Native Plants

Prairie Willow

Botanical Name: Salix humilis

Sun Exposure: Full sun to partial shade

Blooms: early spring

Soil Types/Tolerance: Adaptable to a wide range

of soil conditions.

Plant Habit: Deciduous shrub growing 3-9' tall and 4-8' wide with white flowers (catkins) from March-

May.

Other Notes: Willows provide some of the greatest benefits to wildlife offered by any plant.

Beneficial for pollinators, it acts as a host for many species of moths and butterflies

and provides food and cover for birds and other wildlife.





American hazelnut

Botanical Name: Corylus americana

Sun Exposure: Full sun to partial shade

Blooms: early spring

Soil Types/Tolerance: Moist, well-drained soils. **Plant Habit:** Deciduous shrub or small tree

grows to a height of 6-15'.

Other Notes: Flowers provide an early spring food source for native pollinators and this plant

is a host for the larvae of many moth and butterfly species which, in turn, are an important food source for countless bird species. Produces edible nuts in late summer that are highly attractive to a variety of wildlife.
