

SOCIAL SECURITY

Question: I will be 62 this month and I understand that I can retire and get Social Security, but that my monthly benefit will be less than I would get if I were 65. Can you tell me how much of a reduction I will have to take if I decide to draw my Social Security benefits now?

Answer: Your monthly Social Security benefit will be reduced by 20 percent if you apply as soon as you reach 62. For example, if your earnings under Social Security would qualify you for a benefit of \$100 at age 65, you would be able to collect \$80 a month at age 62. That \$80 a month would continue to be payable to you even after you did reach 65. It would generally not go up - unless you returned to work and had earnings high enough to require the withholding of your benefits for some months.


On July 11, a group of French students from the Ecole Nationale Superieure de Mecanique will tour the Laboratory.
