FOOD SERVICE AT LABORATORY UNDER NEW MANAGEMENT

Starting last week, the Slater Food Service Management took over the operation of food services at the Laboratory including the restaurant at Brookhaven Center as well as the cafeteria, snack bar, and vending machines. Currently, the mobile canteen service has been suspended, but it is expected that this will be resumed after the first of the year when a new "lunch wagon" will be put into operation.

GOLD-MOUNTED SCARAB AWARDED WHEN FEET ARE SAVED BY SAFETY SHOES



A valuable and attractive new National Award is now available through the Laboratory to any employee whose feet are saved from injury by safety shoes, on or after September 1, 1959.

The Award includes a Certificate, suitable for framing, listing the details of the accident in which injury was prevented, plus a gold-mounted Scarab that can be worn as a lapel-pin or tie-tack, to show membership in the Scarab Club.

The scarab is a hard-shelled Egyptian beetle, worn as a good-luck charm by the pharaohs of ancient Egypt to ward off evil. It is used as a symbol of The Scarab Club for the hard-shelled steel toe cap that wards off injury in safety shoes.

It is estimated that every year, safety shoes save the feet of over 200,000 men and women in industry from serious injury or permanent disability in foot accidents!

If you should be involved in an accident involving feet or toes and you are protected from injury or suffer only minor injury as a result of wearing safety shoes, get in touch at once with the Safety Office, Ext. 591. They will give you an application for membership in The Scarab Club, and you will be proud to show the Scarab Club Award and emblem as evidence of your Safe Thinking.
