New Houses Under Construction - \$5,250 and Up

On the south side of the street between Union Avenue and Beachfern Road, Center Moriches, there are five houses, two of which have been completed. These have been built by Peter Steenland of West Sayville, and the agent is August Stout, Jr. of Center Moriches.

They are two-bedroom houses in which the following is offered: complete plumbing, 3-wire electrical system and fixtures, automatic oil heat with outside 275-gallon tank, kitchen cabinet sink with kitchen cabinet and complete bathroom fixtures. There is asphalt tile in the kitchen and bath. Interior and exterior decorations are included. The plots of ground are large, and the area is wooded. Water is by individual well and each house is equipped with a cesspool.

The cheapest house, at \$5,250, can be purchased for \$750 down, leaving a first mortgage of \$4,500. This is an F.H.A. mortgage for fifteen years at 4-1/2%. The monthly carrying charges on this mortgage for interest and amortization are stated by the builder to be \$36.17 per month, including F.H.A. insurance. A G.I. mortgage can be arranged for very little cash. The builders are prepared to make second mortgages to \$300, which would leave a down payment of \$450.
