## DR. KOUTS TO RECEIVE AEC AWARD



Dr. Herbert J.C. Kouts, Associate Head of BNL's Reactor Physics Division, is one of five U. S. scientists to receive the E. O. Lawrence Memorial Award for 1963 for recent meritorious contributions in the field of atomic energy. On March 12, Dr. Glenn T. Seaborg, Chairman of the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission, named the five scientists who are to receive the award. Each scientist will receive a medal, a citation, and \$5,000.

The award, which is made by the Commission upon recommendation of its General Advisory Committee and with the approval of the President, will be presented to the scientists at a ceremony at 4 p.m., April 25, at the National Academy of Sciences building in Washington, D. C.

The award was established by the Commission in December 1959 in honor of the late Ernest O. Lawrence, inventor of the cyclotron and Director of the Radiation Laboratory at the University of California, Berkeley and Livermore, which bears his name. Five scientists were presented with the award in June 1960, April 1961, and April 1962. The citation of Dr. Kouts was as follows:

*"For the development of new experimental techniques in reactor physics and their application to a better understanding of theoretical models of chain-reacting systems."*

## THE HARVARD-RADCLIFFE ORCHESTRA AT BNL MARCH 31



Presented By The BERA Board As A Special Event For All Employees

The Pierian Sodality of Harvard University, founded in 1808 for the improvement of music at Harvard, is the oldest continuing musical organization in the United States. In the past, the Pierian Sodality has sponsored many activities, but today the sole function of the Sodality is the sponsorship of the Harvard-Radcliffe Orchestra. The Orchestra, numbering 85 musicians, is devoted to serious instrumental music, and presents a concert series which often includes premiere performances and famous guest soloists.

High caliber musicians are selected for membership from among the students at Harvard and Radcliffe by an audition with the conductor. They receive no academic credit for playing in the orchestra. As a self-governing body, they choose their own conductor and vote on all important orchestra policy. The orchestra, with an annual budget of \$10,000, is completely self-supporting, receiving no financial aid from the University.

Winners of the orchestra's concerto contest are presented as soloists with the orchestra. These winners are Harvard and Radcliffe students, but the orchestra has also performed with Joseph Szigeti, Joseph de Pasquale, Leonard Rose, Joana Martzy, and most recently, with the Canadian contralto, Maureen Forrester. They will perform next spring (1964) with Pierre Fournier, the world-renown French cellist.

The orchestra has now reached the high point of its musical history, it has just returned from a summer tour of Mexico, and it is now being directed by Dr. Henry Swoboda. Dr. Swoboda, who is known in America primarily for his numerous recordings with the Vienna Symphony Orchestra, has performed with most of the major European orchestras. With the Harvard-Radcliffe Orchestra, in conjunction with the Harvard Glee Club and the Radcliffe Choral Society, Dr. Swoboda conducted the American Premiere of the Swiss composer Frank Martin's "Le Mystere de la Nativite" in Carnegie Hall on December 16, 1962.

Dr. Swoboda has been preceded as conductor of the orchestra by such outstanding musicians as the composer Walter Piston, G. Wallace Woodworth, later conductor of the Glee Club, Nicholas Slonimsky, and Richard Burgin, presently assistant conductor of the Boston Symphony Orchestra.

## BERA CONCERT FEATURES DUO PIANISTS



The fourth concert in the series will be given by the duo pianists, Yaltah Menuhin and Joel Ryce. They will play some of the outstanding original music for four hands at a single keyboard, long neglected on the concert stage. This delightful music, more intimate than that written for two pianos and more expanded than that written for two hands, presents the piano in a refreshing dimension. In addition to works by Schubert, Mozart and Brahms, the program will include Stravinsky's *Petrouchka*, which the composer arranged for four hands in 1947 to play with his son.

Yaltah Menuhin, no stranger to BNL audiences, is the youngest member of the distinguished musical family. During the past ten years she has concertized extensively throughout the world both as recitalist and soloist with orchestra, and has also been most active in chamber music. Joel Ryce, one of the outstanding young American pianists, studied with William Kapell, Rudolf Serkin and Dame Myra Hess. Since 1956 he has played solo, chamber music and concerto engagements across Europe, Asia, Australia and North America. Since the formation of the duo in 1960, the artists have played to enthusiastic audiences on both the east and west coasts of the U.S.A., as well as in England.

### APARTMENT LAUNDRY RENOVATION MARCH 15 TO 22

On March 15, the Plant Maintenance Division will begin the renovation of the Apartment Laundry. Existing washers and dryers will be removed and the following coin operated equipment installed: six single load commercial washers; two double load commercial washers for heavy items, such as blankets and bedspreads; three thirty pound commercial gas tumbler dryers; and one soap vending machine.

These machines are new and of the latest design, and should result in improved service. Rates are: single load washer - \$.25; double load washer - \$.50; drying \$.10 for ten minutes.

Renovation work will require about one week. During the renovation period, two of the new washers will be temporarily connected to existing sinks to provide limited service primarily for those with children. The present drying room will be open.
