## HARVARD-RADCLIFFE SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA MARCH 31

### A SPECIAL EVENT FOR ALL EMPLOYEES

The BERA Board announces with pleasure the first in a series of special events. The Harvard-Radcliffe Symphony Orchestra, composed of 60-70 members, under the direction of Professor Henry Swoboda will present a concert at the Laboratory on Sunday evening, March 31, at 8:30 p.m. The orchestra has toured extensively and won wide acclaim in the press as an outstanding college orchestra. Last year's tour itinerary included Mexico. This year it is expected that after the BNL concert, their tour will include concerts in New York City, at Rutgers University and then the White House.

The BNL concert will include Brahms Symphony #2, the Beethoven piano concerto #4 with Miss Lily Dumont as soloist, and Hindemith's Nobillissima Visione.

We hope your support will match the enthusiasm we have for this opportunity to bring to the Laboratory an event of this kind.

Tyrone Guthrie has made a suplavative film of "Oedipus Rex", Sophocles' tragedy, which Aristotle hailed as the greatest drama ever written. Brought to life by the Stratford Ontario Shakespearean Festival Players, this timeless drama is as fresh and new today as it was when Sophocles wrote it more than 2000 years ago for the great Spring Festival in Athens.

This unique motion picture, filmed in color, is performed in the English language using the W.B. Yeats translation.
