

A SUMMER TO REMEMBER



Thursday — September 20 — Lecture Hall — 8:30 p.m.

There is little doubt that a revolution is taking place in Soviet cinema, with the past themes of heavy historical dramas and Soviet war hero propaganda giving way to human interest stories about real people. "A Summer to Remember" is a simple story of a five-year-old boy getting to know, and to love, his new stepfather. It is seasoned with wonderful humor, contains none of the false sentimentality that typifies films about children, and is remarkable in its concentration on emotional truth. The performance of the child in itself is enough to make it a noteworthy film, for he doesn't seem to be acting. He is as natural and winning in his ways as was Enzo Staiola in "Bicycle Thief." Throughout, the directors have taken the view of the child, even in much of the camera work. It is their first feature length film, but certainly should not be their last.

The short subject will be Martha Graham's "Night Journey." This remarkable twenty-nine minute motion picture is one in a series put out by the great dancer, and provides an enormously valuable document of one of the stars most celebrated Greek dance-dramas. Sophocles great tragedy, "Oedipus Rex," tells of the day when the Hero King of Thebes, and Jocasta, his Queen, learned that they were son and mother. When the tragic day had ended, Jocasta had hanged herself and Oedipus had put out his eyes and fled the kingdom. "Night Journey" takes place at the moment of Jocasta's death.

SOLUTION TO CHESS PROBLEM

The key move to the solution is 1 Q-QR1! And the various sequels have each their own distinctions.

1... P-K6 is met by 2 Q-R1†, P-K5 3 Q-R5†, P-K4 4 Q-B7 mate.

1... P-B6 is almost a mirror image of the first line: 2 Q-R2†, P-B5 3 Q-R5†, P-B4 4 Q-R8 mate — or an "echo," as this sort of parallelism is called.

1... P-Q6 is non-symmetrical with the other defenses and leads to an entirely different sort of sequel: 2 Q-B3! — in chess play, we'd call this a "quiet" move; here it is a "waiting" move.

Now Black has two types of replies:

On 2... P-Q7 or 2... Pxp, White has what may be called an ultra Epaulette mate by 3 QxQP or 3 Q-Q2.

On 2... P-K6, White replies 3 Pxp. And now, in response to 3... Pxp, he has a regular Epaulette mate, 4 QxQP. And, in response to 3... P-K7, 4 QxQBP is mate. And finally, on 3... P-K5, he mates with a slightly different touch, by 4 Pxp mate!

A small heart was opened. Declarer thought of what would probably happen if won with the queen, took a diamond finesse that would probably lose, and then got a spade switch. So he took East's jack with the ace to give West the impression that East had the queen. He then led the nine of clubs to the king, returned the queen of diamonds, and dropped the nine under it, to deceive as to his actual diamond length. West won and returned a heart. A spade return would have brought in five spade tricks and five heart tricks, for down seven. Instead, declarer made three overtricks.
