FOURTH PEGRAM LECTURESHIP

This year, the Pegram Lectures will be given in June rather than in the autumn. The George B. Pegram Lecturer for 1962 is Professor Derek J. de Solla Price of Yale University, who is an eminent historian of science. In his lecture series, entitled "Little Science, Big Science," Professor Price will consider the changing circumstances in the life of the scientist since the late nineteenth century and the profound effects which these changes have had on the behavior and attitude of scientists as well as on their organizations and publications. The dates and topics of the individual lectures are as follows:

PROLOGUE TO A SCIENCE OF SCIENCE, Tuesday, June 19; GALTON REVISITED, Friday, June 22; INVISIBLE COLLEGES AND THE AFFLUENT SCIENTIFIC COMMUTER, Wednesday, June 27; and POLITICAL STRATEGY FOR BIG SCIENTISTS, Friday, June 29.

DR. CATACOSINOS APPOINTED BUSINESS MANAGER

Dr. Maurice Goldhaber, Director, announced the appointment of Dr. William J. Catacosinos as Business Manager of the Laboratory, effective May 21. Dr. Catacosinos replaces Mr. Maxwell M. Small, who has been appointed by Associated Universities, Inc. as Project Manager for the 140-ft. radio telescope to be erected at the National Radio Astronomy Observatory at Green Bank, West Virginia.



Following a tour of duty in the United States Navy, Dr. Catacosinos joined the Laboratory in July, 1956, as Administrative Officer of the Alternating Gradient Synchrotron Project of the Accelerator Development Department. He joined the High Flux Beam Reactor Project in its formative stage in December, 1959. At the end of 1961, Dr. Catacosinos was appointed Assistant Business Manager of the newly formed Business Office.

Dr. Catacosinos was born in New York City, received his B.S. and M.B.A. from New York University, and has recently received his Doctor of Philosophy degree from that school. He is presently a member of the faculty of NYU's Graduate School of Business Administration.

MAJOR MEDICAL INSURANCE COVERED EXPENSES

The term COVERED EXPENSES, as defined in the contract, means "necessary and reasonable expenses incurred, with the approval of a legally qualified physician or surgeon," and include:


1. expenses incurred for treatment by a legally qualified physician or surgeon;
2. expenses incurred for hospital confinement;
3. expenses incurred for nursing services by a registered nurse other than a member of the employee's family;
4. expenses incurred for medical or surgical services and supplies.

The insurance company has the right and obligation to determine whether expenses are **necessary and reasonable**. For example, if you pay \$10.00 for a prescription which normally costs \$2.00, the insurance company can rightly question whether or not the expense is reasonable. Likewise, all other covered expenses, including physicians' and surgeons' fees, must be necessary and reasonable. If you are charged \$500 for a normal tonsillectomy without complications, the insurance company might question the charge since the normal fee for this operation is less than 50% of this charge.

Consequently, if you or a member of your family is to undergo treatment or an operation, it is to your best interests to discuss over-all costs with your physician or surgeon. He will gladly discuss the matter with you so that you may be fully aware of the expenses involved.
