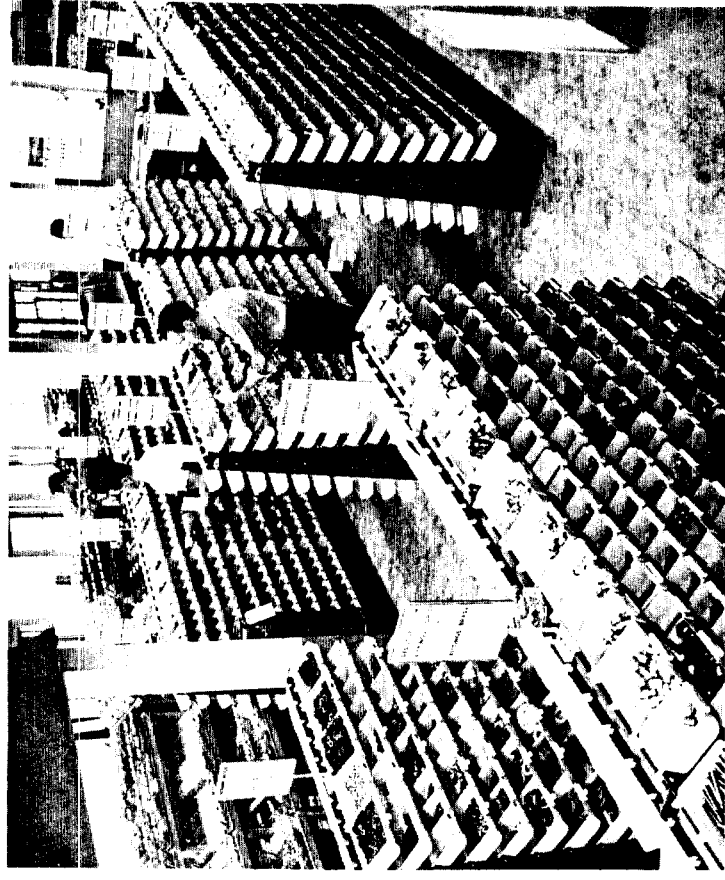

LOCKS, STOCKS & BARRELS



Supply and Materiel Division personnel are associated, either directly or indirectly, with almost every program, project or fabrication conducted by BNL. They are responsible for all shipments, receipts, issuances, warehousing, redistribution and disposal of all supplies and equipment used to conduct the Laboratory's business. They initiate and maintain adequate records relating to the above to ensure proper utilization of supplies and equipment to protect the interests of the Laboratory and to safeguard government property.

Property Management maintains records of all items of capital equipment from time of purchase until ultimate disposition. It also maintains an inventory of all non-expendable property items belonging to the Laboratory, including items on loan to other institutions or to individuals. Accountability of the departments for non-expendable property items under their control is established by means of capital equipment control cards covering some 2,200 line items representing 22,000 individual items having a value of approximately \$7,000,000. During the past year a close review of excess lists of other governmental agencies, together with the cooperation of requisitioners of the Laboratory staff, has resulted in the Laboratory obtaining material worth approximately \$265,000 at a cost of \$37,350.

In the past fiscal year \$1,500,000 worth of materials and supplies, or approximately \$1,000 for every individual employed on the Laboratory site, were issued through the Stores Section of the Supply and Materiel Division. During this period the Receiving Section handled approximately 25,000 receipts which were checked, repacked and delivered to the appropriate consignee. In all, approximately 20,000,000 pounds of materials were handled by the Supply and Materiel Division.

During a one year period, the Second-hand Store, Building 87, located in the railroad siding area, salvaged and returned to use within the Laboratory, material of a general purpose nature worth approximately \$40,000. Material in the Second-hand Store is available, at no charge, for authorized use on the Laboratory site.

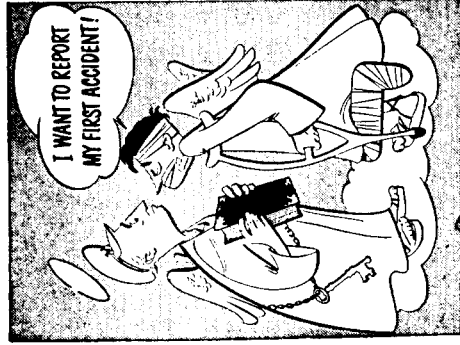
The Self Service Store, Building 100, is arranged so that any of 5,500 stock items can be readily located. A reference and lending library of manufacturers' and vendors' literature is maintained in Building 100, by the Catalog Section. This library has on hand approximately 200,000 catalogs, brochures, pamphlets, etc., representing some 5,500 firms. In addition, the Catalog Section publishes catalogs of material carried in stock.

Among other things in its operations as a service division, the Supply and Materiel Division picks up salvageable scrap material, excess material and equipment, cleans up vacated buildings, provides and moves furniture, repairs typewriters and office machines, arranges for transportation of materials anywhere within the gravitational field of the earth, provides interior decorating services, and maintains a stock of 15,000 items of such diverse nature as dishes, diapers and dog food.

RED LEAGUE

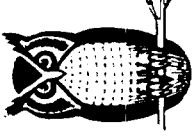
