The Lucarelli/Norell/Siebert Trio — Wednesday, December 7

Flutist Rene Siebert and oboists Bert Lucarelli and Judith Norell combine their talents in playing music from 18th century Bach to 20th century Berio.

The Herrick Quartet — Friday, March 9

The Herrick Quartet plays works for flute, violin, viola and cello, written by major composers such as J.C. Bach, Mozart and Copeland.

Agustin Anievas, Pianist — Tuesday, April 3

Pianist Agustin Anievas was last at BNL five years ago. Those who recall his magnificent performance will not want to miss this concert.
