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DR. TAPE APPOINTED A.U.I. OFFICER

Dr. Gerald F. Tape, Deputy Director of BNL, has been appointed a Vice President of Associated Universities, Inc. The appointment was made at a meeting of the Executive Committee of A.U.I. on January 18 and announced the following day by I.I. Rabi, President.

Dr. Tape assumed the Vice Presidency immediately on a part-time basis. His gradual transition from Laboratory duties to those of his new position is expected to be completed sometime this spring.

Dr. Rabi stated that while the Board of Trustees of A.U.I. fully realize Dr. Tape's departure from the active management of the Laboratory is a serious loss, it is hoped that his wider responsibility in A.U.I. will enable him to be of even greater service to science and the United States.

TEN YEAR PINS PRESENTED

The annual ceremony for awarding Ten Year Pins and Certificates, honoring those employees who completed ten years of service during 1961, was held on Tuesday afternoon, January 16, at the Brookhaven Center.

Dr. Maurice Goldhaber, Director of BNL, made the awards to 115 employees, hired in 1951. He noted that they represent one-third of the total 345 employees who joined the Laboratory during that year. In his talk, Dr. Goldhaber defined the pins as expressions of appreciation for help in making Brookhaven an outstanding Laboratory which serves as the forerunner on many scientific fronts. He expressed the hope that in the future we will see a more sociable, less remote, life here at Upton.

With Tuesday's ceremony, the number of Brookhaven employees who have received Ten Year Pins reached 831. Of these, 698, or 83.9%, are still working at the Laboratory.

On January 19, three members of the Board of Trustees of A.U.I. received Ten Year Pins at a meeting of the Board. Those awarded the pins were Joseph C. Elgin of Princeton University, C. Hamilton Sanford of Yale University, and LaRoy B. Thompson of the University of Rochester. Joseph F. Lord, Assistant Treasurer of A.U.I., also received a pin.

BNL TO ACT AS HOST FOR OVER 450 NEW YORK STATE SCIENCE TEACHERS



Meeting last Thursday of the local Planning Committee for the STANYS Conference.

The Annual Winter Conference of the Science Teachers Association of New York State (STANYS) will be held at the Laboratory this Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, January 25 through 27. This is the first time that STANYS, in the sixty-six years of its existence, has held its Annual Conference on Long Island.

The three-day program for the Conference includes an address by Dr. Robert Charpie, Consultant to the United Nations Conference on the Use of Science and Technology in Underprivileged Countries, on "A World-Wide Look at Science and Technology." At the Conference banquet on January 26, Dr. John Dunning, Dean of the School of Engineering at Columbia University, will speak on "New Directions in Science Teaching." Among other scheduled events are special interest sessions under the title "Presenting New Horizons in Science Education"; parallel sessions on the life and physical sciences; and demonstrations and panel discussions on science teaching in physics, biology, chemistry and astronomy.

Two highlights of the STANYS Conference program will be a tour of BNL facilities, including the Reactor, the Hot Chemistry Laboratory, and the Biology Department, and a special "Meet the Brookhaven Scientists" session.

Over 450 members of the Association, coming from all parts of New York State, will be attending the Conference as guests of Brookhaven. The group is one of the largest ever to visit the Laboratory over a period of days. While a few of the guests will be housed on site, the majority of the teachers must, of course, be accommodated at neighboring hotels and motels.

"THAT" BAND IS COMING!


That's right! Herman Stenzler, who was such a fabulous success at our last dance, has been signed to provide the music and entertainment at the Valentine Dance on February 16.

Reviewing a New York recital, the New York Herald Tribune wrote in October, 1960: "Daniel Abrams is a pianist who communicates . . . whose power of musical projection is matched by what can only be a deep personal involvement with the works he performs . . ."

Mr. Abrams' program will include works by Scarlatti, Mozart, Schumann (Faschingsschwank), Beethoven (Waldstein Sonata) and Chopin.
