

TIME OUT TO VOTE

The normal working hours for the Laboratory on Election Day, Tuesday, November 3, 1959, will be from 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. However, employees will be paid for the regular day.

Time cards for personnel working the normal day schedule will show 1 500 (3:00 p.m.) as the time out for those leaving at 3:00 and immediately above it in the time-out column will be entered "E-2".

Supervisors of personnel in positions which require service on three shifts will schedule Election Day shifts for two hours in addition to the regular shift schedule but will not require the two additional hours to be worked. Time cards will show the time actually worked and above the figure in the time-out column will be entered "E-2". Consequently, the two hours of time off for voting purposes will be at straight time for all employees.

QUARTETTO CARMIRELLI**

PINA CARMIRELLI..... violin

The Quartetto Carmirelli was founded in 1954 by the celebrated violinist Pina Carmirelli, who plays first violin in the ensemble. A winner of the Paganini Prize, she is today considered one of Europe's leading violinists, as a solo performer as well as in the field of chamber music. In addition, she is a distinguished musicologist and was retained by the publishing house of G. Ricordi to edit the complete works of Boccherini.

In the years since it was founded, the quartet has toured throughout Europe where it is now recognized as one of the most accomplished chamber music ensembles in existence. Following a performance in Paris, the press reported that "The Quartetto Carmirelli possesses the most beautiful qualities of Italian musicians: strings which sing, vitality and bite which permits of subtlest pianissimi without hurting the rhythm, and interpretation and finesse which glorifies all music." In England, they were described as "an ensemble without flaws, which presented an evening of unalloyed magnificence . . . the luminous and varied tone ravished the ear and one was left breathless by the technical virtuosity."

Brookhaven will hear the quartet on their first American tour. The program will consist of the Boccherini Quartet in A Major, Opus 39, No. 2, the Schubert Quartet in A Minor, Opus 29, and the Ravel Quartet in F Major.

The concert will be given in the Research Staff Lounge on Monday, November 2, 1959 at 8:30 p.m. Tickets for the series of five concerts are available at \$7.50 for adults, \$2.50 for children. Single admission to the concert will be \$2.00 for adults and 75 cents for children. All laboratory employees and

BERA is . . . an association formed by the employees which promotes athletic competition, and cultural and social activities on the site. All employees are members.

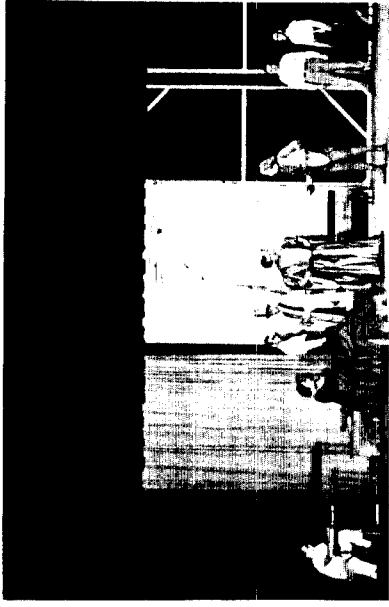

Most important, Board members are the employees' representatives. Therefore, your suggestions concerning the recreation program should be directed to your Board members.

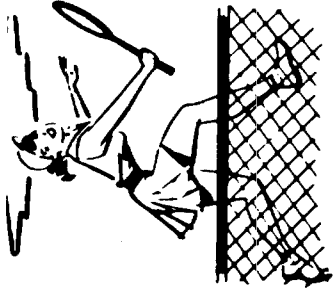
BERA is composed . . . primarily of organized groups of employees participating in recreational and cultural activities approved by the Laboratory. At this date members can participate in the following clubs and activities:
