## CONCERT SERIES

The sale of concert group memberships has progressed so satisfactorily that the committee has now made definite arrangements for all five concerts of the series. We are very fortunate in being able to bring to BNL five outstanding musical events this winter.

Here are the dates:

On Thursday, November 30, famous singer, guitarist and musicologist, Richard Dyer-Bennet, who has toured the country for several years as a "20th Century Minstrel", will be heard in a recital of ballads, folk songs, and little known art songs of many eras and countries.

On Thursday, January 4, a program of violin and piano sonatas will be presented by Israel Baker and Yaltah Menuhin, a team which has delighted West Coast audiences with their fine performances for several seasons.

On Monday, February 5, we shall have the rare pleasure of hearing a harpsichord recital by the brilliant young harpsichordist Fernando Valenti, whose European and South American tours have won wide acclaim and who recently gave a very successful Town Hall concert.

On Monday, February 26, the well-known Juilliard String Quartet, which was heard and enjoyed here last year, is coming for a return engagement.

The exact date for the final concert, a recital by world-famous pianist William Kapell will be announced later. It will be sometime in April.

All concerts will be held in the Research Staff Lounge, at 8:30 P.M. Concert group memberships are still available at \$5.00 each from the people listed in last week's Bulletin Board.

## CUP OF COFFEE TO BE 7¢ IN LABORATORY CAFETERIA

It has become necessary to raise the price of a cup of coffee to 7¢ in the cafeteria effective on Tuesday, November 21st.

With the general decrease in volume following the departure of summer visitors and construction workers employed by the H.K. Ferguson Company, the volume of sales in the cafeteria has had a substantial decrease. Recently, despite operating economies, the cafeteria showed a net operating loss last month and indications are that this loss will continue at the present volume of business.

Although food costs and particularly the cost of coffee has been rising, the rising costs have not been reflected in cafeteria prices which are the same as they were a year ago. It is hoped that by raising the price of coffee to seven cents per cup no further increases in other prices will need to be made.

In addition, Howard Rose, Cafeteria Manager, has been substituting lighter cups for the heavy cups which were originally used to serve coffee. In these new cups, you are served an ounce more of coffee than you were served in the older and heavier cups. The cost of a cup of tea likewise will be increased to 7¢.
