MAIL FACILITIES MOVED TO NEW QUARTERS



The United States Post Office and the Laboratory Mail Section have recently been moved to another wing of the Plant Maintenance building, 2 Center Street. The U.S. Post Office, as pictured above, is located immediately adjacent to the BNL Mail Section, which results in very close coordination and a consequent rapid handling of U.S. mail.

The U.S. Post Office was established on site during World War II, and we have been fortunate in having it continued for Laboratory purposes. During the past year it was officially designated as a First Class Post Office by the Postmaster General.

The BNL Mail Section performs varied functions in its daily operation. This section has the responsibility for the handling of all incoming, outgoing, and inter-office mail service. Outside mail is received by the U.S. Post Office three times daily and is shuttled to the BNL Mail Section. It is sorted and delivered on the next scheduled run. Two to four pickups and deliveries of U.S. and BNL mail are made daily to approximately 90 points within the Laboratory, depending on volume and other factors. Mondays and days following Holidays are especially busy for the BNL Mail Section, and there are many occasions when special expediting is required to handle Lab-wide distributions. Despite extra work loads, deliveries rarely vary more than 15 minutes from the schedule.

In addition to the distribution of mail, the BNL Mail Section transmits and receives Teletype and Western Union messages and operates the addressograph machine which addresses Laboratory distributions and a substantial volume of scientific information to be mailed off-site.

The volume of mail handled has grown right along with BNL. This is readily seen by comparing approximately 100,000 pieces of incoming U.S. Mail handled per month today with 58,000 pieces handled five years ago. The outgoing U.S. mail has increased from 28,000 pieces a month in 1958 to approximately 37,000 per month today. In addition to the U.S. mail, the BNL Mail Section distributes from 20,000 to 35,000 pieces of inter-office mail a month.
