National Synchrotron Light Source Department lecturing on free electron lasers. This month, however, he will be found in residence in the Alternating Gradient Synchrotron Department, where he will speak on "Particle Beams, Photon Beams and Plasmas," on Tuesday, October 13, at 1:30 p.m. in the Snyder Seminar Room, Bldg. 911.

When not at BNL under this visiting scientist program that honors the memory of the Lab's second Director, Leland Haworth, or as a current member of the Board of Trustees of Associated Universities, Inc., Sessler can be found pursuing his research on plasma physics and accelerator physics at Lawrence

Berkeley Laboratory, where he was Director from 1973-80. Among his many other activities, Sessler served in 1990 as Chairman of the American Physical Society's Division of Physics of Beams.

Another change ensures that the decision to offer an applicant a position will not be affected by a disability that may be uncovered during a physical exam. If a job classification requires a physical to determine fitness for duty, the Lab must first offer the applicant the job, but may include the condition that he or she pass a post-offer physical.

Finally, so that supervisors are competent and feel comfortable in interviewing and working with the disabled in light of the ADA, they will be provided with training.

Concludes Jennings, "We cannot assume just because a person is disabled, that he or she is not qualified for a job. Instead, we must allow people with disabilities the same opportunity we give to everyone else to compete for the opportunity for a job or to continue working productively. Not only is that the right thing to do, but it is now the law."

Audubon Quartet Opens BERA Concert Series

The Audubon Quartet will begin the 1992-93 BERA Concert Series with a recital in Berkner Hall on Monday, October 19.

Founded in 1974, the Audubon Quartet received widespread recognition early on by winning top prizes in the International String Quartet Competition in Evian, France, and the String Quartet Competition at the Festival Villa-Lobos in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.

In addition to performances at New York's Alice Tully Hall and the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C., the quartet's special engagements have included a performance at the White House for President Carter and, in 1981, a visit to the People's Republic of China as the first American string quartet to perform there. Since 1981, the Audubon Quartet has been in residence at Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, performing and conducting seminars for students.

The program for the Audubon Quartet's BNL concert will include Haydn's Quartet in G Major, Opus 54, No. 1: Quartet No. 4; "Inter-era Dance Suite" by the contemporary composer Peter Schickele; and Brahms' Quartet in C Minor, Opus 51, No. 1.

The Audubon performance will be the first in a series of five concerts at BNL, which will also include:


