BERA FILM SERIES IKIRU

Directed by **AKIRA KUROSAWA**
(director of *Rashomon*)

January 4 - Lecture Hall - 8:30 p.m.

On January 4, BERA proudly presents Kurosawa's *Ikiru*, long claimed by critics to be not only one of the greatest pictures of Japan but also one of the world's great pictures. In the first season of Japanese films presented at The Little Carnegie Theatre in New York, and in the national release, this film won the widest popular interest, the warmest critical praise, and one of the year's top festival awards.

Ikiru is the story of the search for the meaning of life by a man who knows he has only a short time to live. It is a search illuminated by some of the most brilliant cinematic images ever seen on the screen and by the memorable, matchless performance of its leading actor.

SOCIAL SECURITY DEDUCTIONS INCREASE

Effective January 1, 1962, the Social Security Law requires an increase in your Social Security deduction, to 3½% of the first \$4,800 earned. This will mean an annual deduction of up to \$150, instead of \$144 under the old maximum rate. The Laboratory, of course, must increase its contribution to match its employees', dollar for dollar.

The change in the Social Security Law was passed by Congress last summer, when taxes on both employees and employers were raised in order to make increased Social Security benefits possible.

PAWSEY NAMED DIRECTOR OF NATIONAL RADIO ASTRONOMY OBSERVATORY

Joseph L. Pawsey has been appointed Director of the National Radio Astronomy Observatory at Green Bank, West Virginia. He will succeed Otto Struve, first Director of the Observatory, who is returning to full-time research and writing. The announcement was made on December 18 by Alan T. Waterman, Director of the National Science Foundation, and I.I. Rabi, President of Associated Universities, Inc. The Observatory is managed and operated by AUI under contract to the NSF.

Dr. Pawsey, an internationally known radioastronomer, was born in Australia and is now Assistant Chief of the Division of Radiophysics of Australia's Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organization. He will assume the directorship of the Observatory in October, 1962. In the interim, Dr. David S. Heesch will serve as Acting Director.

COME ONE — — — — COME ALL BOWLING TOURNAMENT TIME AGAIN



Another BNL Open Bowling Bout is scheduled for 3:00 p.m., Saturday, February 3, at the Port Jeff Bowl. All new bowlers are welcome; bring your wives, girlfriends, husbands, boyfriends — mother-in-laws too! Make it a day to remember. Hurry with your entries — only 64 teams can be accommodated. You don't have to be a league bowler to enter our Mixed Doubles Tournament.

Here are the rules:

1. A team shall consist of two bowlers, one male and one female. At least one member of each team must be a BNL employee (per BERA definition).
2. The tournament shall consist of three games per bowler, bowled across six lanes.
3. Handicap (per bowler per game) shall be arrived at by using the standard BNL bowling rule which is 80% of the difference between the bowler's average and 200. Average used must include at least 15 games.
 - a. Bowlers in BNL leagues this season use BNL average as of 12/29/61.
 - b. Bowlers not in BNL leagues this season, but who bowled in BNL leagues last year, use final BNL average of last year.
 - c. Bowlers not in BNL leagues this season or last, but who bowl in other leagues (this season only), use highest current sanctioned average as of 12/29/61.
 - d. All others use score of first game for first game average; use scores of first two games divided by 2 for second game average; use scores of first three games divided by 3 for third game average.
 - e. Maximum handicap allowed per game for men is 70 pins; and there is no maximum handicap for ladies.
4. Prizes will be based on scores plus handicaps and awards given as follows:
 - 1st Place Team** — Two trophies and certificates for two custom fitted bowling balls. (Team High Gross Series.)
 - 2nd Place Team** — Two trophies.
 - 3rd Place Team** — Two trophies.
 - Ladies' Individual High Gross Game** — One trophy.
 - Men's Individual High Gross Game** — One trophy.

The above prizes are guaranteed for the minimum number of tournament entries (30). Additional prizes will be awarded based upon the number of team entries in excess of 30, e.g., 4th and 5th place teams, 2nd place ladies' and men's individual games. No ABC or WIBC prizes!
5. Team entry fee, including the cost of bowling, is \$5.00. Entry blank and fee must be presented at the Recreation Office not later than 3:00 p.m. on Friday, January 26. No entries will be accepted after the first 64 have been received. The fee is non-refundable; only in the event that the minimum number of team entries (30) is not reached will the fee be refunded and the tournament called off. Teams not present and ready to bowl at the start of the tournament will forfeit the team fee.
6. The rules of the American Bowling Congress are adopted for this Tournament except as otherwise stated herein.
7. Decisions of the Tournament Committee (G. Sabine, L. Baker, J. Reidl, J. Pontieri, J. Sucher, H. Bieselin, J. Kampe) shall be final.
