

## 300th BNL Lecture: Goldhaber on Fundamental Particles

A landmark in the history of the Brookhaven Lecture series will be established at 4 p.m. on Wednesday, November 16, when AUI Distinguished Scientist emeritus Maurice Goldhaber, nuclear physicist and former Laboratory Director, delivers the 300th lecture, in Berkner Hall. His talk will be on "Universal Properties of Fundamental Particles," and Goldhaber will be introduced by Laboratory Director Nicholas Samios.

Exactly 34 years and 299 lectures ago, on November 16, 1960, nuclear physicist Gertrude Scharff-Goldhaber, who was the initiating force behind the BNL lectures, introduced Nobel Laureate Edward Purcell to inaugurate the series.


Scharff-Goldhaber, who is married to Maurice Goldhaber, joined BNL as its first woman Ph.D. in 1950. Her concept of the BNL lecture series was that each lecture should inform Lab staff, in non-specialized terms, of "what the next person, the next laboratory or the next department is doing." As a result, general audiences have been stimulated almost monthly since that time by firsthand reports on a wide range of forefront science.

On that first occasion in 1960, Purcell, then a BNL research collaborator from Harvard University, spoke to an overflow crowd on "Radioastronomy and Communication Through Space." More talks followed, and, by March 17, 1971, the successful series had reached the 100th lecture, given by Scharff-Goldhaber herself on "Collective Motions in Atomic Nuclei."

Twelve years later, on May 18, 1983, came another milestone — the 200th lecture. Entitled "The Question of Proton Stability," it was delivered by Maurice Goldhaber. However, the 200th was not Goldhaber's first BNL Lecture. On November 15, 1961, he had given the 11th lecture, on "Fundamental Particles of Physics."

The upcoming November 16 talk will be an update, not of the particles' properties, as Goldhaber jokingly remarks, but of our knowledge of these properties, with particular emphasis on the universal quality of many of them.

During his talk, Goldhaber will trace how the idea of fundamental particles began and developed, starting with early Greek history and continuing through the discoveries in physics and chemistry that led to our present knowledge.

To illustrate some of the properties, Goldhaber will draw both on his own work and work with his wife.

For example, the two Goldhabers demonstrated the identity of beta rays and atomic electrons. Also, in a 1957 experiment, Goldhaber and collaborators Lee Grodzins, now at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and the late Andy Sunyar determined that the particle has a negative helicity — that its spin points in the direction opposite to its momentum.

This result advanced the understanding of what happens when an atomic nucleus decays and also confirmed what is known as the V-A theory describing weak interactions. Today, it has become known that negative helicity, or left-handedness, is a property of all particles involved in weak interactions.

Born in Austria, Maurice Goldhaber earned his Ph.D. in physics at the University of Cambridge in 1936. He came to the U.S. in 1938, to the University of Illinois. In 1950, he joined BNL's Physics Department, which he chaired from 1960 to 1961. He then served as Laboratory Director from 1961 to 1973, after which he was named AUI Distinguished Scientist. He has been an adjunct professor of physics at the State University of New York at Stony Brook since 1961.

Goldhaber has served with many of the world's major scientific councils, universities and research centers. He was President of the American Physical Society in 1982, and he is a member of the National Academy of Sciences and the American Philosophical Society, and a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.

For his life's work, Goldhaber has been honored with many prizes, including the 1991 Wolf Prize in Physics. He also received the National Medal of Science from President Ronald Reagan in 1983, and he has been awarded several honorary doctorate degrees from universities in the U.S. and abroad.

### Reimbursement Accounts

Associated Universities, Inc. (AUI), offers two optional flexible spending accounts (FSAs), or reimbursement accounts, which allow employees to use pre-tax dollars to pay for expenses not covered by their health insurance and to cover the cost of child or elder care.

Because the money set aside for FSAs each year reduces employees' taxable gross income, they pay less income tax, effectively lowering the out-of-pocket cost of medical and dependent care.

With the new coverage effective January 1, 1995, expenses submitted to the Health Care Account will be processed on the 16th of each month. Processing of expenses for the Dependent Care Account has been expanded to twice per month, and will take place
