DR. FALK APPOINTED ASSOCIATE DIRECTOR



Dr. Charles E. Falk has been appointed Associate Director of the Laboratory as of April 1, 1962. The announcement was made on March 21 by Dr. Maurice Goldhaber, Director.

Dr. Falk, who was born in Hamm, Germany, received his B.S. degree from New York University and his Ph.D. in physics from the Carnegie Institute of Technology in 1950. At that time, Dr. Falk joined the research staff at Brookhaven, where for the next three years he was active in nuclear physics research. He then became Administrative Scientist for the newly formed Alternating Gradient Synchrotron Project. In 1956, Dr. Falk took leave of absence to spend two years at the AEC's Research Division in Washington. On his return to Brookhaven in 1958, he was appointed Scientific Assistant to the Director, and in July, 1961, he became an Assistant Director of the Laboratory.

As Associate Director, Dr. Falk's main responsibility will be in the area of programs, plans and budgets. He will continue to assist the Director and the Deputy Director in other matters affecting the Laboratory program, with special emphasis on those related to the Scientific Program.

Final BERA Concert— THE DROLC QUARTET



The king of spades lead was taken by the ace and declarer ruffed a spade with the ace of trumps as the start of a dummy reversal play to win 7 tricks in the trump suit rather than the obvious 6 tricks. After playing king of hearts and a heart to dummy's 9, another spade was ruffed and dummy entered with the club Queen to ruff the last spade. South's last trump was led. Declarer now made the key play of cashing the ace of diamonds (the Vienna coup). Dummy was entered with the club ace to lead the last trump, declarer pitching a diamond, and West being unmercifully squeezed.

The result of this fishing trip is listed below in the rules of the contest. Fishermen, please obtain a paper-cutting utensil and remove the BNL 1962 list of weights for your own calculations. Take a little extra time and enter your fish - you may win a monthly prize.

Copies of the entry blanks, rules, and listed species weights are available at the Recreation Office. This year's Committee Chairman is JIM BARANOSKY, Ext. 668.

BNL 1962 FISHING CONTEST RULES

1. Any fresh or salt water fish contained in the BNL 1962 List of Species is eligible for entry.
2. All entries must be caught by rod and reel.
3. All entries must be submitted within one week after the fish is caught.
4. Each entry must be weighed on a scale which is calibrated in ounces. This type of scale is available at any grocery or meat market.
5. Decisions of the contest committee are final.
6. The contest begins April 1, 1962, and ends on November 30, 1962.
7. To compute the point value of a fish, the weight of the fish will be divided by the 1962 BNL Listed Weight for that species, and multiplied by 1,000.
8. BERA will present:
 - a. One award for the highest entry in each calendar month.
 - b. Three annual awards for the three highest entries.
 - c. An annual award to the person who achieves the greatest accumulation of points as follows: each person's largest single entry in each species will be totaled towards his accumulation of points.
 - d. Annual awards limited to ONE per employee.
 - e. Monthly awards limited to TWO per employee.
