## DR. WINSCHÉ TO ASSUME CHAIRMANSHIP OF NUCLEAR ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT



Dr. Warren Winsche has joined the Brookhaven staff as Chairman of the Nuclear Engineering Department effective June 25, to succeed Dr. Clarke Williams.

A native of New York, Dr. Winsche received his B.S. from the Polytechnic Institute of Brooklyn, his M.S., from the University of Rochester, and his Ph.D. from the University of Illinois in 1949.

Since Dr. Winsche was one of the pioneers at Brookhaven, he will be returning to familiar sights. He worked with the initial group of scientists and engineers in the design and construction of the BNL Graphite Research Reactor and the Hot Laboratory. Dr. Winsche was involved in the original development and design work for the Liquid Metal Fuel Reactor program at BNL. When he left the Laboratory in 1951, he was Head of the Chemistry and Chemical Engineering Division of the Nuclear Engineering Department.

For the past eleven years, Dr. Winsche has been with the E.I. DuPont de Nemours & Company as Engineer and Research Manager, and has spent most of his time at the Savannah River Laboratory. Many improvements in fuel reprocessing technology and reactor technology at Savannah River are due to his leadership in this field.


There will be an informal reception at the Brookhaven Center after the Friday night lecture.

**DR. VAN SLYKE HONORED**



A new American Medical Association honor, the Scientific Achievement Award, will be presented to Donald D. Van Slyke, Ph.D., who is a member of the BNL Medical Department.

The award, a gold medal, was created by the AMA to recognize outstanding contributions to medical science by non-physician scientists. It will be presented for the first time at the annual meeting in Chicago during the presidential inaugural ceremonies on Tuesday, June 28, at the Conrad Hilton Hotel.

Dr. Van Slyke, formerly with the Rockefeller Institute, has achieved world wide recognition for his work on amino acids, kidney physiology, blood electrolytes, gases and acid-base balance, micro-analysis methods and research in metabolic disease. He developed a system of clinical bio-chemical analysis by gasometric techniques, and every modern clinical laboratory employs the volumetric or manometric Van Slyke apparatus. He elucidated the acid-base balance of human body fluids and made contributions to the clinical management of acidotic states. Currently, Dr. Van Slyke is developing a system of clinical ultramicrochemical analysis.

Dr. Van Slyke was awarded an honorary doctor of medicine degree by the University of Oslo, Norway, and on May 28, 1962, received an honorary M.D. degree from the University of Amsterdam in Holland, the home of his ancestors. He also holds other honorary degrees from institutions throughout the world.
