Audubon Wildlife Film Presented by BERA

With Grand Teton National Park as the setting, Charles T. Hotchkiss of the National Audubon Society will present his film "Teton Trails" on Tuesday, September 22, at 8 p.m. in Berkner Hall.

The magnificent Teton Range which lifts abruptly from the valley to a height of over 7,000 feet, bordering Jackson Hole, Wyoming, provides a striking backdrop for this colorful film. The mountains take on different aspects at different times - they reflect an alpine glow at sunrise; mirrored magnificence in the lovely piedmont lakes of early morning; tremendous rocky spires at midday; and rugged silhouettes against a brilliant sky at sunset.

Mr. Hotchkiss creates a panorama of the past, present and future of this western territory in Teton Trails. We follow the many animals, large and small, who forged the first trails into this isolated valley. We visit Indian villages and examine artifacts of the tribes that spent their summers hunting and fishing in the shadows of the Tetons. The proud history of this land reveals stories of mountain men, gold miners, and settlers who in turn followed these trails seeking fortunes and futures.

Today the main trails of the Teton Range are preserved and maintained in the Grand Teton National Park. They are still a lure to those seeking the solitude and adventure of the back country wilderness.

As we wander through this lovely land we come upon a newly born moose calf, and a sage grouse on the traditional strutting ground. We watch the nesting and ensuing family life of the majestic trumpeter swan, on its way back from near extinction.

A dramatic and fitting climax to the film is the climbing of the Grand Teton, the highest peak of this range. The climb requires about 2,000 feet of rope work, and there are many exciting and thrilling moments.

Admission will be \$1.25 for adults and \$.75 for those under 18. Tickets may be obtained at the door, in advance through members of the Mountain Club, or at the Recreation Office.
