CAMERA CREW AT BNL STARTING MAY 15

Starting Wednesday, May 15, a camera crew will be at BNL for about three days to obtain footage to be included in a motion picture entitled "Man and Radiation." This film, produced by the U.S. Army Pictorial Center under an AEC contract, is sponsored jointly by the AEC's Divisions of Biology and Medicine and Isotope Development.

The film describes the sun's radiant energy and other forms of radiation against which man must protect himself, and shows how such protection against overexposure must be achieved. It then presents some of the many ways in which ionizing radiation can be used to man's benefit in industry, medicine, and agriculture.

Sequences for this film will be made at BNL in the Biology laboratories and greenhouses, at the Graphite Research Reactor, and the Research Library.

TIAA — CREF

Participants in the Laboratory Retirement Plan may elect to have all premiums applied to TIAA, the fixed annuity, or may elect to have a percentage of premiums applied to TIAA and the remainder (up to 50%) to CREF, the variable annuity.

These percentages may be changed once a year, effective July 1. All participants who wish to change current percentages must make application at the Personnel Office **prior to June 1, 1963.**

AIRPLANE SERVICE

Associated Universities, Inc. has contracted for the use of an airplane for a trial period of four months for personnel transportation. The aircraft is a 1963 model Piper Apache, twin engine, seating four passengers and pilot.

First preference for the use of the aircraft will be given to university groups working at Brookhaven. Second will be A.U.I. personnel and visiting committee members. Third will be BNL personnel on official travel.

Flights will be limited to a radius of approximately 400 miles, and in general to areas not conveniently served by airlines.


