If laughter is medicine, "that doeth the heart good", then audiences may expect a full evening of healthy chuckles and guffances when they view "BLITHE SPIRIT" by Noel Coward on June 11, and June 12, in the BNL Theatre. Mr. Coward has contrived a very funny and amusing plot which pokes very genteel fun at a phenomena of our civilization - the "ability" of some "gifted" persons to communicate at will with former occupants of this terrestrial sphere. The "gifted" one in this play is a Madame Arcati, being portrayed by our vivacious Patricia Towey of the Physics Office. Bryan Reuben, of Chemistry, interprets the lead role of Charles Coudimine, the writer, who, in search of material to discredit believers in occult powers, brings on his own head a delightful series of demonstrations which shake his skepticism, no end. This role was done on Broadway by Clifton Webb.

The role of Ruth Coudimine belongs to Joan Shinowski, related by marriage to the Cosmotron's Fred Shinowski. The engaging Elvira, who "comes back" from "out there", at Madame Arcati's request, is being gracefully and enjoyably portrayed by Cynthia Corngold, who in real life, is the power behind the brain of Noel Corngold of Reactor Theory.

Supporting roles are: Mrs. Bradman, by Barbara (Mrs. Clifford E.) Swartz, who was seen last in THREE ANGELS; Dr. Bradman, by a theatre group veteran, Johnny Gorr; Edith, the maid who aims to please, by Rosemarie Rizzo, who wears a band of gold provided by Francis Rizzo of Health Physics.

Walter Hamilton, of Chemistry, and currently president of the Theatre Group, is directing. Rehearsals are well under way. In the language of Variety, it looks like a SMASH!


